



Doyle's Docklands attack "confusing"

VicUrban is confused by recent comments by Melbourne Lord Mayor Robert Doyle attacking Docklands.

The Victorian Government's Docklands development authority appeared perplexed by the Lord Mayor's apparent lack of awareness of work being carried out by both the council and VicUrban.

But in an interview with this paper, Ms Sanderson refused to criticise Cr Doyle, preferring instead a diplomatic approach.

"We actually welcome Cr Doyle's interest in the Docklands community," she said.

"Any debate on community needs within Docklands is a positive sign that the council is keen to progress and commit to a number of community projects."

"We are actually working very closely with council on a number of projects that will

deliver the very thing the Lord Mayor is talking about," she said.

"Importantly, we recognise we do now have a fantastic and engaged community on which we can draw to influence the direction of these plans."

The multi-million dollar projects include plans for a library and community rooms, as well as state-of-the-art sport and recreation facilities.

"We're very keen to finalise discussions with council regarding a location for the library and learning hub, and we know the proposal to locate the sporting hub in Waterfront City has the full support of the developer," Ms Sanderson said.

"We've been having productive talks with council officers and management team for some time. In light of this positive working relationship, the recent criticism is disappointing and somewhat counterproductive."

The City of Melbourne has been the municipal authority responsible for Docklands for close to two years. Other projects VicUrban is hopeful will now move ahead include the implementation of updated directional and information signage throughout Docklands, for which a number of key sites have been agreed.

VicUrban is also keen to talk to the Lord Mayor about its plans to redevelop Harbour Esplanade into a major waterfront park.

"This project represents a critical point in Docklands' evolution," Ms Sanderson said.

"It would be great to now get the Lord Mayor on board and we're looking forward to taking him through these plans when he accepts our invitation for a tour of Docklands." VicUrban says it has been trying to facilitate a tour of Docklands for the Lord Mayor since before Christmas.

So – does VicUrban believe planning controls are best left with them?

"Planning controls rest with the Minister for Planning, and the council is consulted on all planning matters - they are involved every step of the way. But, as the project makes that transition to a place – ultimately, it's about what's best for the community," Ms Sanderson said.

"What we'd say is that social fabric takes time to build and requires input from the type of community that does exist down here."

"Hopefully, we can all work together to deliver on the vision for Docklands."

Cr Doyle refused to speak with the Docklands Community News.



Why is it that the outside world thinks we Docklanders are not a community when we clearly know that we are?

March 16 to 20 appeared to be the annual "Let's bash Docklands" week led by Lord Mayor Robert Doyle and supported by print and radio media.

Cr Doyle wouldn't speak to the Docklands Community News but if he has been correctly quoted in the press, his understanding of Docklands is clearly limited.

"At the micro level it doesn't work. Where would you take your kids to kick the footy? Where would you have a casual beer?" he was quoted by The Age as saying.

Cr Doyle's comments appear to be in

The Age hosted a debate between "experts" like Cr Doyle, planning ministers, architects and others. It resembled a parade of who had the best "social glue" or "fine grain" which is apparently missing from our community.

The most reassuring comments came from former Premier Joan Kirner who stated the obvious that "community" simply cannot be imposed from above.

The Age posed an online poll question "Is Docklands more dead than alive?" with 79 per cent of respondents saying "yes".

This may appear to be a justification for Cr Doyle's position but compare the community participation in this online poll and one that the Docklands Community News conducted earlier this year on the local debate over the Woolshed Pub's liquor licensing application.

The Age poll attracted 399 responses. That's equivalent of one reader responding in every 1917 (from a claimed weekday readership of 765,000). The DCN poll attracted 121 responses from a readership of 20,000 or one in every 165 readers responding.

That's not a bad response from a community which is presumed not to exist.

Our community is different from most others. Living in towers we can be perceived as a series of "gated" communities. Our turnover is vast. Statistically, we are transient, with one third of us moving on every year. There

are more single men here than anywhere is in metropolitan Melbourne (some call us Divorcelands!).

