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It's super baby

Super baby Thomas Mitchell dropped into Docklands to fly the flag on Australia Day.

Two-year-old Thomas from Maidstone arrived on the back of his dad Grant's bike and immediately began exerting his supernatural powers of cuteness.

Docklands hosted a mini Australia Day event on Harbour Esplanade with a fishing experience and pavement chalk art demonstration.

Our shrinking population

Docklands will end up with almost 25 per cent fewer residents by 2020 than was originally envisaged with Places Victoria again revising down its population estimates.

In 2007 VicUrban (which has become Places Victoria) was assuring businesses and investors that Docklands' population would reach 20,000 by 2020 when the suburb would be effectively "built out".

But by 2008, that number was whittled down to 17,000 with both Places Victoria and the City of Melbourne in agreement. This 17,000 by 2020 figure is still reported on the docklands.com (Places Victoria) and the City of Melbourne's website.

But Places Victoria now says that the 17,000 mark won't be achieved until 2025. Its manager for city west Simon Wilson says the 17,000 mark will still be reached but it will take another five years. He said 15,500 people would live in Docklands in 2020.

The downward revision of estimates puts the figure closer to what consultant experts have been saying for years.

In March 2006, when VicUrban was still predicting 20,000 residents by 2020, ID Consulting said Docklands would have just 12,924 people by 2018.

In January last year, ID Consulting was predicting just 12,521 Docklands residents by 2021 – a figure that it has now revised to 13,148. It currently thinks that Docklands' population will be 16,682 by 2031.

In September 2010, Charter Keck Cramer reported in its Docklands Insight that

Docklands would only have a population of 12,260 by 2021.

ID Consulting claims it is better at predicting population figures than either the State Government or the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS).

Forecaster Johnny Barnard told Docklands News that his firm tended to be less "bullish" than development authorities.

"We take a more sober view of what we think will happen than development authorities," Mr Barnard said.

And Mr Barnard disputes that Docklands will be completed by 2025. He says 2031 is a more realistic "build out" date.

"We view what is happening with both supply and demand levels. You have to look at what is happening in terms of competition from Southbank and in the western end of the CBD," he said.

"And Docklands is tricky because there are no absolutes about what will end up as residential and what will become commercial."

ID Consulting has been engaged by the City of Melbourne since 2002 to supply population forecasts to inform future planning decisions.

The council recently used ID Consulting

estimates in its draft open space strategy. In planning for Docklands open space, the document which was released last November says Docklands will have only 14,205 residents by 2026.

In its 2009 Docklands Small Area Economic and Demographic Profile, the council was predicting a Docklands population of 16,000 by 2021.

Places Victoria's docklands.com website currently says: "By 2020, it is expected that 17,000 people will live in this waterfront precinct." The City of Melbourne's website is in alignment, saying: "It is estimated that by around 2020 Docklands will have 20 million visitors each year, a workplace for 40,000 people daily and a residential area for up to 17,000."

The council says it is waiting for the release of the 2011 census before making any further predictions of population growth.

"Council's city research branch will wait for the release of ABS Census 2011 information before undertaking further work regarding population forecasting," a council spokesperson said.

Docklands Chamber of Commerce president Keith Rankin said residential population numbers were not particularly relevant to local businesses.

Rather, he said, visitation numbers were the most significant measure of future business confidence and success.

Here is a new year's resolution for Docklands - "This year we are all going to pull together."

We just have to.

Our brand was battered in 2011. And, in a very real sense, our reputation is our most important asset. It is the basis on which people decide to visit us. And if they stop coming, our local economy withers and dies.

Docklands has a two-speed economy. With so many cranes on the horizon, it is clear that construction here is the standout achiever within the Victorian economy. And yet, on the ground those awful lock-out notes that landlords stick inside the glass of failed small businesses are multiplying like in a bad dream.

All our small businesses want the same thing. We all need visitors. Docklands is a tourism-based economy.

So if we all want the same thing, why are we fragmented and inconsistent in our thoughts and actions?

Our chamber of commerce does an excellent job with the resources available to it. And Destination Docklands also punches above its weight, considering the meagre funds it

But why two organisations if we all want the same thing? Imagine what could be achieved if scarce resources were pooled and shared. We might surprise ourselves.

Docklanders didn't ask for the political structures they find themselves with. We inherited them from the authorities who have done their best to kick-start this new and exciting suburb.

I think the time has come for Docklands to ask for something better - something that gives us an opportunity to work collectively for the common goals that unite us.

As it so happens, the Docklands Coordination Committee is in the process of being reviewed by the City of Melbourne and Places Victoria.

It is being reviewed because it doesn't add enough value. In short, the current structure is a waste of everyone's time.

I can envisage a replacement structure that involves Docklanders deciding Docklands' future. In my imagination I can see decisionmakers being guided by the outcomes of debates about the issues that really matter to the Docklands pioneers who have committed themselves to this suburb.

This new committee will work if the authorities open it up to Docklanders - and not just as spectators as in the previous model, but as respected participants.

The committee could become the forum where the Docklands Chamber of Commerce, Destination Docklands and the **Docklands Community Association finally** come together to learn and share first-hand what others are thinking and doing.

And it could become the precursor to a new organisation which was devised, designed and driven by Docklanders who came together after they realised that working in isolation was counter-productive and was damaging to our local economy.





Council acts on trip hazard

Conder Owners' Corporation chair Warren Mills wants the City of Melbourne to reattach hundreds of screws sticking out of the NewQuay boardwalk.

