Local facilities: All talk, no action

VicUrban is backing away from previous commitments to community infrastructure in Docklands.

Six years ago VicUrban was proud to say that it required all developers to contribute 5 per cent of their built space to community infrastructure (also called human services).

But today, with practically nothing to show on the ground, VicUrban says it is wrong to talk in terms of percentages.

According to acting general manager for Docklands, Simon Wilson: "The Second Decade of Docklands is about more than just buildings. It's about people."

According to its 2004 timeline, VicUrban and the City of Melbourne should have already delivered a community hub, an aged-care facility, indoor and outdoor recreation facilities and a primary school.

Instead, it has gone back into "consultation mode" and is again asking Docklanders what

Asked specifically about the 5 per cent contribution, VicUrban said it was seeking ideas and opinions: "Upon completion it is expected that the level of community infrastructure within Docklands will reflect the needs of the Docklands community."

VicUrban says that 1,144,983 sqm or 44 per cent of Docklands was completed or under construction as of last December. However it also admits that only 12,000 sqm - or 1 per cent - has so far been dedicated to community infrastructure.

And even then, VicUrban's definition of what constitutes a community facility is questionable. It nominates three projects the Harbour Family and Children's Centre in Victoria Harbour; the National Ice Sports Centre at Waterfront City; and Melbourne City Sports offices on the stadium concourse.

Some 129,853.3 sqm will need to be allocated to facilities if the 5 per cent figure is to be met when Docklands is finished.

With the exception of Lend Lease, Docklands' developers are also ducking for cover when questioned on their commitment to community facilities, with many citing commercial confidentiality as their reason for not responding.

ING Real Estate offered a flat "no comment". MAB said it would have more to say in the new year while Mirvac and PanUrban failed to return numerous calls and emails from Docklands News. Digital Harbour says if it houses a primary school, then that would more than satisfy its obligations.

Lend Lease said in its master plan, it was committed to delivering a civic building at Dock Square, an amphitheatre, a community boating hub, parks and promenades, as well as potentially a tall ship museum and a 50-metre heated outdoor public pool.

Docklands Community Association president Roger Gardner said he also understood there was a 5 per cent requirement. He said what has been developed so far was completely inadequate.

"It is unacceptable that we do not even have a community hall and that we have to pay restaurants to conduct community meetings," Mr Gardner said.

"We are still waiting on a library which is said to be coming, but who knows when, and we also need recreational facilities," he said.

I am looking at VicUrban's Docklands Second Decade website and I am getting angry.

Why do these people have to make it up? What's wrong with being genuine?

It's October 29, the day after they have released a so-called "shared vision" document, and I am regretting that I have to wait a month for the December edition of the paper to express my views.

I suspect that the state election is a factor. They've probably been leaned on. And aimed at people (read non-local media) who don't really know what is happening down here, it's relatively easy to generate a cheap headline.

VicUrban (with its partner in crime, the City of Melbourne) has gone to a lot of trouble consulting about the "second decade". In fact, they claim to have spoken to nearly 4000 people and, for the sake of the argument, let's say they did (although the facts surrounding this have been previously reported in *Docklands News*).

So why didn't VicUrban listen to the 4000? And why are they lying when they claim that the five BIG ideas they have ended up with were generated via this process?

The ideas are Central Pier; Harbour Esplanade; harbour link; the library; and western park. Let's look at them ...

Central Pier: They had to do something. The current suggestions are a convenient excuse to tell Hatem Saleh's Atlantic Group that it can no longer charge for car parking on Crown Land;

Harbour Esplanade: They can't seriously claim this re-development as a new idea. It's been years in the planning;

Harbour Link: This idea was first publicly aired when Lend Lease revealed its draft master plan for Victoria Harbour on July 15 and has obviously been talked about for some time "inside the tent" before that. It was actually shown by former VicUrban general manager David Young during his Powerpoint introduction to the so-called D2 "consultations". Docklands News asked VicUrban for a copy of its presentation at the time but, when it was sent through, the reference to the bridge and western park were not included. VicUrban explained: "This does not include the slides on the ideas as these have no status and were purely used for workshop discussion."