And when the census people called in 2006 up to a third of us didn't even answer the door.

We are ethnically diverse. We don't include any welfare recipients. We are many things, but these things don't make us any less a "community".

And we are down here, tucked away happily living in our waterside village.

The Age editorial of March 16 said: "The problem with Docklands is its location".

What a strange comment.

The writer went on to say that is was a problem to be "isolated from the city by rail lines, the not inconsiderable bulk of a sporting stadium, and the various strands of a freeway system".

How many of us think that this is a bad thing?

Is Docklands more dead than alive?

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Help is at hand for Harbour Town traders who are experiencing the fall out from the closure of the Southern Star **Observation Wheel.**

ING Real Estate is working with Harbour Town retailers on additional marketing campaigns to help drive visitation to both the new shopping precinct and surrounding attractions.

An extensive television campaign as well as print ads are running, to support the regular marketing activity undertaken to promote the precinct.

VicUrban has come to the party by extending its free shuttle bus service between Southern Cross Station and Harbour Town beyond the summer period.

It has also revised the route to include a more direct "lunch hour run", so that Batman's Hill, Victoria Harbour and Stadium precinct

workers can use the service during their lunch hour. This initiative will run until the end of June, when the City Circle Tram extension is expected to start.

Despite the set back, many traders are upbeat about the future of Harbour Town.

The chairman of the Docklands Co-ordination Committee, Cr Kevin Louey, and Docklands Chamber of Commerce President, Keith Rankin, toured the centre on March 20.

Cr Louev said he was surprised to find most traders upbeat about their future prospects.

"Most people have confidence," he said. "They want more traffic and it's not easy for them but they want to hang in."

He said many had renegotiated their rental terms but that rent was only a small portion of the businessis overheads.

iMany of them are changing their businesses in the light of what has happened and itis great to see that happening,î he said.

Mr Rankin said the Docklands Chamber of Commerce was holding a breakfast seminar between 7 and 9 am on April 28 at Waterfront City at which retail expert Stephen Ogden Barnes of Monash Universityís Australian Centre for Retail Studies will conduct a seminar on the implications of tough economic times. See page 9 for more

Mr Rankin said the chamber was also making mentors available to members through the Small Business Mentoring Service.

But Mr Rankin was also conscious that Harbour Town retailers needed concrete marketing outcomes and not just programs that imet the needs of the politiciansî.

"What we have to do is ensure that any marketing activities undertaken meet the needs of the retailers immediately," he said.

"We really need expert help here. It shouldn't be a matter of guesswork to overcome these problems," Mr Rankin said.

VCAT date set

The Woolshed Pub liquor licensing dispute heads to VCAT for a compulsory mediation on April 3.

Failing mediation, four days from July 13 have been set aside to hear the dispute.

The owners of Central Pier's Woolshed Pub have applied to have overturned a licensing application rejected by the Director of Liquor Licensing, Sue Maclellan in January.

The Woolshed applied mid-last year for a general licence until 1 am for 1445 patrons but this was opposed by the Victoria Police, the City of Melbourne and some Docklands residents.

Costco Docklands is close

Costco Docklands is only a few months away - as evidenced in March when a media pack gathered on site for an announcement on jobs.

Managing Director Patrick Noone was on hand to field questions which ranged from the global financial crisis to how Harbour Town retailers were faring without the Southern Star Observation Wheel.

Costco will open on Footscray Rd in July and says it has vacancies for 225 new staff - both full and part time. With the media more used to reporting job losses, this news was widely welcomed and broadcasted.

Mr Noone said the decision to build the US retailing giant's first Australian store in Docklands was due to its location.

He said Docklands may not have offered other big retailers the same advantage that it offers Costco.

He pointed to the nearby CBD skyline to illustrate the point that Costco not only sells directly to the public, but also wholesales to small businesses. "It was easy access for all these small businesses that attracted us to Docklands," he said.


Mr Noone also said the Docklands site was extremely well served by freeway access and public transport. He said Costco was now looking for a suitable site in Sydney for a second store.