He said the protruding screws were a trip hazard and needed to be fixed before more people fell. Mr Mills said he had been aware of the issue for a while, but decided to contact the council after his grandson tripped and fell early in January.

In his maintenance request to the council, Mr Mills said: "The timber boardwalk of Docklands NewQuay Promenade presents a high risk of tripping injury due to the projection of screw heads, boards and parts of boards."

"As I walk along NewQuay Promenade regularly, I have tripped several times during the last three years I have lived here and have more recently noticed other people tripping."

Mr Mills said the task required the screws to be removed, the holes countersunk lower than the deck level and new screws attached.

A City of Melbourne's contractor started remedial works on January 25 on the NewQuay boardwalk and a spokesperson said the works would be completed by the end of January.

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Year of the dragon

The Chinese year of the dragon came to Docklands on Australia Day, with this glamorous fellow seeming to break through the pavement on Harbour Esplanade.

The three-dimensional chalk artwork was the creation of champion pavement artist Jenny McCracken who laboured day and night during the week leading up to the January 26 holiday.

The Thornbury-based artist is the reigning pavement art champion from Sydney's annual Chalk Urban Art Festival and has also won international chalk art competitions.

She said the dragon commission from the State Government was a "dream job" and was one of the few times she had been able to create what she wanted to

"I've always wanted to do a dragon," she said. "Dragons have to be closely-related to rainbow serpents, so there's the tenuous link to Australia Day!"

Ms McCracken said Docklands provided a perfect venue and was a great place to work.

"It's the biggest picture I have ever done," she said. "The pavement has been great. I love it. The locals have loved it and everyone has been really supportive."

"Because it has been so hot I have been doing a lot of it at night and this is when most people have been involved."

She said many people took the opportunity to learn about pavement art and volunteered to help create the work.

"It's been a really successful public event," she said.

Harbour Town defies the gloom

Harbour Town Shopping Centre defied the retail gloom in December and posted a healthy growth in sales figures.

When other centres went backwards. Harbour Town sales grew by 4.3 per cent in general over the same period in 2010 and by a whopping 8.2 per cent in apparel sales.

On a "moving annual turnover" basis, the centre recorded a "static" result which, according to manager Shane Brown, was a great result in the circumstances.

Mr Brown attributes the centre's recent success to a number of factors including the recently-completed renovation and continued unique and targeted marketing.

"We are very pleased with the result which goes against the generally reported trend for retail," he said. "It's one of the better results considering some centres have gone backwards."

Mr Brown said Harbour Town continued to exploit its natural "outdoor" advantage by putting on unique events such as bringing in farm animals. On Australia Day, Harbour Town brought in one of the nation's largest cows for a milking demonstration.

Other activities contributing to strong sales included the centre's first eight-hour sale, when retail leaders slashed prices by up to 50 per cent, innovative Santa promotions and generously funded family competitions.

Mr Brown said Harbour Town's December eight-hour sale was such a success it would probably be repeated every quarter.

Sponsorships also contributed, with great exposure being achieved through the centre's association with the North Melbourne Football Club and valuable TV exposure also being achieved via its relationship with the Etihad Stadium-based Melbourne Renegades cricket team.

Renovations to the centre, completed last October, have given shoppers more shelter from the elements and greater access to the centre's level one retailers.

And, not content to rest on its laurels, the centre turned up the volume on activities and promotions in January with reptile displays, bucking bulls and surfboard riding to coincide with the school holidays.



More traffic disruption

Harbour Esplanade will be closed at night this month and also in March as contractors fix strip drains.

Places Victoria's city west manager Simon Wilson said problems with the drains were discovered last September during a final inspection of the Harbour Esplanade redevelopment.

"Following the final inspection of the Stage 1 works in September 2011, it was noted that strip drains constructed along Harbour Esplanade were showing signs of deterioration," Mr Wilson said.

"Remedial works will commence on January 30 and will be completed by the end of April. These works have been discussed with all neighbouring properties to minimise disruption to all concerned."

"As part of these remedial works, Harbour Esplanade will be closed to vehicle traffic from 11pm until 5am Monday to Friday in late February and early March. Traffic diversions will be in place during these times and traffic management staff will be in place to assist pedestrians and motorists as required," Mr Wilson said.

"With the exception of these night works, remedial works are not expected to affect trams, pedestrians or vehicles."



Tower 6 announced

Mirvac is proceeding with its Tower 6 at Yarra's Edge with the Minister for Planning Matthew Guy making the announcement last month.

The 39-storey tower takes a new direction for residential towers in Docklands featuring ground-floor community space with less emphasis on retail.

It will have 680sqm of community space, lobby and gym, in contrast with only 280sqm of retail.

The \$217 million development at 92-100 Lorimer St will comprise 200 new apartments and comes hot on the heels of Mirvac's Yarra Point tower which got underway last year.

Mr Guy said: "The 39-storey development includes a 5-star energy-rated building, the incorporation of urban art, landscaping and ground floor activities."

"As Docklands enters its second decade, the Yarra's Edge development builds upon its premier location with a waterfront lifestyle in close proximity to Southbank and the CBD.

"Yarra's Edge continues to provide for sustained investment and growth for Melbourne in an area that is increasingly becoming a new urban hub."

"I congratulate the Department of Planning and Community Development, Places Victoria, VicRoads and Melbourne City Council for their collaborative efforts in working through the application," Mr Guy said.

The site is located between Tower 5 to the east and Tower 8 and Point Park to the west.

Simply the best

New year's eve went off in Docklands this year with some observers reporting the best celebration so far.

