

Southern Star update

The Southern Star Observation "The most appropriate rectification solution Wheel is not expected to open within six months.

Southern Star Management Group said on February 25 that the extent of the works required was still not known but that it would take at least six months to fix.

Docklands digs deep for fire victims

Docklands has responded to the bushfires tragedy with shock, sorrow and a series of fundraising events to aid the victims.

Fix at Waterfront City led the charge within days of the tragedy with a fundraiser on February 12 which raised \$5400. And organiser Tanina Osborne expects this amount to be matched by a sponsor.

On February 14 Alumbra nightclub at Central Pier raised \$3750 and Adventure Sails raised \$1629 by taking river tours from Waterfront City.

The next morning the Docklands Church community donated more than \$4000 to the cause.

Docklanders donated blood at Docklands Stadium for three days during the following week and in two days dropped off so much clothing and non-perishable food at the YMCA for distribution in fire-affected Diamond Creek that centre manager Nadine Fletcher said they had to stop.

She said the YMCA's annual Open Doors fundraiser this month would go to aiding fire victims.

On February 19, the Sandringham Club raised \$3200 by auctioning a donated day on the bay with Docklands-based Discover Sailing.

And on March 18 Docklanders have a chance to attend a cocktail and auction benefit night organised by the "Dock 5 Girls Night In" book club from 6.30 pm at Watermark Bar in Victoria Harbour.

Well-known comedienne and author Denise Scott will host the evening and local estate agent Glen Lucas will be the auctioneer.

Book club member Meredith Brown said: "Like all Victorians we want to help in the most constructive way - to raise money for those who have suffered and lost so much in

"Money isn't everything but it will help people to rebuild their shattered lives again," Ms Brown said.

"Watermark is donating all profits on the night to the cause and manager Nicholas Manias and his staff are donating their time."

Tickets purchased after March 4 cost \$75 and will entitle patrons to substantial hot and cold canapes, champagne, wine, beer and soft drinks.

Book club member Chris Reiffel is coordinating donations for the charity auction on the night. The Docklands Community News has donated a full page advertisement valued at \$1980+GST.


"We are approaching local businesses asking for donations of goods and services that could be auctioned or placed on the 'promise tree'," she said.

Our first car s FO

Docklands has produced one of the hottest cars in the world but it's for a cool cause.

Described by some as a Bentley hot rod, the stunning concept car was unveiled at the Melbourne Motor Show on February 27.

And while the motor show version was just a life-scale model, the real thing could roar into life in Docklands later this year.

Fox Car Collection curator and Docklands pioneer Brian Tanti started work on the idea seven years ago following a conversation with the late racing great Peter Brock.

Mr Tanti explained that the motivation behind the project was haritable.

"Doctors and nurses go off to other countries helping out as volunteers but where was the opportunity for the automotive industry to do something?" he said.

He and Brock had been involved with the charity Handbrake Turn and the idea of a hand-built one-off dream car fitted the bill in at least three ways:

- The vehicle would be auctioned worldwide to raise money for charity;
- The intellectual property generated by the project would be used to promote careers in the automotive industry; and
- It was a platform to showcase Australian innovation on the world stage.

It is likely that the Federal Department of Innovation, Industry and Regional Development will tip in cash to help finish what has been, up until now, a largely voluntary exercise. If that happens, the Tanti Hot Rod will be released to the world at the Frankfurt Motor Show in September as an example of Australian design and engineering excellence.

General Motors has also helped along the way and is being rewarded by branding the


A talented group of volunteers has built the car in the workshop space of Kangan Batman TAFE's Automative Centre for Excellence in Docklands.

Mr Tanti is a renowned coach builder and said he was not particularly a hot rod person.

But the hot rod culture is representative of a bygone era in which individual creative design combined with mechanical brilliance to produce a vehicle that generated an emotional response.

Mr Tanti learned that that this was important by observing how children exposed to reality-TV based on customised cars and motorcycles suddenly became interested in tools, machinery, processes and, ultimately, an automotive career.

A proud coachbuilder by trade, Mr Tanti is frustrated by the common perception that motor trades are dumb, dirty and dangerous.



He invokes the style and class of northern Italy up until the 1970s when artisans and designers crafted customised versions of the world's most exotic cars.

The hot rod project has been supported by an army of volunteers like VicUrban's Peter Crowley, a former school teacher, who has developed trade curriculum materials from the project's learnings.

Mr Tanti calculates the largely voluntary research and development and in-kind contributions to date at \$2.6 million. So he is hoping for a significantly better highest bid when the car is auctioned for charity.


Mr Tanti said his greatest achievement was the formation of a foundation to continue the process. The Auto Horizon Foundation has already started planning its next vehicle.