It has 53 million card holders at 535 locations throughout the US, Canada, Mexico, England, Scotland, Korea, Taiwan and Japan.




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

"Tunnel vision"

on Yarra crossing

In response to recent articles in the Docklands Community **News, Port of Melbourne** Corporation (PoMC) is pleased to address and clarify some of the speculation about a Yarra River crossing which would link Webb Dock to the main rail freight terminals in the **Dynon precinct.**

The issue was also raised by a number of people on the boat tours around the port which PoMC was pleased to host on three consecutive Saturday mornings in late February / early March which we hope residents found informative.

PoMC is committed to efficient land transport connections to port facilities to accommodate the anticipated growth in trade demand and ensure the sustainable development of the Port of Melbourne and an ongoing dialogue with our neighbours. A final decision on the method of project delivery for any future Yarra rail crossing from Webb Dock to the rail network has not yet been reached. Both tunnel and bridge proposals remain live options and there remains plenty of scope for further consultation ahead.

Although the rail link was closed in 1992 and disconnected in 1996 to allow for the Docklands development, PoMC believes that preserving the option for a rail connection is important for the long-term development of Webb Dock.

There has been considerable assessment, consideration and analysis of any potential alignment, bridge and tunnel operations and recreational watercraft interactions.

With regard to any prospective option involving a low-level bascule rail bridge, PoMC is not seeking to unreasonably constrain watercraft movement and, in fact, the majority of the operating parameters specified by VicUrban can be achieved through this option. Indeed, 85 per cent of forecast recreational and commercial watercraft would be able to pass under such a bridge with an eight metre clearance even when the bridge is closed. The bascule bridge proposed also has a considerable period each day in an ìopenî position.

Using model simulations of periods of closure, the maximum waiting time for any watercraft would be around 20 minutes with no more than 10 watercraft waiting at any one time.

The advantages of a tunnel include maintaining current height clearance for watercraft and there would be no impact on visual amenity, particularly as a low-level bridge would be adjacent to the Bolte Bridge.

It should be noted that there are severe gradient constraints for a tunnel connection running under the Yarra River to connect between the Dynon Precinct and Lorimer Street. Hydrodynamic and environmental factors are also key considerations.

Driven largely by Melbourneis population growth which is set to increase by 1 million people by 2030, PoMC needs to plan prudently and responsibly to manage the forecast increased freight task. This must include a greater share of freight being carried by rail.

For its part, PoMC is committed to further dialogue with Docklands residents and will work to inform them of any developments via this newspaper.

DODO to take its case to the Premier

The Defenders of Docklands Or ... ? (DODO) plan to form a high-level deputation and take their case to the Premier, John Brumby.

DODO convenor Michael Lindell said the State Government had been undecided on the Port of Melbourne Corporation's low rail bridge proposal for six years.

"The State has been aware of the bridge since 2003 but has still not taken a position," he said.

Mr Lindell says he would form a group of stakeholders comprising developers, corporations and community representatives to take their case to the Premier.

About 20 interested residents attended a meeting at Nina's café in Harbour Town on March 18 to hear the latest from Mr Lindell. Mr Lindell also addressed the Docklands Chamber of Commerce on March 17.

He said the overwhelming message coming from the residents meeting was anxiety about how a low rail bridge across the front of the

Bolte Bridge would restrict marine access to Docklands.

The Port of Melbourne Corporation has proposed an eight metre high rail bridge to carry containers between Webb Dock and the Dynon Rd freight facility but says no decision has been made to built it.

"The people attending the meeting felt anxiety that their expectations about living in Docklands could be compromised," Mr Lindell said.

He said the participants at the meeting were encouraged to write to the Premier with their concerns.

"My fear is that the port will secure a corridor for the bridge with little public debate but the bridge won't be built until some time in the future when it will become fait accompli," he said.

"One day we will look up and work will have started and there will be nothing we can do about it."

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These wharfies are the keepers

Despite the many changes to Docklands, for a tight band of ex-wharfies their wives and families, the bonds of working and living together for nearly a century around Docklands is as strong today as it was in the 1920s.

