Docklands does a Bradbury

It was wall-to-wall Olympians in Docklands on March 30 as the Icehouse's second rink was bestowed with Steven Bradbury's name.

Bradbury's name entered our common language after he won Australia's first ever winter Olympic gold medal in Salt Lake City in 2002 when the speed skaters in front of him crashed just before the finish line.

He was joined by Australia's most recent winter Olympics gold medallist Lydia Lassila during a star-studded evening to launch the nation's Olympic Winter Institute in Docklands.

Council scuttles its marina bid

After nine months, the City of Melbourne has abandoned its attempt to find commercial tenants for Waterfront City Marina.

Last June, the council upset Docklands' charter boat operators by calling for expressions of interest for two berths at Waterfront City and flagged that it intended to open up the rest of Docklands to commercial competition.

The council won't discuss the matter, claiming it is confidential. But it is understood that only two operators responded and it has taken until now for the council to decide it doesn't want either.

The council refuses to reveal how much manpower has been wasted in the process or how much it paid in legal fees to run the expression of interest, but one of the unsuccessful bidders estimates the cost in the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

"I doubt whether they would get any change out of a couple of hundred grand," Rivers Group charter operator Lou Jovanovski said.

Mr Jovanovski has removed the second of his four boats from Docklands. Early this year Saphire left for the Gold Coast and last week Explorer followed.

"How can you invest in a business without security of tenure?" he said. He criticised the council for offering only a two-year lease with a further one-year option.

He branded the EoI "stupid" and said it was "just not worth staying in Docklands". Mr Jovanovski said Rivers Voyager would "probably" also soon leave.

He had offered the council a deal on a 10-year lease at Waterfront City but this was

considered non-conforming. The other unsuccessful bidder offered less money than the council wanted.

Tramboat operator Anthony Purcell said he offered slightly less than the going Docklands rate because the berthing did not come with car parking, refuelling access and other amenities enjoyed by other Victoria Harbour operators.

The vice-president of the Charter Vessel Owners Association of Victoria, Keith Rankin, said he was pleased that the council had abandoned the Waterfront City Marina expression of interest.

"We didn't believe it was going to work as the same approach has failed upstream with disastrous result for operators, tourists and other river users," Mr Rankin said.

He said since the EoI was issued, the charter boat operators and the council had a much better relationship and the parties were now working toward a more commercially realistic approach.

"We are glad that this approach is not going to be forced on us here," he said. "A lot more work needs to be done in striking an appropriate berthing fee in Docklands."

Mr Rankin said it was a shame that Rivers Group was relocated its fleet from Docklands, but it indicated how hard it was to survive in the Melbourne market.

ING Real Estate is believed to be working with the council to secure commercial tenants for the marina.

Water woes plague Docklands

Some Docklands residents have been charged nearly six times the normal price for water due to a billing error.

Residents of Victoria Point were recently charged the wrong amount for the October, November and December 2009 quarter.

Building manager Stewart Silver King and Burns says the error occurred when an operator incorrectly added a service charge to the water volume charge.

In one case, this resulted in water being charged at \$6.63 per kilolitre, rather than the City West Water rate of \$1.26.

Stewart Silver King and Burns says the amounts overcharged will be credited on the next quarterly bill.

The error was discovered after residents complained about the price of the water.

Stewart Silver King and Burns is yet to respond to evidence that it's previously quarterly billing was also inaccurate.

Victoria Point buys water in bulk from City West Water and uses computerised meters to determine each apartment's share.

Stewart Silver King and Burns says this software is regularly audited by an independent third party and there is no reason to doubt its accuracy.

In other areas of Docklands, the issue of how to equitably divide and allocate the water bills is causing headaches.

NewQuay apartments were built with non-City-West-Watercompliant meters and this is currently causing headaches for owners corporations as the firm which originally installed them is defunct.

Most towers are being forced to charge for water via lot liability, which effectively means that only owners and not renters pay for water. It is illegal to bill for unmetered water.

Their other choice is to retro-fit expensive complying meters. This is further complicated by occupational health and safety issues, as some meters are located in areas that water authority meter-readers refuse to service.

The Arkley tower is currently persevering with its originally-installed meters but sources say this may change to the lot-liability method to avoid unnecessary cost and inconvenience.

Further complicating matters is owners corporations and building managers' inability to charge any more for "hot water" even though this appears as a separate line item on bills

The gas used to centrally heat this water is sometimes compared with water usage and assigned to owners on this proportion. In other instances, the gas used to heat the water is simply divided and billed by lot liability.

Owners corporations also generally absorb the "service charge" of the City West Water bill.

Lend Lease's Dock5 development in Victoria Harbour has avoided these headaches and each apartment has its own City West Water account and meter.

A frustrated whinge

There is so much going on in Docklands at the moment ... but for ordinary Joes like you and I, so little opportunity to find out about it, much less participate in it.

You can understand the developers putting up the shutters and not wanting to talk about their proposed projects, as their sole function is to maximise profits for shareholders.