It is also a sports car. But the wow factor this time will be its environmental credentials.

Yarra's Edge

access options under review

Options are being explored to restore access to the Yarra Trail which has isolated Yarra's Edge residents.

In response to concerns raised by residents Nola and Brian Logan, John Holland Tunnelling has said alternative access was being explored.

The bicycle and pedestrian trail was closed some time ago as part of private construction works at South Wharf.

Residents were dismayed recently when they were told it was planned to extend the closure until 2012 due to the Melbourne Main Sewer Replacement project.

However, a John Holland spokesperson said: "This is currently being reviewed to see if alternative access is available."

"The project team will soon be meeting with the relevant government and associated parties in the area to investigate possible alternate options," she said. "The safety of path users (pedestrians and cyclists) and construction workers will be the main driver of a decision."

The Logans had earlier complained: "We were very dismayed to see a substantial wall being erected to block access which, due to construction work, has already been blocked for some 18 months or more and were horrified to see that it would not re-open until May, 2012."

"For Yarra's Edge residents this is our main walking access to the city and the Southbank area and all alternative routes are pedestrian unfriendly, if not downright dangerous to say the least," the Logans said.

"Should not some temporary pontoon access be put in place given the extended number of years we will have this inconvenience?"



Automotive centre set for expansion

Docklands Automotive Centre of Excellence (ACE) is poised for a multi-million dollar expansion this year.

When it officially opened in 2006, the Kangan Batman TAFE's ACE signalled a shift in the future of automotive training in Victoria.

With Government funding of more than \$20 million, stage one of the ACE quickly became a focal point for the automotive industry, bringing together automotive paint and body training partners from the automotive industry. Stage two starts mid-year and is expected to be completed by mid-2011.

The ACE development project director John Nicholas said students and staff of the

state-of-the-art training facility were eagerly awaiting the expansion.

"At a cost of \$84.32 million, stage two will provide an additional 15,000 square metres of training space and will add to the current 5000 square metres of training space, creating room to house the majority of Kangan Batman TAFE's automotive-related training courses," Mr Nicholas said.

Design development for stage two was completed last September and continues the environmentally-sustainable design elements which have seen stage one win many industry and community awards.

The new development will involve the extension of stage one to house a range of automotive trade training including

motor mechanics, diesel mechanics, heavy vehicle mechanics, auto electrics, engine reconditioning, motor cycle, marine, auto parts and vehicle trimming. It will also house a library, student cafeteria, book store and flexible learning centre.

"Since it was opened, the ACE has become one of the most significant automotive training facilities in Australia, so while we're expanding the building's capabilities, it's important that we continue to provide students with an effective place to study," Mr Nicholas said.

VicUrban's General Manager Docklands and Major Projects Michael Hynes, said it was great to see the continued growth of educational facilities in Docklands, as the community continues to grow.

Goodbye Telstra, hello Etihad

Have you noticed your new neighbour yet? Etihad Stadium?

That's right, Telstra has packed its "dome" and departed from Docklands' doorstep and Etihad, the national airline of the United Arab Emirates, has landed safely in its place with its "stadium".

But despite how easily the new name will no doubt start to roll off the tongue over the months to come, such a transition is no mean feat. As all the players - Etihad, Telstra and Melbourne Stadiums Limited (MSL) - wipe the sweat from their collective brows following the change-over, MSL communication manager Bill Lane said: "Obviously it is a big task re-branding the entire stadium in a very short space of time."

"We have to be sensitive to the requirements of both partners in this transitional period but obviously much of the preparation work has been underway for a considerable time.'

"It is more than just re-signing the stadium - it is preparing uniforms, re-branding our

stationery, liaising with stakeholders such as VicRoads, Metlink even Melways and Google and much more. It is a big project."

And as Etihad is poised to take to the skies above Australia at the end of March, Mr Lane noted: "One of the great things is that in some challenging economic times we are helping to introduce a new brand to Victoria. We think it is an exciting new chapter for us and Victoria as well.

"But saying all this, we have enjoyed a great relationship with Telstra who have made an excellent contribution to the stadium."

Internationally, Etihad's name is linked to a number of high profile sporting events. As sponsors of the Ferrari F1 team, Chelsea Football Club and not forgetting the All Ireland Senior Hurling Championships, becoming a naming partner of one of Australia's major sporting venues as a way of announcing their arrival in Australia is a fit with experience behind it.

The five-year arrangement with Etihad was announced in October last year.

It's crunch time for the **DCA**

The Docklands Community Association looks like getting out of the business of politics.

At its meeting on February 19, the general view was that the DCA needed to focus on being a more socially-oriented organisation.