During a recent outing on the re-invigorated extroop carrier and now stylish charter boat, The Melburnian, about 20 of the group were taken on a tour around the Docklands area for an update on the on-going changes to the area.

With 91-year-old Ted Fellows, president of the Retired Waterside Workers Club, proudly leading the way, the group not only worked on the docks but they grew up together around Port Melbourne and South Melbourne. Many of them knew each other as children and went to school together.

"We went through the depression together. It was the wharfies who kept Australia going," says Ted. "We also saw the good times together. It was my life."

Childhood friend, Kath Scheibs, agrees, but chimes in with a laugh, "When he wasn't chasing the girls".

Ted started on the wharves in the days when it was an open pick-up. You turned up and hoped to selected for work that day.

"If you weren't, it was called the hungry mile back home. It stopped after the war," Ted said.

After six years in the Navy, Ted returned to the wharves when they started paying "appearance money" to those who turned up.

With memories abounding about their days around the area, Kath recalls swimming across the Yarra in front of what is now Yarra's Edge, when it used to be the swinging basin for cargo ships.

"There used to be a punt, but you had to pay to go across, so we used to swim across and back," she said.

According to Ted, like any job where the group was tight, the new wharfies had to undergo an initiation - usually they were made to unload the more distasteful loads, such as lamp black or red ochre, which left them filthy.

When asked about the dredging of the bay, Frank Dean, who was a seaman from the mid-1940s, was not too sure what all the fuss was about.

"It was always dredged, but was stopped when Jeff Kennett was premier and he laid off the Harbour Trust," he said.

"The Ports and Harbour Trust ... had two dredges, the Matthew Flinders and the Pioneer, they used to dredge up and down the bay all year. What's going on now wouldn't be needed if he hadn't done that, it's let the silt all build up."

For sisters Emmie Davis and Thelma Edgar, just two of seven daughters of a once wellknown figure around the docks, Samuel

Nixon, the annual wharfie's picnic held around Christmas time was a highlight.

According to Emmie the picnics were, "wonderful, we'd all catch the train to Frankston and every family would be given a basket of groceries, Patsy's father would play the banjo.

"A lot of the families were large and the work was not constant. So it was really hard, but everybody looked after everybody else, and growing up we had the best times."

Of course, some of that fun ironically included the many stoushes that took place between traditional enemies, the Catholics and the Protestants, Emmie laughs: "There was a brawl every night."

Even for relative new-comers Sonia and John Cassar, who arrived in Australia over 50 years ago from Italy, the warmth and welcoming of the group meant they fitted in straight away.

Today the group acknowledge that it is Ted, with his passion and commitment to the group that has helped keep them together. Not only do they regularly go on holidays together but he also organises their meetings every second Thursday in North Melbourne.



Who will represent Docklands?

I don't normally bother with slanging matches in community newspapers but since people are starting to bandy my name around and quoting me I felt it worthwhile to comment.

My wife and I moved in to the Boyd six years ago last August. NewQuay was a construction site and along with a number of pioneers, like the Andersons, watched with pleasure and pride as NewQuay developed into the great dual-use precinct it is today. Along the way we have worked together with developers and licencees to arrive at a mutually agreeable set of rules that is fair to both parties.

We have had issues with nightclub patrons, obviously a type of business that did not suit an environment like ours with such close proximity to residents and have seen Cargo nightclub closed and Fix become a function centre. These closures have seen a vast improvement in the amenity of the area for residents.

A number of licensees have met with us prior to their opening and hammered out agreeable opening hours and security structures to enable the mutual needs of retail establishments and residents to co-exist.

The developers of Central Pier have done an excellent job. Prior to the opening of Alumbra, and subsequently the reception centres along the pier, which incidentally face our apartment directly across the water and have caused us no noise issues whatsoever, they requested a meeting with us to make sure they had the support of residents. They were most amenable to our requests and indeed shortened the trading hours applied for due to our feelings.