Veteran Docklander Michele Anderson rated it as the best, while Docklands Chamber of Commerce President Keith Rankin said it was "possibly" the best he'd seen in 18 years.

NewQuay precinct manager Simon Duffield said this year was not expected to top the 2011 celebration, but it did.

"Everyone was well behaved and it all went like clockwork," he said. "And it was great to see the retailers smiling."

"The restaurants had two sittings and they were extremely happy," Mr Duffield said.

Ms Anderson said new years eve was the biggest crowd she had ever seen in Docklands.

"And it was a great crowd too. Everyone was happy," she said.

Mr Rankin agreed that the attitude of the crowd was first class.

"I did not see any unsavoury incidents," he said. "It was a real family night – a real winner for Docklands."

"We've had some really good new year's eves over the years but this one was possibly the best ever. The challenge now is to take the next step and work out how to transform this event which has grown organically into a festival over the whole day and night," Mr Rankin said.

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What a great place to wait

If you are going to be stuck in Melbourne awaiting an organ transplant, what better place to wait than Docklands?

This is the view of the Ashton family who are in Docklands while a healthy set of lungs can be sourced for the eldest son Coen.

Dawn Ashton and her husband Mark put their lives on hold last October when they came to Docklands from Maryborough in Queensland.

"We think Docklands is awesome," Dawn said. "The views, the water, the people are great here. We love it."

The family spent the first three months in an apartment at NewQuay but is currently staying aboard their yacht at Yarra's Edge while they find more permanent accommodation.

The trouble is, they don't know how long they will be in Melbourne. They have been told to be within an hour of the Alfred Hospital in case the call comes that new lungs have been sourced for Coen who was born with cystic fibrosis.

Depending on where he is in the cycle, the 14-year-old has between 20 and 27 per cent lung capacity. Independent of this problem, Coen is also a self-injecting diabetic.

Docklands is a great location spot the family as it is half way between the Alfred and the Royal Children's Hospital where Coen spends two weeks of every month.

When in hospital, he is subjected to a routine of medication and physiotherapy so that, when organ donors are found, he is in physical condition to receive his new lungs.

Even though Coen is on the list for new lungs, it is not something that comes up every day. In fact, Dawn said that in 2006 there was only one such suitable donation made in Victoria and only six in Australia. Melbourne is the only place in Australia or New Zealand where Coen can receive new lungs.

He needs lungs from someone generally matching his age (16 is the minimum age at which someone can flag their intention to donate their organs). The lungs also need to be from someone on a respirator so the only potential donors would be an accident victim or a young person suffering a brain aneurism.

But Coen is not the sort of kid to rest on his laurels. Publicity he has generated for the cause has resulted in more than 1000 people signing up to become organ donors.

Most of this came via an astounding achievement for someone so ill – last year he jet skied 2000 km down the Murray River. This also resulted in him being awarded a Pride of Australia medal which recognised his courage. See www.murraycodd.com

Coen wanted to "do something big" to raise awareness on organ donation. "I originally wanted to do something with camels, but Mum talked me out of it when she told me that they bite, spit and fart," he said.

When the Ashtons received the call last October that Coen was next in line for new lungs, they dropped everything and headed to Melbourne. They can't really work here because of the demands of looking after Coen and also because they don't know how long they will be here.

The family dog is being looked after in South Australia by Mark's brother and, apart from clothing, all their belongings are back in Queensland. Mark is currently restoring his boat, which a friend sailed down from Oueensland.

The Ashtons' younger son Kai, 6, is enrolled at North Melbourne Primary School. Coen studies by distance education, but would love to attend University High School this year.

He said that, because Uni High was so close to the Royal Children's it would be ideal for him.

"I could go across there during the day from hospital," he said. Coen said he would love to go to school even if it was part time.

When *Docklands News* caught up with the Ashtons, Coen and Kai were enjoying community sailing day at the Docklands Yacht Club. The family learned of the opportunity via *Docklands News* last year and have now become club members.

It was Coen's first day out after a fortnight in hospital and, rather than go home, they headed straight to the yacht club so he could go for a sail with his brother.

The Rotary Club of Docklands is assisting the Docklands Yacht Club to offer the experience of sailing to under-privileged children who would otherwise not have such an opportunity.

Tram delivers our message to the CBD

Docklands will be enticing visitors from the city for the next three months thanks to a Destination Docklands campaign to wrap a City Circle tram with our message.

The message that the tram is conveying is that there is plenty to do in Docklands.

According to Destination Docklands' executive officer Michelle Kemp, the campaign is designed to generate interest in our suburb.

"Other objectives are to educate the public about what Docklands has to offer, encourage visitation, exploration, repeat visitation and spending," Ms Kemp said.

She said the tram would be wrapped in



colours from the Docklands logo to promote key assets.

"Thanks to Yarra Trams, NewQuay, Black Light Mini Golf, Harbour Town Shopping Centre and Medibank Icehouse, the tram will tell everyone that 'there's plenty to do at Docklands," she said.

Ms Kemp said a City Circle trams stopped at Harbour Town every six minutes.

Dudley St to be closed again for rail works

Docklanders have been advised that Dudley St will again be closed this month to allow works to proceed on the new Regional Rail Link.

Rail Link Authority construction manager Evan Tattersall has written to residents and businesses advising that Dudley St will be close during the weekend of February 3-6.

Mr Tattersall said the full closure was necessary to allow for the installation of concrete panels to the new bridge structure which was installed in December.