The association's future direction will now be put to an early annual general meeting on March 26 at 7.30pm at The Hub, 17 Waterview Walk, Docklands.

The meeting supported the view that the DCA's primary function should be to facilitate community building by providing social functions.

A motion was carried recommending to the April AGM that the association no longer involve itself in advocating a position of community issues.

Further, the motion said it should be made clear that the DCA shouldn't be asked for the Docklands community's view on issues.

Woolshed dispute heads

to VCAT

The dispute over liquor licensing for Docklands' Woolshed Pub is heading to VCAT after the **Director of Liquor Licensing Sue MacIellan in January**

Ms Maclellan knocked back the Woolshed Pub's application despite a recommendation to grant a restricted licence from a panel which heard objections last October.

rejected the application.

The Central Pier business applied mid-last year for a general licence until 1 am for 1445 patrons but this was opposed by the Victoria Police, the City of Melbourne and some Docklands residents.

Panel member Robin Rankin in November recommended granting the licence but with restrictions on noise, trading hours and patron numbers. But after nearly two month's consideration Ms Maclellan refused the application outright.

Lawyers for the Woolshed Pub have applied to VCAT to have Ms Maclellan's decision overturned.

Resident objector Peter Henderson applauded Ms Maclellan's decision.

"She has shown considerable strength and concern for the community in refusing this application," he said.

"It's a particularly courageous decision considering the Statutory Liquor Licensing Panel recommended the licence be issued, albeit with limited conditions."





VicUrban signals change of direction for Docklands Art

Love it or hate it (is there any in-between when it comes to art?), there is no denying that public art in Docklands makes a statement. Just what exactly some artists are trying to say may well be cause for debate, but isn't

VicUrban says art can play an important role in the creation of attractive, meaningful and memorable places.

"We place a lot of importance on community well-being, sustainability and innovation," VicUrban's Cultural Initiatives Director Vanessa Walker said. "And art has a vital role to play in helping us to achieve these objectives."

As Docklands approaches the half-way point of its development, VicUrban has been reflecting on the achievements of its "percent for art policy" in Docklands, with a view to embarking on some significant new directions from 2009.

"There is no doubt the existing art policy has successfully created another significant cultural destination in Melbourne," Ms Walker said. "However, there are new and different opportunities emerging as Docklands changes. We need to embrace these and expand the possibilities of public art."

VicUrban is working closely with the City of Melbourne and Docklands' developers to identify opportunities that will best enhance public spaces, add finer layers of detail and create surprising encounters in unexpected locations.

It hopes to launch a range of projects in 2009 and 2010 and while details are still being worked through, the themes and directions are likely to include:

- A changing landscape (temporary and evolving art);
- Indigenous people, land and culture;
- Artful environments:
- Diverse cultural perspectives;
- Media arts;
- Art that reveals the past; and
- Sustainability.

Details of new art projects will appear in Docklands Community News as they come to hand.



The art journey so far ...



There are currently more than 30 works, representing a broad range of art forms and styles. About \$15 million has been invested.

What is the Public Art Policy?

The Docklands Public Art Policy requires developers to spend 1 per cent of development costs on public art. Most of this goes towards art within the developer's own precinct or project, and .2 per cent on artwork integrated across Docklands.

How is the art selected?

There are different mechanisms depending on the project. In most instances, a short-list of artists is invited to research and investigate a precinct and develop proposals. A single proposal is then selected for development and implementation.

Sometimes an artist is commissioned directly. On other occasions, limited or open competitions are devised to open up opportunities to as many artists as possible.

Specialist advisors or curators are also a key part of the selection process, guiding the selection of artists who match the brief.

What is the Public Art Panel?

The VicUrban Public Art Panel provides advice regarding art direction, quality and selection. Current members are:

- Gabrielle Trainor, VicUrban Board member (chair)
- Kate Brennan, CEO, Federation Square
- Dr Chris McAuliffe, Director, Ian Potter Museum of Art
- Kevin Murray, independent curator
- Jerril Rechter, Executive director, Leadership Victoria

- Pru Sanderson, CEO, VicUrban

How are artists involved?

VicUrban encourages collaborations between artists and project design teams to enhance overall design outcomes and to identify opportunities to integrate art and craft with the architecture and landscape.

How are developers involved?

Developers are extensively involved in the process from the beginning.

VicUrban guides developers in the planning and commissioning of artworks and has an approval role in relation to all expenditure on public art.

How is the community involved?

In the early stages of planning for public realm projects (for example, the redevelopment of Harbour Esplanade) community consultation does take place, in which community views are sought into how best to make use of the space and what they'd like to see there.

VicUrban has specialist staff responsible for planning and overseeing public art development. Advice is provided by the VicUrban Public Art Panel and from specialist experts where necessary. The City of Melbourne's advice and comment is also sought in relation to municipal land.