Peter Henderson's statement that "there is no opportunity for representation from community groups" on a liquor licensing forum is quite correct. However I was invited along to the initial meeting some three plus years ago to represent the Bodies Corporate at NewQuay as it was a pioneering site, a mixed use development new to Melbourne. Our presence there has been invaluable and a large amount of input from the community has been able to be introduced. Each body corporate chair is contacted by me prior to each meeting, their concerns are tabled and considered and reported back after the meeting.

After this division in the community over the Woolshed, I offered to the members of the Docklands Licensing Forum to stand aside. Unanimously I was asked to continue attending, representing our NewQuay owners corporations as it was felt it was a balanced representation, taking into account the interests of all our owners, a number of which are retail establishments.

As for the statement Michele and I are "out of touch" nothing could be further from the truth. We were amongst the foundation members of the Docklands Community Association and the Docklands Chamber of Commerce and sit on a number of committees with police, MCC, precinct management and the larger stakeholders as well as regular contact with our fellow owners corporation committee members and residents.

We average two or three meetings a month as well as a daily stream of phone calls and emails. Let's not let a one item agenda cause division in our community.

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Free bus to

Harbour Town

VicUrban has enhanced its free shuttle service between Southern Cross Station and Harbour Town, to include a more direct "lunch time route" to benefit local workers and residents.

The free shuttle service will run until the end of June, soon after which the free City Circle Tram is expected to start travelling down Docklands Drive.

The modified lunch route picks up from the left hand side of Bourke Street outside Poppy's Thai (near the corner of Harbour Esplanade) at 12.10pm, 12.40pm, 1.10pm, 1.40pm and 2.10pm, and travels northbound to Harbour Town.

On the return trip from Harbour Town, it stops outside the Bendigo Bank building providing a quick and easy way to get some shopping in during your lunch hour.

Outside the lunch period, the bus will continue its established run of doing a continual loop between Southern Cross Station and Harbour Town.

Departure times from Southern Cross Station are on the hour and half past the hour between 10am and 5.30pm.

Return times from Harbour Town are on the quarter past and quarter to the hour, between 10.15am and 5.45pm.

Young artists

at it again

Melbourne University fine arts students will be exhibiting their interpretation of Docklands from April 17.

Following the success of last year's inaugural Victoria Harbour Young Artists Initiative, the Sculpture and Spatial Practice students from the Faculty of the VCA and Music, are returning for another show at Victoria Harbour.

Seven sculptural projects will be undertaken by nine emerging artists. The works will be along the waterfront, along Merchant Street and into Victoria Green.

The works engage with the site and the context of Docklands as a redeveloped working port. The students consider the space as one of recreation, navigation, business and pleasure that is unique in Melbourne.

The exhibition will be eight weeks in development, and is comprised of middle and final year Bachelor of Fine Art students.

The show runs from April 17 to 30.

Flaming Docklands

The company conducted similar operations in 2005 and 2006 and says there is no risk to health or property.



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
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DCA "can do it all" - survey

Most respondents to our March online survey believe that the Docklands Community Association should be both a social group and a community advocate.

Only one respondent said the DCA should only facilitate and organise social functions while three said the association should only form and represent the Docklands community's views on current issues.

The survey was unanimous, however, with an overwhelming "yes" to the question: "Is there a need for an organisation to form and represent the Docklands community's views on current issues?"

When asked which was the appropriate body to undertake this task:

- Three said the DCA:
- Five said a resident forum; and
- One said an alliance of owners corporations.

Our survey this month is the same as one hosted by The Age, last month: "Is Docklands more dead than alive?"

on Barangaroo

John Tabart who spent 10 years with VicUrban and presided over the development of Docklands, has recently been appointed the CEO of Barangaroo, the \$3 billion redevelopment of Sydney's east Darling Harbour.

"There are similarities between the developments, but Barangaro is already a mixed use area and Sydneysiders are very engaged in the process," Mr Tabart said.