How curious that both these "ideas" have now been attributed to the "consulted" public. On the second decade website (www. docklandsseconddecade.com) they even include an alleged quotation from one of the 4000 consulted citizens: "I'd like a pedestrian bridge that connects Docklands, creating one big loop around the harbour."

The library: Can they be serious? This was announced and budgeted long before this "consultation" was started; and

Western park: This is similar to the above harbour link "idea" in that it came from within – not the public. It also has been talked about by the insiders for years. In fact, last October the Lord Mayor suggested that this facility become a training ground for the Melbourne Football Club. And what do you know? Melbourne has now expressed its interests on the back of the "consultation". To suggest that a member of the public came up with the concept during the consultation is simply a lie.

In a cynical insult, the D2 website has a heading "Get involved" under the five "ideas" and has links to: Register your interest; Have your say online; and Consultation events.

The prevailing theme on these new "ideas" is that each has three options. It's the options,

not the ideas themselves, that VicUrban now wants to discuss. How convenient. You are going to die ... would you like to be: Electrocuted; Shot; or Hanged?

Would you like your western park: Ecological; Recreational; or Sporty?

Would you like your harbour link: Structural; Floating; or Pivoting?

The fact that VicUrban feels the need to deceive the public is alarming. But it suggests an organisation which has lost its way – which is bereft of a reason for being.

Watch out for other VicUrban ideas coming soon, masked in the sweet-smelling aroma of a D2 consultation. For instance, VicUrban is currently looking at introducing retail into phase two of its Harbour Esplanade redevelopment. If we end up not being able to see the water because of a row of shops, don't be surprised if the justification is "D2".

The whole idea of a "consultation" is noble. After all, we are perhaps the only community in Victoria which is legislatively disenfranchised. We have no say and that's the way it is.

Docklanders are weary from years of being asked what they want. They are tired of answering that they want the same community facilities that other communities have.

They want a place to meet, they want a tennis court, they want parks, they want places to shelter from the wind. An oval would be great, and how about a school?

The problem with Docklands is that we have four levels of government. We have the usual federal, state and local spheres. But we also have VicUrban which is not publicly accountable, which is motivated by generating money for the state and which is holding this community back.


Their work is done here. They should go away – move on – and allow us to get on with things instead of pretending that they still have a role and a purpose.

North Wharf to stay low key

The State Government has selected a sympathetic "local" bid to redevelop North Wharf.

Under the successful bid by a consortium comprising Asset 1 and the World Trade Centre (WTC), Seafarers Park will be retained in full and enhanced.

A real estate agent's prospectus calling for registrations of interest sparked outrage in April when it said the Government was willing to rezone the park from "public park and recreation" to "capital city zone 1" to allow development.

Local MP Bronwyn Pike subsequently assured Flinders Wharf residents that this was not the case, and denied intervening in the process.

The historically-protected Shed 5 and crane will be restored as part of the successful bid and a modest commercial building of 10 to 12 storeys will be built on the land between the shed and Wurundjeri Way.

WTC director Phil Hill said an "ultra-luxe" hotel would also be part of the development.

He said the 40-room hotel would be incorporated into the shed and could sit above the river. Mr Hill said the hotel would set new standards for luxury in Melbourne.

The rest of Shed 5 would most likely have an "epicurean" function, he said.

WTC has separately entered into an agreement with the Mission to Seafarers to establish a building restoration foundation for the heritage-listed charity in Flinders St.

Mr Hill's consortium signed a memorandum of understanding with the State Government in October. But there is a fair way to go before actual plans are revealed.

Mr Hill said the agreement reached with the Government was "high level" and research and design would continue until early 2011 when a proposal would be ready for public comment. He declined to say what he offered to pay for the long-term leasehold.

He said it was unlikely that work would start within the next two years and it was likely to be a further two years before completion.

It is understood that the WTC bid beat more robust proposals for residential towers.

"Ours is a mixed use, medium-density bid which we believe is the right blend of uses for the site," Mr Hill said.

Harbour Esplanade closure pain passes

Docklands endured a week of disruption and isolation in November but has emerged with stronger tram services and significantly more potential public space.