"The closure is required to ensure the safety

of motorists, pedestrians and workers. Signed detour routes will be in place during the closure to direct traffic. Pedestrian access will be limited to ensure public safety," Mr Tattersall said.

"In addition to night works, ongoing daytime works, including survey works, piling, installation of services, non-destructive digging, earthworks and associated signalling work, will occur along the rail corridor between Southern Cross Station and Moonee Ponds Creek."

The works schedule outlined in the letter is:

- Thursday, February 2 to Sunday, February 12 – day/night drainage work – car park Laurens St, North Melbourne (Melway Ref: 43 C6);
- 1pm Friday, February 3 to 7am Monday,

February 6 – includes full closure of Dudley St, North Melbourne between Wurundjeri Way and Adderley St (Melway Ref: 43 C7-D7) from 11am Saturday, February 4 to 11am Sunday, February 5;

- 10pm Saturday, February 11 to 7am Sunday, February 12;
- 11pm Friday, February 17 to 7am Monday, February 20; and
- 10pm Saturday, February 25 to 7am Sunday, February 26.

Mr Tattersall said: "Drainage works will be undertaken in the car park in Laurens Street, North Melbourne from Thursday, February 2 to Sunday, February 12. Nearby residents may experience noise during these activities. For safety reasons, and due to the proximity of the work site to railway lines, these

activities cannot be carried out while trains are running."

"To reduce noise impacts the project team will use a piling method that produces lower levels of noise and vibration and will install broadband reversing beepers on vehicles and construction equipment. Generators will be required to illuminate the sites."

"While every effort is made to complete works within specified timeframes, due to unforeseen circumstances there may be occasions where the work schedule changes or additional night works are required at short notice."



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Facilities will be worth the wait

Docklands' first real community facilities announced late last year should prove worth the wait, according to Lend Lease's Victoria Harbour project director Claire Johnston.

Ms Johnston says the new library and community hub needs to be understood in the context of $21^{\rm st}$ century best-practice.

"A collection of books is only a tiny part of what is planned here," she said. "It's a three-storey building, housing meeting rooms, and is likely to include sound recording studio, outdoor children's play area, teenage gaming facilities, commercial cooking spaces ... the list goes on."

"The context is community growth and development and libraries are one of the few remaining open public facilities," she said.

Ms Johnston said that while the role of librarians was still to connect citizens with knowledge, the delivery mechanisms had evolved by light years in recent times.

"Modern librarians these days are across the digital technologies. They are highly cultured people who are right up with music, books, art and theatre," Ms Johnston said.

The library and community hub form part of a centralised civic precinct to be known as



Dock Square, to be built at the intersection of Collins and Bourke streets.

Lend Lease won a bid against other Docklands developers last year after the City of Melbourne and Places Victoria (formerly known as VicUrban) concluded that they could not afford to build their own facility.

But the new facility is stand-alone and will be built within the \$9 million that the council and Places Victoria have budgeted. A separate budget has to be found to fund the fit-out, expected to cost another \$3 million.

The development was submitted for

planning approval on December 16. It is expected that work will start in April.

Another aspect of Dock Square will be a community boating hub. Ms Johnston says concept designs for this facility are well advanced, but specific funding details are yet to be determined.

An outdoor pool is another aspect which appeared alongside Dock Square in the Victoria Harbour master plan revealed in 2010. Ms Johnston says this facility is still in the plan but, as a lower order priority, is yet to be funded.

Lord Mayor Robert Doyle said the proposed

location of the library and community hub was ideal and would be the cornerstone of a range of community infrastructure to be delivered in this part of Docklands.

"The proposed development is the result of a great partnership between the City of Melbourne, Places Victoria and Lend Lease, enabling us to deliver a first rate library and community centre for the people of Docklands," Cr Doyle said.

"This proposed building is not just a piece of architecture in terms of sustainability and design, it is an important piece of urbanism. This is what the city has been trying to advocate for in Docklands, buildings and places that work for people."

Managing director of Lend Lease's development business in Australia, David Rolls, said Dock Square and, in particular, the proposed library and community centre, would help define the character of Victoria Harbour and the wider Docklands by bringing life to the heart of the precinct.




"This proposed development at Dock Square will have the ability to evolve over time to suit the diverse needs of its users."







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Roger fires up over council open space strategy

The president of the Docklands Community Association Roger Gardner has dismissed the City of Melbourne's new draft open space strategy as "misleading window dressing".

Mr Gardner said the 36-page strategy released late last year did not provide for significant land-based open space in Docklands.

"I am critical of it because I think it is largely misleading window dressing. It says a lot but delivers little," Mr Gardner said.

On Docklands, the strategy says: "A new local park in the NewQuay area is to be developed, along with additional local open spaces in the Yarra's Edge and Victoria Harbour precincts. These spaces are proposed to be connected with a continuous public open space reserve along the waterfront with access to the water's edge celebrating Victoria Harbour and the Yarra River as key strengths of Docklands."

"Moonee Ponds Creek linear open space corridor will continue to be improved, providing recreational connectivity to the future municipal open space, north to E-Gate and Arden Macaulay urban renewal areas and to NewQuay Promenade," the strategy says.

But Mr Gardner said: "The plans (as) per the maps do not provide for any significant land-based open space in Docklands – for the simple reason that there is no land left."

"The same applies to other areas of the city outside of the existing major parks/ gardens, with no new major parks planned."

In explaining the strategy to DCA members, Mr Gardner said: "The area marked for a park in Docklands ... is the small 2 ha strip down off Docklands Drive near Bolte Bridge which may well go to the Melbourne Football Club. The size of the blue circle is exaggerated."