Barangaro is a 22 hectare site owned by the NSW Government and the new development will include the creation of commercial office space, as well as residential, tourism and retail space, parklands and a ferry hub.

"Barangaroo will be a vital and innovative public private partnership in these current financial times," Mr Tabart said.

With three consortia already short-listed for the development, a decision as to who will finally undertake the development is expected to be made later this year.

Following on the ongoing success of the Docklands development, Mr Tabart also anticipates a bright future for Barangaroo.

"It will become a world-leading and enduring landmark public place and space," he said.



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Meet the first editor

A chance meeting at The Hub last month brought the first editor of a Docklands community publication face-toface with the current incumbent.

Career planner Bill Chandler officially left the Docklands Authority in 2000 but still maintains ties by conducting tours of the area for planning professionals.

He claims to have had 14 job titles during his tenure over nearly a decade. Interestingly these roles ranged from chief planner to marketing manager - the latter accounting for his development of community publications.

At a subsequent meeting with Bill, he produced the first copies of two publications INFORMation and The Harbour View which were the forerunners of the Docklands Community News.

In Issue 1 of INFORMation, dated February 1997, notice is given of a public consultation in Shed 4 which will outline "the current status of the development including the bid and assessment process for five of the

seven precincts, the bid process for the Stadium Precinct and the provision of trunk infrastructure".

Elsewhere in the publication it reports the fndings of Newspoll surveys from 1996 to ascertain the "awareness and attitude of the Melbourne people towards the Melbourne Docklands development".

"The most recent survey found that 81 per cent of people questioned were aware of the development compared with 66 per cent in August, and of those 82 per cent were in favour of the development."

Bill recalled that there was only one resident in Docklands during those times - a homeless man who lived under a door.

He said bipartisan political support for the project was the key to its success, although it did take the Kennett Government six months to get on board after inheriting the project from Labor. He said another important principal had been the preservation of public access to the water.

In the first edition of The Harbour View, dated December 1999, MAB Corporation's NewQuay project is announced. "Initial response to marketing for the first stage has been very encouraging," the paper said.

The main story, however, was on "Creating a new community in Melbourne Docklands", a subject that is still being widely debated.

In this article, social planner Michelle Howard is quoted as saying: "We are trying to build a sense of community belonging and identity - things like the opportunity to talk with the neighbours, finding a quiet place to sit and not having to leave on the weekend to escape the hustle and bustle.'

"Places where this is not provided have high turnover. Good communities embrace diversity enabling people to pursue their values, lifestyle choices and aspirations.'

These two earlier publications were superceded by the **Docklands Community** News which was started by VicUrban as a community building exercise in 2003. The DCN has now been privately owned for nearly two years.






















Harbour Esplanade project - What to expect



Last year, VicUrban unveiled its plans to transform Harbour Esplanade into a major waterfront park that better connected the precincts and provided pedestrian walkways, a designated bike path and realigned the tram tracks into the road way to provide for the additional parkland.

The project will be delivered in stages and is being planned to minimise disruption. However it is inevitable there will be some disruption, with the first stage due to get underway in the second half of 2009.

VicUrban has asked for patience and will continue to communicate with the community as the project progresses.

Here's an overview of what to expect throughout Stage 1.

What does Stage 1 involve?

Stage 1 involves realigning the tram tracks so as they run in the centre of the road, similar to most tram tracks in Melbourne.

Tram services will continue to operate throughout the construction of Stage 1. The measures to separate pedestrian, cyclist, tram and car traffic will be implemented - the tree-lined boulevard will be created and the designated bike and pedestrian paths constructed.

Stage 1 will also see a super stop (tram) built outside the Bendigo Bank building, and a new stop built outside Digital Harbour's Life. lab building.

These stops will replace those currently outside the NAB Building and Central Pier.

Stage 1 will take around 12 months to complete.

Impact on trams

Trams will continue to operate throughout Stage 1 on the existing lines for the first six months, transferring to the realigned configuration after approximately six months.

Weekend out-of-hours shut-downs of services will be required to facilitate the tram stop moves.