Harbour Esplanade reopened to trams and traffic, as scheduled, from the first tram on Saturday, November 20, following a sevenday tram and road shut-down to complete track works and to transfer the tram services to the centre of the road.

Teams of workers toiled non-stop to meet the deadline, transforming Docklands into a hive of activity. VicUrban has thanked all those affected by the closures for their patience and support.

Tram services are now running in the new configuration and four new tram platform stops have been installed between Bourke St and Docklands Drive. The additional length of the platforms will increase capacity at peak times and during special events at the stadium.

The tram realignment and a reduction of traffic to a single lane in each direction also frees up additional recreational space. VicUrban and the City of Melbourne say they are investigating options for temporary uses on parts of this space along the promenade.

The redevelopment will see this public space transformed into a new harbour-side destination, with the first stage scheduled for completion before next July.





Cycling suits mental health

On November 19 about 250 people gathered in Docklands for the first Suit Up and Ride event and raised more than \$50,000 for youth mental health.

The Orygen Youth Health event attracted more than 40 teams from corporations and organisations, which took to Melbourne Bikeshare bikes and battled it out along the Waterfront City and NewQuay boulevard.

The event saw teams race along a 2km circuit in their work attire and raised money to fund the Headsmart program which educates

young people in schools across Victoria about the signs of depression.

Bendigo and Adelaide Bank took out the event with the fastest overall time, followed by Credit Suisse.

Australian of the Year Professor Patrick McGorry, former world cycling champion Cadel Evans, Chief Commissioner of Victoria Police Simon Overland, Australian pro-tour cyclists Matt Goss and Wes Sulzberger, Olympian Shane Kelly and sportsmen Brad Hodge and Robbie Kearns also joined in on the fun with a celebrity race.

A group of local fire fighters who recently travelled across the USA to raise money for the 9/11 fire fighters also entered (*pictured*).

Bad bridge ideas keep coming

Docklands' boating community has slammed the idea of a pedestrian bridge across the mouth of Victoria Harbour.

The boaties say that anything that will restrict boat traffic will destroy the very nature of Docklands as a water-based precinct.

The idea is being proposed by VicUrban and the City of Melbourne, who are claiming that it emerged from a recent round of public consultations. VicUrban and the council is asking for opinions on which type of bridge the community would prefer – not whether the bridge is, in fact, a good idea.

The vice-president of the Melbourne Passenger Boating Association, Keith Rankin, said the only bridge that would be acceptable would be one as high as the nearby Bolte Bridge.

"It doesn't matter if it's opening, floating,

pushing, shoving, fixed or whatever, we are vehemently opposed," Mr Rankin said.

"And it's not just a matter of inconvenience to us," he said. "If it's an opening bridge, they have a habit of breaking down. And if it's manned, who is going to man it and what is it going to cost?"

"A shuttle would work just as well. Or if the idea is to transport tourists around, then a rubber-tyred electric train would work well here," Mr Rankin said.

"Many people come up with ideas which appear to have merit at first glance. But many of these ideas fail to take into account the negative impacts that they are imposing."

Lady Cutler skipper Jeff Gordon also supports a ferry service. "It could also take in Central Pier," he said. "They do it in Brisbane and they could do it here too."

Docklands is united in its opposition to a low rail bridge proposed by the Port of Melbourne Corporation. The boat operators say this new idea is just as threatening.

Pike is returned as MP

Local member Bronwyn Pike was returned to Parliament in the November 27 state election.


On two-party preferred figures, Ms Pike won easily in the end with 57.93 per cent compared with 42.07 per cent for Greens candidate Brian Walters. The Liberal Party's decision to preference the Greens last was the deciding factor.

Docklands voted Liberal and was one of only three booths in the district to do so. In East Melbourne, Docklands and Melbourne, the Liberals attracted the most primary votes. Of 940 votes cast in Docklands, 420 went to Liberal candidate Luke Martin, 255 to Ms Pike and 184 to Mr Walters. Interestingly, the Sex Party polled proportionately better in Docklands than anywhere else in the electoral district, picking up 40 votes.

In last month's *Docklands News* online survey, no single issue emerged.