"The map does show another blue circle for open space provision in the proposed redevelopment of the rail yards known as E-Gate on the other side of Footscray Rd and at the northern end. This is not close for Docklands and the size again is dubious."

"The nearest major gardens for us will continue to be Flagstaff," he said.

"It is disappointing to say the least that whist extolling the virtues of open space 'within easy walking distance' the plans provide very little," he said. "The plans provided in the link site say that water is open space which, whilst technically correct, does not provide for land based open space for leisure and recreation for a growing population."

The chair of the council's Eco-City Committee, Cr Cathy Oke, said the strategy sought to do as much as possible with the available space.

"Of course it would be ideal if we could have large spaces of available land to meet recreational and wellbeing needs," she said. "But this is not the case and, as such, we also have to think creatively how to use the little space we do have."

"I am especially excited about the opportunities that rehabilitating Moonee Ponds Creek will bring. I have seen the amazing transformation of similar derelict spaces overseas into truly active urban open space in cities with limited or no land."

"Many of the proposals in the draft strategy are creative design solutions to use existing spaces better, to better match the recreational needs identified in the research without relying on huge amounts of non-existent land."

"Small changes in existing spaces as identified in the draft strategy should achieve positive recreational outcomes for Docklands while we work towards and advocate for larger spaces to become available in new sites."

"I strongly encourage anyone interested to provide feedback to the draft Open Space Strategy before 1st March via www.melbourne. vic.gov.au/ParksandActivities/Parks/Pages/ OpenSpaceStrategy.aspx," Cr Oke said.

A new market force for Docklands

There's nothing here now but if siblings Stephen and Niki Filipovic fulfil their dream, this is the site for a dynamic and chic Saturday market.

The brother and sister team have an application before the State Government to transform the derelict and deserted western end of NewQuay into a hip and happening destination.

They say that their vision, passion and energy for what they are calling the Melbourne Flea is just what Docklands needs. Who would disagree?

The Filipovics and business partner Jesse Saunders believe they have their finger on the pulse of what's hot and what is going to attract a new generation of shoppers to Docklands.

Part of their "People's Market" brand is the innovative use of shipping containers for stall holders. They are working with architects to customise the containers to the particular stall-holding artisan and the goods being sold.

The downside to their planning is that the site has been promised to Cirque du Soleil at the end of the year and they will have to move out. Whether they return or whether they find another site depends on the success of the market in the months ahead.

"It is our intention to transform 453-507 Docklands Drive, into an open-air market, incorporating a variety of market vendors and refurbished shipping containers. In this instance the market we are proposing will have the title "Melbourne Flea", and consist of three main sections. These parts may be defined as the flea market section, container section and wholesale farmers," Niki Filipovic said.

"Each container design will be a product of its context and the development will accommodate (for) makers, artisans and food producers to enter uncharted markets, and for pre-established businesses to further promote and enhance their success, both, with little financial risk," Ms Filipovic said.

"Most of our site will consist of flea market vendors selling pre-loved items or unique and quirky pieces. It is our intention to turn this into the largest flea market in the CBD."

"We anticipate that our business proposal will attract people to the NewQuay vicinity, and create a stronger sense of community. We hope that our innovative container refurbishments draw much-needed attention and interest to the area, and that the flea is profitable and affordable to a broad range of people."

"We have been developing our concept for over a year now and we are rolling out a similar concept in Brisbane, whilst also establishing innovative twilight markets across Melbourne," Ms Filipovic said.

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Work resumes on wheel

Work is proceeding on rebuilding the Southern Star Observation Wheel following a setback in late November which disrupted its progress.

The incident, in which the wheel tore loose from its restraints on November 28, resulted in Worksafe placing a "non-disturbance notice" over the site. Now that the wheel has been restrained and secured, and the site has been inspected, Worksafe has lifted the notice and work is again underway.

Southern Star management reports that a revised "work method statement" is currently being prepared to rotate the wheel to enable winching and the erection of the remaining rim sections. Southern Star expects this work to start soon. Once the rim is completed, the 21 cabins will be reattached.

The company says it cannot estimate a completion date because the intricate work required cannot be performed in adverse weather conditions.

"This and various other challenges make it difficult to declare an opening date at this stage," a company spokesperson said.

The replacement and re-build of the wheel is being undertaken under warranty by Sanoyas Hishino Meisho Corporation.

Community garden is underway

Work on the new Docklands community garden, to be located on the corner of Geographe St and Keera Way in Victoria Harbour, is set to start this month following the appointment in December of contractor Haylen Group.

Places Victoria's city west manager Simon Wilson said the garden's governance structure would be announced shortly.

Mr Wilsons said the design and management of the garden had been informed by six rounds of community consultation – three rounds on design and three rounds on governance and management.

"The community garden will include more than 20 communal planting areas, productive plants and trees, a fire pit, barbecue and seating facilities, compost bays and a children's garden area," Mr Wilson said.



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

'Casino' is a popular choice

Geelong painter Phil Suter's work SS Casino – That Fateful Day was the most popular at last year's ANL Art Prize and Exhibition at the Mission to Seafarers.

Mr Suter won \$2000 from Asset1 WTC for his work being adjudged the People's Choice at Australia's leading maritime art award which is held every year in Docklands.

The People's Choice award is the show's fourth category and was not known until it had finished and all the votes were counted.

Asset1 WTC strategic director Philip Hill presented Mr Suter with his award on December 1 at the World Trade Centre Gallery.