Once complete, the tram services are designed to be more efficient, with the realigned system ensuring trams will move through intersections at Bourke and LaTrobe streets in line with the traffic movements.

Impact on traffic

Traffic along the length of Harbour Esplanade will also be maintained throughout Stage 1.

One through lane in each direction will operate throughout the construction period and, on completion, a parallel parking lane will also exist along the majority of Harbour Esplanade's length (in each direction).

Impact on cyclists

The Capital City Trail will also be realigned as a dedicated path running along the tree-lined boulevard, adjacent but separated from a pedestrian footpath.

The existing on-road lanes will be removed, with all cyclists encouraged to use the dedicated path which links with the off-road paths north of Docklands Drive and south of Bourke Street.

Cyclists will continue using the existing bike paths until Stage 1 is complete.

Impact on pedestrians

Pedestrians will have a separate footpath once Stage 1 is completed, as well as seven designated areas for crossing the tram tracks once realigned, with zebra crossing, signed crossings and informal crossing points along the length of the redevelopment area.

What next?

Exact details of when Stage 1 will get underway are still being finalised, but works are expected to begin in the second half of 2009. Keep an eye on www.docklands.com for details.

Stage 2 of the project will involve lowering the existing wharves and rebuilding this key waterfront area to enhance Docklands relationship with its waterfront and allow for the pedestrian boulevard and green space to be built. Stage 2 is likely to take around six months, and is planned to get underway once the new tram lines are operating as part of Stage 1.

Harbour Esplanade extension

Meanwhile, the first stage of plans to extend Harbour Esplanade so as it connects with Charles Grimes Bridge is expected to be completed in early May.

A northbound lane from the bridge off ramp will soon reopen, taking Harbour Esplanade all the way through to Bourke Street.

Both cars and pedestrians will need to take particular care using the new "easy access" tram stop installed at Docklands Park in early 2008.

The stop requires passengers to walk across a raised stretch of road to alight or disembark the tram, at the start of which traffic is expected to wait.

Stages 2 and 3 of the extension will see both north and southbound traffic travelling along Harbour Esplanade to and from Charles Grimes Bridge and are scheduled to open to traffic in September.

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Good? Friday



The vessel Mia Mia is a regular visitor to the Docklands and Marina YE. This summer's visit has a special significance because, instead of it's normal practice of leaving us and heading north to tropical waters, Mia Mia is heading to Queenscliff for a complete refit.

Built in 1964 to a design by Melburnian Eric Slater, the 80 foot Mia Mia is indeed a muchtravelled vessel. Apart from its many ocean voyages, Mia Mia acted as Radio Relay Ship for the Sydney Hobart Yacht Race on seven occasions, a testament to the seaworthiness of this magnificent vessel.

Now owned by a syndicate with permanent skipper Neil Easson at the helm, a normal vear for Mia Mia would see her setting sail from Melbourne to Bermagui after the grand prix to have annual maintenance carried out then north to Hamilton Island. From her winter base at Hamilton Island, Mia Mia cruises the South Pacific throughout the winter to places like Lizard Island for the fishing tournaments and New Caledonia and all places in between.

Christmas and New Year will see her in Sydney on the return journey to Melbourne for the Australian Open and grand prix. Melbourne is always a popular spot with the syndicate shareholders and their friends and Mia Mia can be seen cruising both the northern and southern areas of Port Phillip.

A veteran of several crossings to New Zealand, Lord Howe Island and even through the South China Sea to Hong Kong, Neil estimates that Mia Mia has travelled 250,000 nautical miles

The major refit about to start will take most of 2009 and, as such, Neil will leave Mia Mia to start another adventure on the high sees. As Mia Mia sailed away from Marina YE for Queenscliff I looked forward to seeing what work would be carried out to this magnificently kept vessel.

According to Rear Commodare Terence O'Donnell, quite a few locals have now taken family memberships to enjoy the year-round fun and racing on Victoria Harbour.


"We were delighted to commission our new club committee/race start 'tinnie'," Mr O'Donnell said.