The issues of serviced apartments as well as the Port of Melbourne's proposed low rail bridge received equal top billing – each with 40 per cent of the vote.

Two other issues received 10 per cent of the vote respectively – traffic gridlock and lack of community infrastructure. Only 10 votes were cast in the survey.



The Demons show their hand

Melbourne Football Club has formally expressed its interest in using a proposed Docklands western park as a training facility.

Lord Mayor Robert Doyle first suggested the idea more than a year ago, but it has taken until now for the club to publicly show an interest.

The State Government and the City of Melbourne's positioning of its second decade of Docklands consultation has created a context for the Demons' bid.

A western park is one of five Docklands projects being pursued by VicUrban and the council. Three options have been proposed for the site under the Bolte Bridge: an ecological park, a recreational park, and a sports park. The Demons' interest fits neatly into the third option.

The Government is helping the football club prepare its concepts plans, but the club says costs and project timing are yet to be discussed.

The club has advised that it is "working on a feasibility study for the establishment of an integrated sporting and community centre"

Melbourne has joined with Netball Victoria in its bid and proposes that both organisations become principal tenants of the two-hectare park.

It says it wants to work with the Docklands community and club president Jim Stynes is enthusiastic about the prospect of moving to Docklands.

"Melbourne is committed to building a community base for the residents, workers and visitors to the Docklands. It is our aim for the facility to become a landmark, a unique destination in its own right within the precinct," Mr Stynes said.

"To that end, it is our intention to embark on a community consultation process as we further develop the proposal."

"This facility would provide a fully integrated new home for the 'old' Melbourne moving into the 'new' Melbourne, providing facilities for all levels of the two sports - netball and football - from community, grass-roots levels to elite."

"For the first time in over 40 years, all the club's activities from administration, training to community would be together, and most significantly, in our heartland - the City of Melbourne."

The club has arranged to meet and discuss its plans with the Docklands Community Association, which is yet to form a view.

Association president Roger Gardner said the DCA would canvass its members on all three options before forming an opinion.

Mr Gardner said, however, that initial scrutiny of high-level schematics indicated that once a football ground went into the space, there was very little room left.

More affordable housing

Docklands is to get a third affordable housing project, with the State and Federal Governments announcing 522 apartments at Harbour Town.

The apartments are to be built in four separate towers in "gaps" on the edge of the shopping centre in both Pearl River Rd and Waterfront Way.

The 522 studio, one- and two-bedroom, affordable rental homes are being delivered through the National Rental Affordability Scheme (NRAS).

The Docklands project was announced on November 2 by both Federal Minister Tony Burke and the State Minister for Housing, Richard Wynne.

ING refused to comment when questioned by the *Docklands News*.

The Merchant was opened in Victoria Harbour last December with 57 "affordable" apartments. Docklands' second project is MAB's The Mariner, on the corner of Docklands Drive and Pearl River Rd, where the State and Federal Governments are providing most of the funding for 85 rentals.



Target 3008: Waste not, want not

The foundations for Urban Reforestation's Target 3008 project in Docklands are well underway!

Supported by the Victorian Government Sustainability Fund, Target 3008 aims to put organic waste to use while engaging the community.

The project encourages composting and the growing of plants and produce in Docklands. Composting can easily be done using a Bokashi bucket, which can be bought from Urban Reforestation. This is an easy, clean and smell-free way of composting within limited available space – ideal for apartments! This process will lead to reducing the amount of organic waste sent to landfill.

Waste audits are already well underway in Docklands' apartment buildings. The audits entail sorting waste into categories such as organic, plastics, metals etc, and then weighing and measuring each type.

Some surprises were found in the Dock 5 apartment building waste. The audit team encountered a lot of meat waste and, alarmingly, a bag of potting mix. However, on the whole, Urban Reforestation said it was impressed by the level of organisation of the building and the involvement of the residents in the project to date.

On the same day as these audits were occurring, Urban Reforestation's community garden was installing a series of new planter boxes. Once sorted, waste from the building was emptied into the new planter boxes that were being filled with hay, compost and soil. At this point, the organic waste stopped being a "waste", and started being useful again.