But why is state and local government so hell bent on keeping the public in the dark about what's going on in Docklands? Where did this attitude that the public don't deserve to know come from?

Let's start with the State Government. In researching our story about North Wharf on Page 5, we were told that unless we spent \$5000, the Department of Treasury and Finance wouldn't tell us what development restrictions it had put on the precinct. And, it said, even if we forked over the money, we needed to sign a confidentiality agreement promising not to tell anyone! In the end, we got a summary from a real estate agent.

It talks about "community" a lot but, in reality, community is an inconvenience to government. And what about democratic governance? What does that mean these days?

Look at the life of the Docklands Co-ordination Committee. It was born out of the emasculation of the more significant Docklands and Major Projects Committee in 2007 and started out meeting six times a year. It wasn't long before this was cut to four times a year.

And the agendas have continued to shrink too. The last meeting of this committee took about 10 minutes. VicUrban's two contributions to this meeting are listed in the minutes as "withdrawn".

A request to VicUrban seeking an explanation of this took two weeks to come back with an answer that an administrative error was responsible for one report not being presented and that it was still discussing the other matter.

The City of Melbourne and VicUrban are both secretive organisations which strive to prevent public scrutiny of their activities. They deny access to their staff and respond using meaningless weasel words.

To be fair, they are not the only ones. Somehow it has become acceptable to deny information to the public. Twenty five years ago in a former life, I was town hall reporter for the Sun News-Pictorial. In those times, the media was welcome at the town hall, had its own press office and had a desk within the council chamber. If you wanted to know something, you just asked the town clerk.

Back then it was accepted that public scrutiny was a healthy part of a democratic society.

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Soccer fans adopt Docklands

Sydney FC soccer fans liked drinking at Docklands' Watermark Bar before the A-League grand final on March 20 so much that they say they'll be back.

Under a heavy police presence, hundreds of excited fans descended on Victoria Harbour for several hours before the game.

A contingent of para-military police confronted a large group of Sydney fans on the corner of Bourke St and Harbour Esplanade several hours before the game started. The police then shadowed the chanting group to Watermark Bar where festivities continued until about 6pm when they were escorted to Ethihad Stadium for the game.

Police say their response was appropriate and that they assess every event on gathered intelligence, which includes social media internet sites. Melbourne and Sydney fans have clashed on previous occasions.

The person who claims to have "discovered" Watermark Bar on behalf of the Sydney fans, Shane Porter, said the large police presence was to protect his group from vicious Melbourne supporters.

Mr Porter said on previous match days, Sydney fans had gathered at hotels in the CBD but they were too small. He said Watermark Bar was ideal as it offered space for 1000 fans and was very close to the ground.

He said its location made it less likely that Sydney fans would be "ambushed" on the way to the stadium. "There's no opportunity for them to hide in ambush," he said.

Mr Porter said Victoria Police were more adept at preventing violence between Melbourne and Sydney fans than NSW police. He said rogue Melbourne fans had recently bashed members of his group in Sydney.

Mr Porter said his group of 800 loved the sunny afternoon on the waterfront and was made to feel most welcome.

He said Docklands was too far from the new soccer stadium in Swan St, Richmond, where Melbourne Victory and a new team Melbourne Heart would be soon located.

But he said Sydney fans hoped to return to Watermark Bar for future "blockbuster" games scheduled for Etihad Stadium.

Docklands Community Association president Roger Gardner acknowledged that there was no trouble on grand final day, but said he was concerned about the risk of violence in the future.

"They should drink within the stadium. Alternatively they should split up and go to a

few different bars or change bars each time, Mr Gardner said.

Watermark Bar owner John Ahern said his staff worked closely with police and the Football Federation to ensure there was

Watermark manager Simon Caruso said it was unlikely circumstances would again

produce a Melbourne/Sydney clash of such scale in Docklands.

"It's not something that you'll see at Watermark every Saturday," he said. "It really was a one-off. We're not looking to become any sort of clubhouse."

Mr Caruso estimated the crowd at between 400 and 450.



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Doyle launches new real estate office

Lord Mayor Robert Doyle opened Barry Plant Real Estate's new Docklands office on March 29.

Cr Doyle said he was always delighted to promote businesses in Docklands. He remarked that the new office was directly opposite his favourite Melbourne building, The Gauge

He said the City of Melbourne was seeking more involvement in the second decade of Docklands development and beyond. In particular, he said the council had lots to offer "at the street level at a human scale".

He said it was important to let Docklands

To do this, he said planners needed to have a vision of where the community should be in 15 years and then work back from that.

Barry Plant Real Estate director Daniel Cole told of his journey which started seven years ago with a letter drop at the newly-built Arkley tower in NewQuay which yielded 30 calls from vendors desperate to the serviced.

Mr Cole operated from Port Melbourne but clearly saw Docklands as the natural centre

Five years ago he opened a small office under the Watergate building and 18 months ago started planning the current move.