Mr Suter's painting depicts the SS Casino steaming into Apollo Bay on July 10, 1932 before capsizing only 400 metres from shore with the lost of 10 lives.

The artist explained that in poor weather, the Casino's anchor sheared a massive gouge in

the side of the ship and it simply keeled over and sank.

"The Casino's importance was pivotal for the local communities along the southern Victorian coast as it was probably a very welcome sight to those who lived there and depended on it and its loss and the loss of life would have been greatly mourned," Mr Suter said.

"This vessel had not only caught my imagination but had also become a very engrossing story I wanted to tell to a wider audience through the traditional medium of painting."

"I feel grateful for the opportunity of having commemorated an important aspect of our Australian maritime history."

New banking concept for Docklands





Docklands has been chosen as the site for the National Australia Bank's first ground-breaking, hi-tech concept store.

It is the first of five concept stores to be opened across Australia this year as NAB discards the term "branch" and re-focuses on "retail and customer experience".

Combining state-of-the-art security, cuttingedge technology and a revolutionary open plan layout, the Docklands store also aims to re-connect with the local community.

The in-store technology includes free wifi and internet access, free use of Apple Macs and iPads, and a "kids' zone" showing an animated feature. An invisible scent – "jasmine with a hint of grapefruit" – is being trialled at Docklands.

Launching the prototype store last month, manager Vinit Ajmani said local groups could come into the store and add community notices on a free Apple app.

"Creating a link with the Docklands community is the most important thing to us," Mr Ajmani said.

"We encourage local community groups to come in and add their notices on our free app," he said.

"Live advertising will be flashing on three

digital screens to promote our community, showing local events and notices."

NAB has adopted a "less is more" approach to security. Gone are the obvious security barriers and pop-up windows, as the bank believes an open-plan layout deters offenders who prefer concealment to being in sight

The Docklands store is piloting "an invisible toxic solution featuring a unique synthetic DNA solution that sprays offenders when leaving the premises".

Also, tellers will have no access to cash until after a transaction has been made and identification is accepted.

An "intelligent deposit machine" can accept up to 50 notes and 30 cheques at once,

and issue a receipt with an image of each deposited cheque.

But Mr Ajmani said staff numbers would not be reduced from the current "nine or 10".

NAB head of network planning and design, Peter Holmes, said: "The store will have the same number of staff, who can come out and interact with customers."

"We think customers will always want faceto-face banking. This is a multi-sensory experience."

The store features piped music, which changes in volume between the store's three sections.

The store is in the NAB building at 800 Bourke St, Docklands, and is open from 8am to 4pm Monday to Friday.

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No councillor for Docklands

Docklands seems unlikely to get its own city councillor as a Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) review has recommended against it.

While the VEC has not made a final decision, it clearly favours an unsubdivided municipality where councillors are elected "at large".

In a recently-released preliminary report, the VEC has, however, recommended that the City of Melbourne be given an extra two councillors to share the workload of a capital city municipality.

Its recommendation against subdividing the municipality into wards is likely to upset local resident groups which were unanimous in their preference for local ward councillors who, they say, are more in touch with local residents and local issues.

The VEC admits that the vast majority of submissions it received supported the local wards model, but it rejects the notion largely on the basis of what is going to work best for Melbourne as a capital city council.

"A key part of the Council's role is to develop and implement strategies to further the interests of Melbourne and indirectly of the whole state," the VEC said in its report.

"The risk of a reversion to a ward structure is that councillors may become preoccupied with local issues that they lose sight of capital city strategies, causing the council to lose momentum."

"Unlike other Victorian councils, Melbourne City Council has a statewide, a national and even an international dimension."

The VEC also points out that residents (state electors) comprise only 40 per cent of eligible voters within the City of Melbourne, with non-resident property owners and corporations having a combined entitlement of 60 per cent.

The VEC noted the City of Melbourne's claim that it already consults closely with residents. It repeated this statement from the council's website:

"We run public consultations on any major strategy or plan which affects the public spaces of the city or the wellbeing of residents, businesses or visitors."

"We advertise a period of consultation in newspapers, local community publications and on our website. We will tell you how you can get a copy of the document, how you can respond to it and about any public meeting

The VEC says it will receive submissions on its report up until February 23 and is conducting a public hearing at 5pm on February 29 at the Melbourne Town Hall. Only people who have previously made submissions can speak.

One of those wanting to speak is likely to be Docklands Community Association (DCA) president Roger Gardner.

Mr Gardner said: "The VEC response is disappointing and rejects all the submissions by the city's various community groups who unanimously requested a return to a ward structure."

"Councillors at large can become lost in trying to deal with issues city-wide and major local issues can be overlooked."

"I know from my experience in a wardstructured council that whilst ward issues can compete, it is the whole council that decides on proposals when they come up to be voted on. It is a matter of balance and council officers play a major role in that process with their expertise and recommendations."

"In terms of the city's large business and commercial interests, it needs to be remembered that some suburban councils also have major assets such as airports, sporting venues and shopping centres which they manage along with ward issues. Commercial interests can be represented on council."

"It appears from the VEC response that they have been influenced by views expressed by the current council. The inference that socalled public consultation makes up for lack of a ward representative is a weak argument."

"Experience indicates that decisions are made before the public is 'consulted' which becomes lip service. I therefore believe that the possible loss of macro considerations is overstated and outweighed by the significant benefits of ward representation."

In its submission, the DCA told the VEC Docklands needed a councillor who lived in the area who had:

- A close knowledge of the issues of the ward area;
- An obligation and an interest to represent those issues at council; and
- An obligation to follow up and keep the ward community informed.