Welcome for anti-whalers

The Sea Shepherd's antiwhaling vessel, Bob Barker, and its crew spent some time in **Docklands during November** as the anti-whaling activists prepared for their next battle in the Southern Ocean.

The 52-metre vessel, named after American television personality Bob Barker, who made a \$5 million contribution to the organisation, was on display to the public in Docklands for a few weeks to raise awareness.

Ship manager Andrea Gordon said the vessel held two open days over a weekend and some tours during the weekdays.

"It's really important to get the message out there about what we do because whaling is everyone's problem," Ms Gordon said.

State Parliamentarian Nathan Murphy was instrumental in bringing the Bob Barker to Docklands and Melbourne City Council provided berthing free of charge.

Ms Gordon said the crew loved coming to Melbourne, which it found very supportive.

With the vessel's crew ranging in age from 19-60, their stint in Melbourne also allowed for local crew members to catch-up with family and friends.

Ms Gordon said that some crew, including the captain, had young families and she believed it was a strong motivation for crew members to join the fight

"I think they're doing it for their kids because they realise that if they don't do something, then there won't be any (whales) left."

Ms Gordon said the current population of whales was the bare minimum number required to replenish the whale population worldwide and that was why they couldn't let the population deplete any further.

A former public defender from New York City, Ms Gordon said there was a striking similarity between her job as a lawyer and her current fight against whaling ships.

"In both situations you're dealing with the law. In this situation we are enforcing the moratorium on commercial whaling that was enacted by the International Whaling Commission in 1986."

The Bob Barker has now joined two other Sea Shepherd vessels in the Southern Ocean for the three-month whaling season.

Fireworks as usual

Following debate earlier in the year over whether Docklands would host a 9:15pm family fireworks session on New Year's Eve, Melbourne City Council has confirmed the details of this year's program.


Chair of the Future Melbourne (Connected City) Committee and cochair of the Docklands Co-ordination Committee, Cr Kevin Louey, said the 9.15pm fireworks show would run for eight minutes and the midnight fireworks spectacular would run for 10 minutes.

"The 9.15pm family fireworks will be launched from a barge in Victoria Harbour and a midnight spectacular fireworks show will be launched from both the barge in Victoria Harbour and the rooftops of buildings from the CBD to Docklands to welcome the New Year," Cr Louey said.





Still no licensing decisions

The Liquor Licensing Commission says it is close to decisions on two contested applications in Docklands.

And a third Docklands application will be referred to an independent panel following resident objections.

A licensing spokesperson said: "The panel reports for Uber Lounge and Woolshed Pub have been submitted to the Director of Liquor Licensing. A decision will be made in the near future."

"On 28 August 2010, an application was received for an on-premises liquor licence for a venue to trade as Docked. They have requested to trade until 11pm."

"The director has received objections concerning this application and will refer eligible objections to an independent panel."

Docked is located on the stadium concourse on the northern side of the Victoria Point building overlooking Harbour Esplanade.

Owner, NewQuay personal trainer, Dom Anthony wants to create a relaxed tapas bar feel. He said residents had nothing to fear from the bar which he said would be a welcome addition to the Docklands scene.

Residents fight on


Montage and Mosaic residents say they have not given up their campaign against the Serrata development, despite the project now being underway.

Spokesperson Frank Ruggiero says the residents are now concentrating their efforts on preserving the remaining land bounded by Bourke St and Geographe St. He said residents were also still considering a damages suit against Lend Lease for what they say were misleading claims about what was to be built on the Serrata site.

"The residents' campaign has not concluded even though construction has commenced," Mr Ruggiero said. "Part of our strategy was to preserve the remaining land adjacent to the Serrata site."

"Residents have obtained legal advice that supports and recommends legal action for misleading and deceptive conduct and are currently considering that advice."

"Regardless of what action the residents elect to adopt, the campaign to preserve the park will continue and we hope that common sense and goodwill by Lend Lease will prevail. It is not too late for Lend Lease to preserve the remaining land given that it does not have permits for any construction."



The episode, which is set to air early next year will feature Ruyton Girls School student Dana who will pull a prank on her friend and fellow classmate Jasmine.