He reminded guests that Docklands was Melbourne's premier residential address and that it was a "life choice, not a financial

Melbourne Water moving to Docklands

Melbourne Water has committed to locate its new 12,100m² head office facility at 990 LaTrobe St, in the south east corner of Digital Harbour above the link road access to Etihad Stadium.

Digital Harbour Director, David Napier, said: "The proposed \$85 million single tenant, purpose built building will provide a 6 Star Green Star outcome for Melbourne Water placing them at the forefront of sustainable office accommodation in the Australian commercial office market."

Large 2,000m² floor plates, with a series of open, interconnecting, atrium spaces linking the six upper levels of the building will provide the opportunity for enhanced collaboration between the various

departments of the Melbourne Water organisation. The orientation of the atrium spaces will also provide magnificent uninterrupted views of the Melbourne city skyline.

Mr Napier said: "The convenient location of the building fronting both LaTrobe Street and Wurndjeri Way will provide quick and convenient access for Melbourne Water engineers to all of their suburban treatment plant facilities via Melbourne's extensive freeway network."

The proposed Melbourne Water development will be the fourth building to be constructed at Digital Harbour alongside the Innovation Building, 1010 LaTrobe Street (Customs House) and the Life.lab strata office/home office building at 198 Harbour Esplanade.

Construction of the Melbourne Water building is scheduled to commence in the third quarter 2010 with completion mid 2012.



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Yarra's Edge residents may lose their views

Yarra's Edge residents could lose their upstream city views with the State Government refusing to rule out high-rise developments as part of its plans to redevelop North Wharf.

The Department of Treasury and Finance quietly last month called for registrations of interest (RoI) on the 1.24-hectare site that sits opposite South Wharf and in between the Mission to Seafarers on Wurundjeri Way and Siddeley St.

Since calling for RoI, the Government has remained coy about the possible uses for the land.

The City of Melbourne, in conjunction with VicUrban, the Department of Planning and Parks Victoria, has released suggestions for the area which include community, arts and cultural facilities.

It is understood that the City of Melbourne favours an "indoor park" use for the historic Shed 5. This would involve removing the asbestos roof of the building and greening the interior.

It is understood that the Government commissioned the council to suggest and define appropriate development for the site which has not been subject to normal planning scheme requirements.

However, it is suggested in the Government's RoI documents that the area could be rezoned from a "public park and recreation zone" to "capital city zone".

Public affairs manager for the Department of Treasury and Finance, Helen Ward, said nothing was being ruled out, including highrise developments.

"This is just the first stage. It's really just a brain-storming session," Ms Ward said.

Ms Ward said all submissions from developers would be assessed on the basis of impact and economic grounds.

The land, which contains a heritagelisted crane that is attached to a historic warehouse, contains 230 metres of prime Yarra River frontage.

Estate agency, Knight Frank, on behalf of the Government, will be accepting registrations of interest on the parcel of crown land until April 14.

Following its assessment of the proposals, the Government will then call for formal expressions of interest, though only parties who have originally submitted a registration of interest will be invited to participate.

The call for registrations of interest has brought an element of relief to the Mission to Seafarers organisation which has been under a threat of government "redevelopment".

The mission is relieved that it's heritagelisted premises was not also included in the RoI process.

The mission is understood to be working with the nearby World Trade Centre on a commercial model which would demonstrate to the Treasury and Finance Department that the mission can adequately look after the building.

Ultimately, the mission is seeking freehold possession of its site.


Ms Cramp said the children, as well as adults, were entertained and enthralled by Sparkle the Fairy who sang songs and performed magic.

Platform 28 gets licence for 560

Having received a planning permit controversially last October, the Platform 28 tavern in the Goods Shed North in Bourke St has now been granted a liquor licence.

After originally applying for a licence for 750 patrons, the venue was late last month granted an on-premises licence for 560.

A spokesperson for its developer Equiset said it had not yet read the liquor licence conditions and, therefore, could not determine when the venue would open.

The president of the Docklands Community Association, Roger Gardner, said he was pleased with noise limitations put on external areas but said patron numbers for the entire venue were still too high.

"It's good that the number of patrons has been cut back, but it's still a hell of a lot of people," he said.

On the other end of the spectrum, the NewQuay premises that were to be occupied by the proposed Uber Bar and Lounge has been put up for lease.

Sallypen Pty Ltd lodged an application for a general liquor licence in late November for a bar to be located at 29 St Mangos Lane.

Chris Ellis applied for the bar to open from 10am-1am, Monday-Saturday and 10am-11pm on Sunday.

Residents, police and City of Melbourne had objected to the application. It is understood that Mr Ellis no longer wishes to pursue the licence. Mr Ellis was contacted, but failed to return the calls.

The Platform 28 ruling means that the venue will be able to host 90 patrons on its ground floor external area and 190 on its first floor external area. It will not be allowed live or amplified music in its external areas at anytime, however it will be allowed background music until 10pm daily.

Trading on Friday and Saturday nights will cease at midnight in the external areas, but will be allowed to continue within the remainder of the premises until 1am.