The DCA said: "Docklands in particular requires ward representation because of being a newly developing area, including unique waterways, with special planning and infrastructure needs."

Intersection pedestrian risk

Docklands' Harbour Esplanade bike path is so attractive it seems that drivers can't resist it when turning right from Bourke St - which is a major problem for pedestrians waiting to cross the road.

Local worker Fran Welsh says she is surprised that no one has yet been killed or seriously injured due to the confusion of drivers.

"The other day I had an old lady coming straight at me," she said. "You should have seen the look on her face. Her look was priceless when she realised she shouldn't be there."

It wasn't so funny during another of Fran's lucky escapes when a truck driver drove behind a temporary barrier and parked in the bike lane before realising his mistake and just kept going down the track and back out onto Harbour

Places Victoria (formerly VicUrban) says it is aware of the problem and a number of remedial measures have been tried. It says it is the City of Melbourne's responsibility but that it was working with the council and VicRoads to find a

permanent remedy.

VicRoads is believed to be currently reviewing design modifications for approval and implementation.

Ms Welsh says nothing short of a curved steel barrier with a large arrow will protect pedestrians.

Ms Welsh works as a community management assistant with Stewart Silver King and Burns at 102 Harbour Esplanade. She says the crossing only became dangerous when the new bicycle path was opened about six months ago.

"I'd say it happens to me (a vehicle heading for pedestrians waiting to cross the road) six or more times a week," she said.


"The authorities obviously know it's a problem, otherwise they would not have put this temporary bollard here. But it needs a better solution than this temporary measure."

Oscar's Table

A welcome addition to Docklands ...

Sometimes, when you love something very much, you place higher expectations on it than you would something you barely care about.

I'm the first to admit I can be this way about Docklands. The minor transgressions or disappointments cut deep - but a good experience at Docklands is like basking in the brightest of sunshine, the kind that leaves you warm and glowing with memories that linger for days. The kind that rights all wrongs.

Oscar's Table did this for me - truth be told, some girlfriends, some wine and some sunshine also played a big part. But this new tapas-style restaurant with its fabulous menu and wonderful service certainly set and nurtured the scene.

Located in NewQuay, the space is barely recognisable as the former home to Liquid. A slick refurb has added warmth and a European touch inside, while the outside can be enjoyed in all conditions, with clear weather protection keeping the elements out while letting the views in.

Offering breakfast, lunch or dinner - I believe Oscar's Table will become known for its "share plates". They are perfect for groups and/or long lunches.

We started with a small selection and then just kept ordering, until we'd finally tried all of the below:

- Pork empanades with chipotle mayo (\$9);
- Son-in-law eggs with tamarind and chilli caramel, dried prawn and crisp leek (\$9, and I'm salivating again just writing that
- Croquettes (\$8);
- Salt and pepper calamari with aioli and lemon (\$11);
- Ceviche of market fish with coconut and paprika crisps (\$14);
- Grilled prawns with chorizo, roasted peppers and sweet sherry (\$16); and the real winner
- The perhaps-inappropriately-named chicken ribs, with lemongrass, chilli and shallots (\$10). These were nothing like what you'd imagine chicken "ribs"

to be (you've got to admit - they don't sound too meaty or appetising) but "Oh. My. God!" Chunky meat and a delicious marinade that made the tongue sing. They're a must.

This column doesn't have enough space to go through each dish in detail, but let me just say that all were cooked to near perfection and bursting with flavour when they should have been, yet had subtle balance where required. Touches such as the paprika crisps added intrigue and texture and no dish, even those of the deep fried variety, suffered from too much oil.

The wine list was refreshingly affordable, a bit heavy on the sauvignon blanc, with bubbles, riesling and pinot gris also outnumbering the lone chardonnay option - but those are the styles that better suit the food. The reds include some Spanish styles, including a rioja - which is a style I'm quite fond of and would recommend as safe for red lovers to try.



GREETINGS FROM THE DOCKLANDS COMMUN



Greetings everybody and welcome to 2012.

The DCA Christmas Party held on December 7 at the Harbour Kitchen on Victoria Harbour was a great success, with a crowd full of cheer on a balmy summer's evening.

Members are being kept informed of coming events in the area. The new year's eve fireworks were spectacular as usual. The crowd was well behaved. The number of police and security arrangements were well sourced.

Myself and two representatives from other areas met with Planning Minister Matthew Guy in his offices on December 14. I reiterated our community's strong objection to MAB Corporation's plan to erect a hotel in the Waterfront City Piazza, together with its plans for extra tall buildings and with no extra traffic management. Mr Guy referred to MAB's plan to put a park at the rear of the proposed hotel. Hopefully he was just being rhetorical, but it would be annoying if he had been "taken in"

by MAB's proposed "park" which we had already advised was a sham, as it would be a small overshadowed strip with traffic lanes on both sides to the hotel, with water views blocked. I repeated this. The City of Melbourne is siding with us and has sent written objections to the department, which I referred to in the meeting. Councils get overridden, but the fact that it is the City of Melbourne may carry more weight. Developers have done what they like in Docklands. The community's profile has been raised and we have to continue to fight for what's left. The Minister gave no indication of a decision at the meeting, which was to be expected.

Council has released plans for future open space in the municipality including Docklands. This has been forwarded to DCA members. Feedback is encouraged. A link is available for readers on www.melbourne. vic.gov.au/openspace. The plans as per the maps do not provide any significant landbased open space in Docklands which is not surprising, since there is not much left. The same applies to other areas of the city with no new major parks/gardens planned. It says a lot but delivers little.