Serving both God and the Demons

Football may long have been called the religion of Victorians and the MCG and Etihad Stadium, a place of worship ... but you probably wouldn't know that in amongst it all there are some very dedicated chaplains and one of them is working amongst us here in Docklands.

Meet Etihad Stadium-based chaplain Cameron Butler who, since 2003, has been serving the sporting community as the CEO of Sports Chaplaincy Australia and is also the chaplain for the Melbourne Football Club.

Cameron joined Sports Chaplaincy Australia, the leading organisation for providing chaplains to high-performance, development and local sports organisations, in the 1990s and has never looked back.

After becoming ordained in 1990 and taking up the role of a local church pastor, Cameron started to look for a change in the mid 1990s. But it wasn't till 1997 that he took up his role at the Demons after receiving a phone call about sports chaplaincy.



"It was a great offer which meant I could fulfil my two loves in life – serving God and sport. It's just ironic that I'm the chaplain to the Demons," Cameron said.

Working in IT and volunteering as a sports chaplain for about 8 hours a week, the father of four quickly grew to realise how indemand sports chaplains were.

When I started, there was a little bit of resistance from players because a chaplain was a new thing and some had the attitude of why would they need a chaplain – and it also made me ask myself why was I there. But it didn't take long for them to start knocking at my door," Cameron said.

Looking back at the first time that he was introduced to the club in 1997, Cameron smiles and laughs about how far he and the club have come.

"On my first day when I was introduced to the players the majority were quite welcoming and, on their way out, they all shook my hand except for one player who grunted and walked away," he said.

Cameron recalled how that player went on to live out his football career for the next six years never speaking more then a few words to him, then after running into him years later and striking up a conversation, the two became friends and Cameron ended up performing his wedding.

Though little publicity is given to sports chaplaincy, Cameron says it is so important to recognise that elite sportspeople are the same as everyone else and have tragedies in their life as well.

"Elite sportspeople often live out their life through sport and in the media and they tend to be very private people, so there needs to be someone that they can go to in private and talk to about anything whether it be a death, injury, a sick family member or friend, or anything like that," he said.

Cameron said he often found football players tended to need some guidance about two to three years into their career because they tended to get some big identity issues.

"A big problem that many players reach a few years into their career is knowing who they are because they begin to realise that people want to know them for what they do, not who they are and that tends to make many of them become hard and insular," he said.


Though only 10-15 per cent of the 200 sports chaplains in Australia are involved in local sporting organisations, Cameron believes the figure should be closer to 90-95 per cent.

"Sporting clubs are often the heart of a community and they are consistently dealing with substance abuse, car crashes, suicides and deaths and they need a chaplain. It only has to be a dad who may work full-time but can offer his assistance," he said.

Cameron said that all sports chaplains were volunteers and held down full-time jobs and he wanted to encourage others to join Sports Chaplaincy Australia.

"We've made the process of becoming a sports chaplain easier because we need the people to get involved," he said.

A Department of Transport spokeperson said the marine pollution team at the Department of Transport were called to inspect a possible pollution incident at Victoria Harbour.

"An investigation by the marine pollution team determined that debris and other waste from roads and gutters had gathered in the harbour as a result of recent heavy rain, which is a common occurrence in such weather conditions," the spokesperson said.

The spokesperson said that, as a result of the investigation, a small amount of aged diesel fuel was discovered, mixed in with the other waste.

"The marine pollution team took appropriate action to clean up the pollution. The investigation and clean-up took less than two hours," the spokesperson said.

Having won the fight to have the pedestrian and cycle linkage under the Charles Grime Bridge permanently reinstated in August, Yarra's Edge resident Cobien Watts now has another fight on her hands.

Ms Watts (pictured below) says she is furious that she and other Yarra's Edge residents may have to wait until May next year until they finally see the replacement of trees which were pulled out early this year.

"About nine months ago they pulled out all but four of the trees as they had been contaminated by the salinity of water which



had seeped into the soil, and since then none have been replaced," Ms Watt's said.

A spokesperson for the City of Melbourne has said that the replacement trees would not be planted until winter 2011 to ensure that they are given the best chance of survival, but Ms Watts believes the delay may be due to budget.