Stricter opening hours have been granted for Monday to Thursday and Sunday, with trading in external areas to cease at 11pm and all trading to cease at midnight.

It has also been granted permission to operate on Good Friday and Anzac Day from 12noon till 11pm in its external areas and till midnight in the remainder of the premises.







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Reprieve for tourist shuttle

The Melbourne Tourist Shuttle has escaped the City of Melbourne's razor for now while council officers investigate alternative funding sources for the service.

Councillors on March 9 voted to extend the contract to run the four-bus service until June 30 next year. And it wants a report back by August 31 on how much money can be raised via advertising on bus stops as well as inside and outside the buses.

Lord Mayor Robert Doyle believes businesses which benefit from the bus should contribute to its \$1.4 million annual operating costs. Other councillors believe the bus should be viewed more generally as improving the visitor experience to Melbourne as a whole.

Cr Kevin Louey says businesses pay 70 per cent of the city's rate revenue and it would be reasonable to fund the tourist shuttle service in return.

Docklands Chamber of Commerce President Keith Rankin addressed the Future Melbourne Committee meeting on March 9. He was backed by at least 45 written submissions from Docklands businesses (out of a total of 59 items of correspondence).

Mr Rankin said he acknowledged that the service ought to show actual benefit for the money invested and he urged Docklands businesses to help find alternative funding options. But he also said it was unreasonable to expect individual businesses to pay for services which returned benefit to the general community.

"It's like putting up Christmas decorations," he said.
"If there is a need for it, then it is reasonable for everyone to pay for it via rates and taxes."

"If they want to close down things that are available to people for no charge, then they should close down the parks. It's the same principle," he said.

The *Docklands News* March online survey unanimously supported the retention of the tourist shuttle.

Among comments received were:

- Removal would be devastating to the precinct and Docklands;
- This is a valuable service which brings much needed patronage and exposure to the area. For Docklands in particular, the area needs all the support it can get as it is still struggling as a sustainable commercial district;
- I believe it's a great service. I meet many tourists coming to shop. They seem very happy to spend because they have saved money on transport; and
- Definitely should continue. Visitors love the service as it's an informative and comfortable experience. The tourist shuttle is more highly-regarded by tourists than the City Circle Tram (which is over-run with locals taking a free ride).

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Docklands doesn't weather the storm

Though most residents escaped the deluge of the March 6 storm, not all property in Docklands was left unscathed with Southern Cross Station, Spencer St Shops, Etihad Stadium, some penthouses and Aqua Vista all reporting damage.

Suffering severe damage to all its skylights, the bill to repair Southern Cross Station's ceiling is likely to cost between \$2 -\$5 million.

The station's chief executive, Phillip Walker, said the skylights, which gave way due to the rain and hail, were his main concern.

"We have damage to the skylights and we'll have to order in new ones from Europe and then it could take three months for them to be fully fitted," Mr Walker said.

Other damage to the station included flooding to the escalators and lifts. However, Mr Walker said this damage was only minor.

Spencer St Shops also suffered water damage throughout the complex and staff and employees were evacuated during the storm.

"The safety of customers and centre employees is our priority at any time. There was interruption to lighting and services, and the floors were very wet," centre manager Lynden Courtney said.

Ms Courtney said the water damage meant that some plaster ceilings had to be replaced and some repairs were needed on the roof and gutters.

"Retailers and contractors worked very hard under extraordinary circumstances in the clean up process and to re-open the centre as quickly as possible. It was an outstanding effort," she said.

Etihad Stadium didn't escape the damage either with the Livewire area being the most brutally hit.

Stadium communications manager Bill Lane said the build up of hail on the Livewire roof caused significant damage.

"The weight of the hail caused some of the roofing to give way and it subsequently led to significant damage in some other parts of the stadium," Mr Lane said.

Mr Lane said the damage had not impacted upon the number of patrons attending events. But he apologised for the inconvenience that patrons may have experienced in the provision of food and beverages.

According to Mr Lane, it will take some months to rebuild the Livewire area.

"It is difficult to put a completion date on the refurbishment. We don't want to promise something and then fall short," he said.

It is unknown at this stage how much the damage bill for Etihad Stadium is likely to climb to, but it is expected to be in the millions of dollars.

"It is difficult to put a cost on the damage but our CEO recently told a 3AW audience, it would be to the tune of millions of dollars," Mr Lane said.

The Aqua Vista building in NewQuay also suffered significant damage with its building manager Michael Neugent reporting that some floors of the building had been flooded.

"Carpet has been damaged in the Aqua Vista building and it still hasn't been replaced, but the leaks have been fixed," Mr Neugent said.

Mr Neugent, who also managers the Condor, said the Condor had experienced moderate damage to its commercial lots.

All Docklands building managers were contacted for this story.





About 100 Myer employees pioneered the giant retailer's head office move to Docklands last month.

The new office comprises 10 levels of large, flexible floorplates of nearly 3000 square metres. The project will also feature approximately 850 square metres of ground floor retail shops and three car park levels.