Who is responsible?

Each developer plans the public art contribution in their development precinct. In its role as development authority, VicUrban:

- Oversees the implementation of the per cent for art policy;
- Advises developers on how to plan and deliver art; and
- Reviews and approves expenditure.

VicUrban also develops part of the public realm at Docklands and so commissions artworks for these areas. The City of Melbourne also contributes advice and comment, as the works become part of the city's public art collection.

Docklands tram extension underway

In a bid to better open up the tram network to Docklands' growing residential and business area of Victoria Harbour, work is currently underway to get the number 48 rolling an extra 500 metres down Collins Street by mid-year.

The 48 currently runs between North Balwyn and Docklands Drive via Harbour Esplanade. Its new route will take it down Collins Street from Batman's Hill, crossing over Harbour Esplanade and terminating at Merchant Street in Victoria Harbour.

However, Waterfront City will not be abandoned as Route 70, which currently terminates outside the National Australia Bank on Harbour Esplanade, will be extended to cover the rest of 48's old route along Harbour Esplanade and down Docklands Drive.

Lend Lease is funding the infrastructure works while the tram operating costs will be the responsibility of the Victorian Government.

According to the Department of Transport a new tram terminus will be constructed at Merchant Street along with an island platform and landscaping.

Who will represent Docklands?

While I appreciate W Ramsay's "pat on the back" (DCN issue 39) for my small part in the decision of the Director of Liquor Licensing to refuse the Woolshed Pub's application for a general licence till 1am for 1445 patrons, the real credit should go both to Victoria Police, for their total opposition to the issuing of the licence in the interest of the community on the basis of noise issues and the misuse and abuse of alcohol, and to the City of Melbourne for objecting based on noise affecting the amenity of the Docklands area.

Ramsay in his second paragraph highlights a major issue for the residents of Docklands and begs the question "who is representing the views of the expanding residential community in Docklands to the various decision makers, the media and other stakeholders and are those views representative of the considered opinion of the residential community?'

The Melbourne Liquor Licensees Forum is a joint initiative of the City of Melbourne and the local liquor licensing community. Membership is open to licensed venue owners and operators within the municipality and includes representatives of the Australian Hotels Association, Consumer Affairs Victoria - Liquor Licensing, Metropolitan Fire Brigade, and Victoria Police Licensing Unit. (CoM Fact Sheet). The convener of the forum has confirmed that, as currently structured, there is no opportunity for representation from community groups.

I therefore noted with concern (DCN issue 38) that "NewQuay representative on the Docklands Liquor Licensing Forum, Paul O'Halloran, said he didn't have an issue with the application. We feel that the people on Central Pier have already demonstrated that they are excellent at conducting this type of business.'

The statement by Michele Anderson (chair of the Docklands Community Association) that "her association no longer had any problem with the application" (DCN Issue 38) was her personal position but was not the considered view of her DCA committee at that time and that was a factor in the resignation of half the DCA committee. The results of the recent DCN survey on licensing in Docklands confirmed that her personal position is not the considered opinion of the community.

I believe that it is essential that there is an informed group that is able to represent to the decision makers, media and other stakeholders the balanced opinion of the increasing number of residents in Docklands. However, this takes considerable time, effort, organisational skills and community involvement. Past attempts such as the DCA have failed.

I therefore pose to your readers the question: How do we establish and maintain a forum that accurately represents the residents of Docklands?





Top yachtie takes a swipe at bridge proposal

Victoria's most awarded yachtsman Grant Wharington has weighed into the Docklands low rail bridge debate with the suggestion that is was ludicrous to even consider the idea.

"We've created this multi, multi-million dollar asset here in Docklands. How could the State Government even consider cutting it off from the water," he said.

He said a rail tunnel under the river was the obvious answer to the problem of moving

shipping containers from Webb Dock to the freight facilities at Dynon Dock.

"It seems such a waste," he said. "If it costs \$100 million extra to put it under the river, then so be it."

"I would have thought they could amortise that extra cost through a levy on each container in a very short time."

The former Sydney to Hobart line honours winner said yachts would no longer visit Docklands if the low bridge was built.

The Port of Melbourne Corporation has proposed a rail bridge with only eight metres

clearance but has so far refused to comment on it to the Docklands Community News.

Last month the DCN carried a summary prepared by Defend Our Docklands Or ... (DODO) convenor Michael Lindell. The Port of Melbourne declined to either confirm or deny the accuracy of the claims.

DODO is holding a meeting for concerned Docklanders at Nina's under the Southern Star Observation Wheel at 5.30 pm on Wednesday, March 18.