"It's just hearsay, but I have heard that there may be conflict between the City of Melbourne and VicUrban as to who will pay for the works, which I have heard are likely to cost upwards of \$190,000," Ms Watts said.

A spokesperson for the City of Melbourne said that the council was in discussions with VicUrban to arrange where the works would be funded from, and that it was likely to cost up to \$300,000.

Acting general manager responsible for Docklands Simon Wilson said the City of Melbourne, as municipal authority for Docklands, was responsible for the management of trees within Yarra's Edge, but that VicUrban was investigating the future plans for the trees with the council.

"The arborist team at the City of Melbourne has advised that the optimum planting season for these trees is in the colder months, which enables the trees to be established prior to the onset of harsh summer conditions," Mr Wilson said.

Angry that the replanting of trees has taken longer than she and other residents expected, Ms Watts has suggested that the council put in place a temporary solution.

"I have suggested to council that they place some trees in large tubs around Yarra's Edge to beautify and soften the area and then they can be replanted later so that there's no waste," she said.

Ms Watts said that her suggestion of a temporary solution has been unanswered and that people need to start doing their jobs properly.

"It is inexcusable that we invest lots of money into living here and that we pay exorbitant council rates and they cannot return the area, in reasonable time, to how it was when we purchased our property," she said.

Grand old lady visits Docklands

If you take a walk down to South Wharf over the next few months you will see a grand old piece of history.

But this piece of history isn't on display in the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre, but rather on the water.

The 105-year-old yacht Granuaile is currently docked in the river while it undergoes maintenance on its 50-foot structure.

Built in Dublin in 1905 by James E Doyle, a second-generation boat builder and naval architect (whose designs went on to influence all naval architecture in early modern America), the old girl has an extensive and interesting history.

Regularly raced from New York to London last century, it is believed that she once held the record for the most consecutive trans-Atlantic races contested.

First named Granuaile in 1905, she has carried four different names at different stages before her current owners decided to honour her history and change it back.

The Bermudan cutter, with teak on teak frames, ventured to Australia in 1968 and competed in many more races, including the Sydney to Hobart, before becoming a charter boat.

Purchased two years ago by seasoned yachtsman and principal owner Steve English, who heads a three-person syndicate, the gorgeous girl has since been enjoying some TLC from Steve and his wife Zara as they have undergone restoring her.

"She's just beautiful and has a great pedigree, so structurally she's brilliant and just needed a bit of work on the cosmetics side of things," Steve said.

Spending four months of the year in Melbourne, two months travelling and another four months in Broome, the historical yacht is still well travelled and now, after two years of restoration, she is going to be put out to charter once more.

"She hasn't been chartered since 1996 so people with a love of old wooden boats will get a chance to come on board and will really love her," Steve said.

Steve and Zara will begin to charter her this month and will continue through until the end of January before taking her to Hobart for a wooden boat festival.

CUISINE UNDERCOVER INDEPENDENT DEVIEW FROM POPULANDO DI DINEDI

Platform 28

Poor old Justin Madden can come across as a bit of a bumbling fool at times – all long legs, lankiness and leaked documents. But I reckon he's got balls.

It's not like those well-heeled wowsers of Docklands don't know how to put up a fight. They have all the nice things they need, and now their job is to stop others from having them. Perhaps they fear the better Docklands becomes, the more riff-raff it will attract. Best keep it a half-finished concrete jungle, where everything has to close at five – that way they can enjoy their water views, with their own ilk, in silence.

Platform 28, the new bar/nightclub breathing a bit of life into the otherwise bureaucracy-laden Goods Shed nearly fell foul of this mob, as did another great venue that's made use of an historic space – The Woolshed on Central Pier. But, let me tell you, it is WONDERFUL walking into a venue

with genuine character and real history in Docklands – just as it is in Melbourne proper when stumbling across venues like MOO (the old Money Order Office) or The Trust. It's what Melbourne's known for and often what Docklands is criticised for lacking, in amongst all its big shiny new spaces.

Anyway – the election is over and so is this rant. How about the food, drinks and atmosphere? Look, the venue is fabulous, and frankly, why should bureaucrats be the only one with access to this wonderfully restored building? Exposed beams, brick and pylons, and it's a nice touch to still be able to see the painted "28" on a brick wall.