Myer will occupy the entire 28,000 square metre office component of the A-grade building, which will also house large outdoor terraces, a sundeck and a childcare facility.

Mission to Seafarers joins fight against depression

Docklands' Mission To Seafarers has joined forces with four other maritime-related organisations to help combat depression in seafarers.

The mission has united with the Melbourne Port Welfare Association, BeyondBlue, the Rotary Club of Melbourne South and the Stella Maris Seafarers' Centre to provide crucial information.

About 60,000 seafarers visit Melbourne each year and the organisations hope this information will help them to identify depressed seafarers so they can provide them with the necessary assistance.

Professional ship visitors from both seafarer centres will distribute leaflets and booklets in English, Chinese and Russian, which are the three most common languages spoken by visiting seafarers.

The information contained in the printed material will include a checklist to help determine if someone appears depressed,

guidance on how help a person with depression, information on understanding depression, emergency hotline numbers and telephone numbers for information.

The program, which is titled The Mental Health of Seafarers, is a reaction to an investigation conducted in 2008 by the Rotary Club of Melbourne South.

The investigation found that seafarers were more likely to suffer from mental illness than their land-based counterparts.

The Rotary Club of Melbourne South and Rotary District 9800 (71 clubs in and around

Melbourne) and others have allocated \$15,000 to cover printing costs for the first year of the project.

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








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Not just another evening ...

Alma Doepel inspires Docklands' greatest love story

Have you ever seen the big blue/silvery looking boat docked at the end of Central Pier? Well don't bother looking out your window now because unfortunately it last month left for Tasmania.

But even if you have seen Platinum, you're probably not aware that it holds possibly one of Docklands' greatest love stories.

When researching this story I had planned for it to be an inspirational story about Matt McDonald who, at the young age of 29, had already secured the dream job of captaining a super yacht. But after only 10 minutes onboard Platinum all that changed after learning that Captain Matt had met his wife, Alena Schoner, in Docklands 15 years ago.

At just 14 years of age, both Matt and Alena, began journeying down to the deserted Docklands after becoming involved in a youth sailing program run on the Alma Doepel.

"I met my wife, Alena, working on the boat. We both use to leave school and catch the train to Spencer St and then jump through a few holes in the fences and go along NewQuay to get to the shed. At that stage I think Victoria Harbour was still a car container shipment. That was 14-15 years ago now," Matt said.

The Alma Doepel, which is currently being restored in Docklands, provided the perfect nest, with its youth sailing training program, for these two love birds to fall in love.

"The Alma used to run a youth sailing training program for 15-18 year olds and we were lucky to be accepted at 14."

Matt said the program used to take trainees out on a nine-day voyage and then those trainees would come back as "leading hands" and help out on the next voyage with a new round of kids.

"I did about eight or 10 journeys. It's a shame that kids don't have that opportunity anymore. I've never seen it done the way Alma or similar ships did it. It was a pretty amazing experience," Matt said.

Matt and Alena, who have dated on-and-off since they were about 16, continued to work alongside each other until the ship stopped sailing.

"I was about 17 or 18 when it stopped sailing and that was back in 1999. Then there was the 'save our ship campaign' and I was the spokesperson for that, but it didn't raise much money," Matt said

The campaign finished just as Matt finished school, so he decided to take a year off and complete a diving course before venturing to university to study marine biology and

teaching. Matt then became a high school teacher in biology and outdoor education, while Alena became a nurse and mid-wife.

Having already given up teaching, Matt was driving charter boats in Docklands when he was approached to captain the Platinum.

"If I didn't go on the Alma I wouldn't be sailing now. It's because I started so young, that's why I'm so young to be captaining now," he said.

Matt and Alena, who have been married for three years, now work alongside each other on Platinum with Matt as the captain and Alena as its chief stewardess.

Platinum is currently up for sale and there has been interest from overseas buyers, so there is a good chance that this Docklands love story may soon find itself crossing the Pacific.

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Docklanders dig deep daily

Through a City of Melbourne initiative to increase recycling and reduce landfill, Docklands residents have now donated more than 30,000 kg of goods to St Vincent de Paul.

The project, which has seen charity bins being placed in 13 Docklands apartment blocks, started as a trial with five apartments in November, 2008.

The City of Melbourne's Future Melbourne (Eco-City) Committee Chair, Cr Cathy Oke, said the amount of goods donated had been a significant result for St Vincent de Paul and for the environment.

"It is amazing that in just over a year, Docklands residents have collected a total of 31,200 kgs of clothing and household goods that would otherwise end up in landfill," Cr Oke said.

"Congratulations to the residents, building managers and St Vincent de Paul for such a significant reduction in waste to landfill," she said.

Yarra's Edge Tower 5 building manager John Beany said he was particularly happy that, due to the bins, clothing no longer went down the garbage chute.

Mr Beany said residents in his building had responsed excellently to the initiative. "Tower 5 puts out one full charity bin almost every week for collection," he said.

St Vincent de Paul state manager Tony Thornton said that the charity was really pleased with the quality of goods that were being donated, which were then sold or used in welfare work.