Apart from token strips, the largest space

shown is the known patch off the end of Docklands Drive at the Bolte Bridge which may be allocated to the Melbourne Football Club. The sizes of the blue and orange circles (on their maps) are exaggerated.

Some salvation could lie in the redevelopment of Harbour Esplanade between the newly located tram tracks and the water. This is a fairly large area. We will be following up for concept plans which so far have not been forthcoming from the council or Places Victoria. This area should become a walking esplanade with lawn, paths and trees. We will oppose any plan to put buildings on it.

Their maps do show another blue circle for open space provision in the proposed redevelopment of the railyards known as E-Gate on the other side of Footscray Rd and at its northern end. This is not close for Docklands and the size again is dubious. The nearest major gardens for us will continue to be Flagstaff.

It is disappointing to say the least that whist extolling the virtues of open space "within easy walking distance", the plans provide very little.

The chair of Places Victoria (formerly VicUrban), former city councillor Peter Clarke, has stated a desire to liaise more closely with the DCA which is welcome. We hope that this will result in us gaining more facilities and redress for the community, including open space, recreation and other facilities, improved traffic management and more control over developers.

Maria is doing her bit

Palladio resident Maria Norris is one of those people that you meet every now and again who does everything in the community.

You know the type – they put their hand up for committee roles when everyone else is looking at their shoes or at the ceiling.

Maria (who most people know as Maree) is highly energetic and committed and continues to work tirelessly for the community. The NewQuay resident's latest charity is the Lady Mayoress' Committee.

Maria explained that she was currently a member of two Probus Groups, but was rationalising back to just one. She attends the University of the Third Age (UA3) and is taking botanical art classes at the Docklands Hub.

Her community work started almost from the moment she started her family as an 18-year-old mum. She said the local maternal and child health nurse convinced her to become secretary of a fundraising group and she hasn't stopped since.

In 2003 she was awarded a Centenary Medal for services to law. Far from being a lawyer, Maria was recognised for her service to northern suburban legal services.

She was the inaugural chair of the Broadmeadows Community Legal Service and went on to hold all the executive positions within this organisation over the years. She was also active with the Broadmeadows Community Resource Centre and Housing for the Aged Action Group (HAAG).

Maria grew up in North Fitzroy. She was living in a ladies hostel in Albert Park when she started her working life in the Department of Supply and Defence.

In 1953 she married Trevor Norris as a 16-year-old and proceeded to produce and raise three daughters and two sons. The family lived briefly in West Footscray before moving to Dallas. Before establishing a post office, Maria worked in a TAB, was a consultant for Gloria Marshall and spent two

years managing a hotel.

It was during her time in the post office that she suffered a fall and broke both an arm and a leg. Recuperation was difficult and it was not until she discovered the benefits of swimming that she made any progress.

"I thought I was going to have the live the rest of my life with my leg in a brace," she recalled.

In 2005 her husband Trevor died suddenly, and the following year she moved to Docklands.

"I enjoy my lifestyle here," she said. "I have lots of friends here and I am certainly not going to sit at the window and watch the world go by."

Another of Maria's interests is doing her bit for her big brother's regimental association, having been treasurer for the past two years.

Maria says that, as the old soldiers slowly fade away, it's been up to friends and family

to pitch in to the keep the various regimental associations alive.

Her brother Norm Parfitt, 94, served as a gunner in the $2^{\rm nd}/4^{\rm th}$ AIF Field Regiment in the Middle East, in New Guinea and in Borneo during World War II.

"I went away from Australia three times and was lucky enough to come back each time," the sprightly Norm said at a bi-monthly function at Middle Park Bowling Club.

Despite his age, Norm drove to the function and has no plans of slowing down. He's looking forward to both a new hip and to many more association functions.

Maria said she'd always been community minded and put her hand up to help in the light of a diminishing membership base.

Association secretary Pat Cahir said only 54 veterans remained Australia-wide.

"What we say is that when the last man goes, we turn out the lights," he said.

"They opened the garage door and all these animals came pouring out," he said. "These two were wrestling so I managed to grab them."


Bill says Angie and Bonnie are "probably" border collie crossed with a terrier mix. In other words - fairly unique!

"Any extra space is better than none. Show



What the?

What is this strange object slowing sinking at its mooring in Victoria Harbour?

It is perhaps Docklands' smallest boat.

The little red vessel was purpose-built at the Wooden Boat Centre in Shed 2 so that workmen could get up close and personal with the "crop" of piles at the end of Merchant St which are now all wearing stainless steel spinning head wear.

The vessel was designed like a horseshoe. The workers were able to manoeuvre it around a pile, secure it with ropes and get to work at extremely close quarters.

The piles were all "renovated" late last July before being capped with the new wind-vane-type hats. Divers added steel rings to their bases and used stones and concrete to secure them.

But after the work was done, the little red boat seemed to be abandoned. It languished at a nearby jetty for some time and incorrect mooring resulted in her taking on water.

And then she disappeared. Had she gone to the bottom of the harbour?

Docklands News is pleased to report that she was seen last month safe and sound in the doorway of the Wooden Boat Centre. And she was out again in late January assisting with some maintenance. The artwork's stainless steel hats were off, presumably to quieten them down.


The arrival of UK chain store maven Topshop to Melbourne shores has also brought with it a slew of affordable surf-chic pieces.


You don't need to be a Blue Crush surf hero to pull off this trend – just sport some neon colours, cool prints and a laid back attitude. Surfboard optional.