The menu is very well put together. While I may be always calling for more pubs and associated grub in Docklands, there are a few now doing an exceptional job, so Platform 28's menu couldn't risk being too standard. I think it strikes the right balance between originality and safety – there's enough for the foodies without alienating the footy crowd.

I went with the Dukkah-encrusted barramundi fillet on roquette with olives and a chilli and coriander crème fraiche. The generous and juicy fillet was perfectly coated, providing a crisp and flavoursome crunch which complemented, and not overpowered, the fish. I'm not sure the equally generous serving of plump green olives was entirely necessary, but the crème fraiche was divine.

I would have liked to have tried more, with a delicious selection of starters including Greek lamb meatballs, pork, leek and sage chipolatas and salt and schezuan pepper squid (See? Solid, yet original), but it was a quick visit. The sticky-date pudding and lemon tarts also sadly had to go untasted.

The wine of course, did not, and on a warmish day the Leo Buring Riesling provided the right amount of fresh bite. There's an impressive selection of beers on tap and bottled. The wine list has strong performers – not outstanding, but all quality average-priced wines – largely from SA.

And on a sunny day, lots of happy businesspeople taking advantage of the sheltered alfresco area – enjoying Docklands – and Melbourne – as it was meant to be enjoyed.

We wanted a casual country wedding. We are both fairly relaxed, laid-back people and wanted the wedding to


How did you choose your location?

GREETINGS FROM THE TOUCKLANDS COMMUNITY ocklands

I would like on behalf of the Docklands Community Association committee to wish everybody a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

It has been a very busy year for the DCA. Our Christmas party is coming up on Tuesday, December 7 from 7.30pm at the Harbour Kitchen on Victoria Harbour and we invite you to come along. Given the success of the previous functions, it should be a great night. It can't be washed out like our recent barbecue was last month because it will be under cover in the glass pavilion by the water.

We continue to keep members regularly informed of activities and events such as Hub Happenings by various groups, fun runs and Christmas Carols on December 16. There also will be the Motorcycle Riders Association's annual Toy Run culminating with a show on Central Pier on Sunday, December 12.

We are currently pressing the City of Melbourne to notify and consult with us in advance with respect to proposed promotional and sporting events so that we can ensure that residential interests are catered for. Problems don't often arise but we need that involvement.

VicUrban is doing a good job in keeping us updated on the Harbour Esplanade works which we pass on to members.

We are also requesting that there be greater consultation and provision of information by VicUrban and developers to affected residents on specific building projects. This is so adjoining residents can know in advance things like size of the building, traffic effects, parking effects and time frame.

Until now residents "have been kept in the dark" on specifics "until the last minute" and then given minimal

information. Greater respect needs to be shown to the effect on residents who now form a significant sector in Docklands.

Another current issue is the question of the use of Western Park abutting the Bolte Bridge at the end of Docklands Drive. VicUrban has advertised three options on its website which we will be circulating to members for comment.

In summary they are: firstly a peaceful park, or secondly a recreation area including outdoor courts and playground, or thirdly a formal sports complex.

Under the third category, Melbourne Football Club, in conjunction with Netball Victoria, has proposed an oval, indoor courts and facilities. They propose community-shared use. The MFC is arranging to make a presentation to the DCA committee and we will keep members informed. With so little public open space available, it is important to ensure that community needs are provided for.



"Docklands is still very much in its infancy and it has a huge potential to grow, particularly if the speed within the harbour is changed and a ferry service between Melbourne and Geelong is introduced," he said.

With Pleasure Cruising offering membership to luxury boats and BOAT4hire offering hire boats for one-off use, it seems Gary and his team will have you covered this boating season.

Doubtless the selection panel liked the synergy of drawing on memories from the VFL considering the AFL is now based in

Docklands. However, the attractive multicoloured design also stood out as a positive approach to add colour and character in a new urban park.

So, the next time you walk or cycle past the Docklands Park amenity block, and wonder why it has a strange familiarity, perhaps you'll recall standing in a queue to buy tickets at VFL Park at Waverley some time in the 1980s.