"We're delighted to be in this unique partnership with the City of Melbourne that helps them achieve their recycling aims and us to continue to provide welfare to disadvantaged Victorians," Mr Thornton said.

The remaining Docklands apartment buildings without the charity containers should receive the bins in the next few months as part of the roll-out of the project.

Docklanders are the first residents in Melbourne to receive the charity bins, however St Vincent de Paul hopes to extend the program to other city locations.

No outcome on Serrata

The State Government is still considering Lend Lease's Serrata application to build a 16-storey mixed use development in Bourke St, Victoria Harbour.

Mosaic and Montage residents are angry and say when they bought they were told that the neighbouring development would be far more modest.

Lord Mayor Robert Doyle has bought into the issue saying he would prefer the site remained open space and suggested Lend Lease and the City of Melbourne could swap some land to allow this to happen.

Lend Lease won't comment on the issue.



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

Medici

It breaks my heart to say it but there is no doubt about it. Docklands crumbles under pressure.

It's an unfortunate irony that a place filled with such large-scale places and built for large events, is still hosting so few of them that it struggles to respond adequately when one actually comes along. That just when it needs to shine the most - when thousands of potential first-time visitors are flooding in - it freezes up like an unsophisticated teenager who's got all the right clothes, but can't quite work out how to carry them off.

Take the recent George Michael concert for example. A beautiful and balmy late summer's evening and Docklands should have been sparkling. Unfortunately, the sweat and tears from a hundred frazzled restaurateurs somewhat dampened the shine.

I'd done the right thing and tried to book a table at The Woolshed, only to be told they weren't taking bookings but we'd have no problem ordering at the bar.

On arrival we found the place is complete disarray with queues stretching for miles and word circulating that once you hit the front, you'd be told it was the drinks queue and be sent elsewhere to line up for food. A polite question to the manager as to which queue to join was met with a terse response - they were no longer taking orders, with more than 350 meals backed up. As though it was my fault.

Granted, he was sweeping up a broken glass at the time and clearly flustered by the crowd but come on Woolshed - isn't this why you fought so long and hard to open?

Next we tried Va Bene - also full, but coping slightly better, with a waiter stationed at the door informing people there were no tables and no take-away orders being taken for at least 30 minutes. At least we knew where we stood.

Moving over to NewQuay we tried Achelya, thinking cheap Turkish located a step back from the water may have been overlooked by the crowds. There were empty tables but clearly more full than normal, with a harried manager shouting out from the kitchen, "No more! No more!"

Next, The Lounge. We went straight to the front desk where we were met with an apologetic smile and shake of the head.

Hungry, but worse - sober - we moved on. How could one be in such a predicament in the heart of Docklands?

And then we saw him (is he ever not there?), moving faster than we'd ever seen, seating customers, bringing out meals, still smiling, still charming. I'm talking of course, of Lee Moussi of Café Medici. It looked full to overflowing but still, we were ushered to a table which he cleared himself and instead of "No more! No more" he cried "No trouble! No trouble!"

This week's column is dedicated to Medici - an old Docklands staple many of us have no doubt grown to love due to its reliability, longevity and lovely Italian owner whom, on quieter days, can be found out front drinking coffee with acquaintances, evoking a calming air of old Italy.

Marketing itself as "family friendly and affordable", it's not the sleekest joint on the block and others may serve finer food but, on this occasion, Medici proved it was a cut above - offering something the majority

weren't and I'm not just talking about a table - I'm talking about grace under pressure.

Our food appeared out of order but the drinks arrived quickly which was clearly the priority. A trio of dips - basic but substantial, a gourmet pizza, slightly oily but good, chunky toppings of salami, fetta, fresh tomato and capsicum. And an entre of chilli scallops in a pernod, leek and cream sauce boasting a surprising number of scallops and while sounding almost exotic, was actually very comforting with lots of sauce left over to be mopped up with the bread.

Yes, it's family friendly, affordable and may lack the pizzazz of others nearby. But it's learnt how to deal with crowds and could teach the others, particularly the newcomers, a vital thing or two. For if we can't perform when we're on show - who's going to bother coming back?

"We were off to Perth that weekend so we weren't expecting to buy one, but she was so cute and she was the last girl left, Kaitlyn said.



DODO DIARY

(Defend Our Docklands... Or)



Despite further questioning, the State Government is maintaining its policy of not ruling in or out a low rail bridge in front of the Bolte Bridge connecting its Webb and Dynon port facilities.

Docklands-based Channel 7 questioned the State Government last month on its intentions to build the bridge, which is planned to be only eight metres above

Port of Melbourne CEO Stephen Bradford told reporter Norm Beaman that nothing would happen regarding the rail link within the next 10 years.

And Roads Minister Tim Pallas's chief of staff has told Defend our Docklands ... or (DODO) convenor Michael Lindell that should the Government decide to develop an initial stage of Webb Dock, a rail link would not be necessary.

In a letter to Mr Lindell, Cressida Wall said:

"If an initial development at Webb Dock were to be approved, there is considered to be sufficient capacity in the road network to accommodate a new terminal of this scale."

The initial development aims to handle

up to one million twenty-foot equivalent units (TEUs).

The Government's current port policy document Future Ports, says the one million TEUs would handle expected growth until 2020.

Mr Lindell said the Government was still silent on what would happen beyond 2020. He said port documents had stated potential demand of 8 million containers by 2035.

Ms Wall concluded her letter to Mr Lindell with: "Port Futures notes that the existing planning reservation for the Webb Dock Rail Link will be maintained. Future consideration of the rail link will depend on determination of the role of Webb Dock in meeting the state's longer term container capacity requirements."



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

What a difference a year makes

Last year Peter Bethune was in Docklands showing off Earthrace, the "coolest boat in the world" (pictured below).

This year Mr Bethune is under arrest in Japan and his boat is at the bottom of the Southern Ocean.

Mr Bethune was detained after he boarded the Japanese whaler Shonan Maru 2 in January to present its captain with a \$3million compensation bill for sinking his boat.

The Shonan Maru 2 collided with and cut the bow off Mr Bethune's boat during an anti-whaling protest in January.

Mr Bethune was held onboard the Shonan Maru and taken back to Japan where he was arrested and charged with trespass by the Japanese Coast Guard as the ship docked in Tokyo on March 12.

Earthrace held the record for the fastest circumnavigation of the world by a motorboat, a feat he achieved in 61 days in 2008.

Since leaving Docklands, Mr Bethune joined the Sea Shepherd Conservation Society's anti-whaling campaign.

He changed the name of the boat to Ady Gil, a US-based sponsor, and repainted the craft "stealth" black. The fully-submersible wave piercing trimaran was also fitted with 4-8 layers of Kevlar to protect against ice.



But the boat was no match for a direct hit by the Shonan Maru on January 6 and capsized the following day during an attempt to tow the stricken craft to Antarctica.

During the days before the collision, the Ady Gil harassed Japanese whaling vessels during their hunt. The crew towed ropes in an attempt to foul the propellers of the Japanese ships, pointed laser dazzlers at the crew of the Shonan Maru and used a projectile launcher to fire capsules of foul-smelling butyric acid.

At the time of going to press, Mr Bethune's fate was unknown.



As written by the Federal Member for Melbourne Lindsay Tanner, in an "Ode to Melbourne" published in the Sydney Morning Herald on March 17, 2010

"The interesting question mark is Docklands. With plenty of upmarket apartments and iconic corporate offices, it should evolve into a vibrant hub of activity. Don't forget that the presentation by VicUrban to members detailing the planned redevelopment of Harbour Esplanade will take place at 7.15pm on Thursday, April 8 in the Arkley resident lounge.

We have always held group meetings and functions at The Hub community centre and were surprised to learn that it is booked out at night for the rest of the year, although it is hardly a surprise really seeing it is so small and demand obviously keeps increasing.

We understand it was originally put there by VicUrban as a temporary centre but they have yet to provide a larger one as a result of which we are left out in the cold. Where are we going to hold our AGM? We don't like the idea of paying a lot of money to use a private facility. We complained to VicUrban in mid-March asking them if they can do something to assist but no response yet.

Whilst on the subject of The Hub, as with other areas of Docklands, there is a severe lack of parking there. There is no off street parking for the people including mothers with children who attend there. We have suggested to council that they convert two no-standing recessed bays off Waterview Walk to parking but we're told it's no standing (for no good reason except, of course, the revenue from \$117 fines) and that's that. Not the least bit helpful. We have requested the matter be reviewed.

Council has advised it is going to put up no motorbike signs on the NewQuay Promenade at last which will please residents.

We had made a request to the Department of Transport on behalf of Yarra's Edge commuters to the city that a shelter be provided at the tram stop at the turn into Flinders St. They replied that this was not part of their plan, despite a helpful push from Bronwyn Pike's office.

We have yet to be notified when objections, of which there are a number, will be heard regarding the liquor licence application for a bar in St Mangos Lane.

The DCA website development is underway with a design firm and should be ready within a month.

I had the pleasure of being guest speaker at the March meeting of the Docklands branch of Rotary, at which I explained our activities and avenues for liaison were discussed.

NEW ERA IN CYCLING RETAILING

Cycling legend John Trevorrow has raised the stakes in cycling retailing with his move to Docklands last month.

The multiple Sun Tour winner and Olympic cyclist has joined forces with the Degani Bakery Café organisation to produce Team Degani, a hybrid café bicycle store.

While cafes in bike shops are not a new concept, Mr Trevorrow explains that they have always been a bit of an add on. Degani, on the other hand, is a real café with a full menu and even a liquor licence.

And café element is only part of the story. Mr Trevorrow is building a miniature institute of sport along the river-side under the ANZ Centre. Apart from a massive bicycle workshop, there are athlete conditioning and testing facilities and various levels of sports administration.

Mr Trevorrow is already fully immersed in cycling event organisation, with Amy's Ride (Amy Gillett Foundation), the Otway Classic and the Jayco Cycling Classic among his legacy.

He closed his cycling store in Geelong to bring Team Degani to Docklands.

Mr Trevorrow jokes that his new store is probably the only one in Australia without a road frontage. But with 6500 ANZ employees working above him upstairs and 1000 Myer employees poised to move any day now, he feels well positioned.

"We've got no doubt this is a major challenge because of our location," he said. "But we just have to get the word out there."

He said it had to be recognised that times had changed. "Constructing a building like the ANZ Centre with virtually no car parking



would have been unheard of only a few years ago," he said.

"People have woken up that cars and traffic congestion are a problem and that bicycles are part of the solution."

Team Degani sells Avanti and Specialised and its own-branded bicycles. Team Degani bikes are a budget end of the market offering.

Mr Trevorrow said Team Degani bikes would typically be about \$1000 less than a established brand equivalent. For example, a Shimano-equipment, full carbon Team Degani bike retails at about \$1800.

From the Institute

We note the interesting disclosure by NASA that the earthquake in Chile caused a shift in the earth's axis enough to shorten the day by 1.26 microseconds.

In the light of this celestial consideration of rotation and time, it is appropriate to disclose that Docklands is to have a crucial part in an experiment upon the effect of daylight saving aimed at better understanding the issue of the cost of electricity as well as the social cost of pollution emissions. It is important to for us to investigate the human contribution to climate change. To do this, we have to establish a baseline for electricity consumption in Australia.

Domestic electricity consumption in our precinct is to be precisely monitored and the results compared with the geographically, demographically and architecturally similar region of Southbank. Docklands is uniquely suitable to be the control group because we have a large proportion of apartments. We are assured that the information will be collected unobtrusively and anonymously from the metering system so absolutely no inconvenience or bother at all will be created by this part of the experiment.

The purpose of daylight saving is to cause an additional hour of sunlight in the evening. Benjamin Franklin was right to expect homes to use less electricity for lighting because the daylight is retained later in the day. Moving an hour of daylight from the early morning to the evening should increase electricity consumption for cooling because demand for cooling is greater in the evening when the home is warmer after the heat of the day. The price Docklands citizens will pay for the privilege of the comparison trial will be a small inconvenience twice a day. When daylight saving ends soon for the rest of Victoria, all Docklands citizens will retain the hour shift in time for the duration of the winter. They will be getting up an hour earlier and retiring an hour earlier than Southbank residents.

Commercial and industrial use of electricity is greatest during the middle of the day so less affected by changes to the timing of daylight. Therefore, offices and business are not required to retain daylight saving time.


This "Good Friday" we will be taking an opportunity to consider the death of Christ and, in the midst of the blood and horror, explore the goodness of God.

Batman was a Docklander

The man generally viewed as Melbourne's founder, John Batman, was one of the earliest Docklanders.

The vessel Black Gold, a 20-metre twin-hulled motor cruiser arrived at Marina YE recently during its circumnavigation of Australia.

On board were owners Allan and Geradine Lear and their two sons Rowan, aged 10, and Jarred, aged 9. They left their home port of Mooloolaba in Queensland in March 2009 and have been travelling ever since.

While travelling Rowan and Jarred do their schooling on the boat. School is in from 8.30am until 3pm daily with their homeschool teacher Myette.

Rowan is in year 5 and thinks the best part about home schooling is not traveling to school so he can sleep in.

Jarred thinks the adventure of seeing crocodiles in the Kimberleys and sometimes going to school on the beach is great. As well, he likes the chance of starting school early some days so that he can finish early and do other things. He also has a passion for making things and an early finish in the classroom allows him to get below into Black Gold's workshop.

Allan and Geradine run their business from the boat whilst cruising with Allan going home every couple of weeks to check on things back at work. Geradine concedes the business doesn't run as well while they are cruising but believes seeing Australia in the manner they are with their boys is well worth the lost revenue. Communications are made possible for the boys' schooling and running their business via satellite phone and email.

Black Gold is three years old and was built in Brisbane. The boat incorporates vegetable oil and engine oil reprocessing technology which provides a working template for their Queensland-based business. Along with it's hi-tech fuel technology, Black Gold is equipped with a jet boat and an amphibious car that has been used on Fraser Island, throughout the Kimberleys and on many remote islands around Australia's coastline.

Allan and Geradine are experienced mariners having spent six years sailing around the world in a 40-foot yacht. They believe this new vessel is more practical for cruising with a family as well it provides the facilities to run their business from.

The boys clearly seemed to be enjoying school with Myette. The day I visited their classroom I asked Rowan what he thought of Melbourne. He couldn't stop talking about that hailstorm we had early in March.

Allan and Geradine feel the best education comes from travel and experiencing new ideas, businesses, cultures and remaining super-curious.

Rowan and Jarred will decide whether mum and dad take six months or a year to get home in Black Gold. But one thing was clear - that everyone on board was enjoying their stay in Melbourne at Marina YE.
