Docklands' boom supports Victoria

Where would Victoria be without the \$2.2 billion that Docklands is currently injecting into the state economy?

The property industry claims to be the largest contributor to the Victorian economy and nowhere is it more active than here in Docklands.

The Property Council of Australia says property contributed \$36.9 billion to total Victorian Gross State Product (GSP) in 2009-10. This is more than manufacturing and more than financial and insurance services.

And while the financial brakes have been applied in other parts of the state, Docklands is booming.

Some 16 Docklands-scale projects are currently underway – representing more than 360,000 sqm of gross floor area and including more than 1500 new homes.

Places Victoria's Docklands manager Simon Wilson said: "Development in Docklands continues to soar with more than \$2.2 billion worth of commercial and residential development currently under construction."

Mr Wilson said Docklands would welcome more than 4500 employees before Christmas.

"In the coming months, Docklands will welcome more than 4500 new employees to the area, taking Docklands' working population to an estimated 27,000 employees by December 2012," Mr Wilson said.

This month and June will see an influx of more than 3000 new workers with both the Australian Tax Office (ATO) and Melbourne Water set to open new offices here.

ATO assistant commissioner of property

operations Stewart Smillie said that more than 2400 workers would be moving into its new building at 735 Collins St from May 26.

"We will be consolidating five existing office sites from across Melbourne into one location at Docklands. We're keen to have the right infrastructure in place for the coming 25 years, and Docklands was the best place for this," Mr Smillie said.

"The planned retail development at Collins Square is very impressive and will be great for our staff, and we feel confident that they will have everything they need here going forwards. The public transport links here, with two tram stops on our doorstep, also contributed towards making Docklands an attractive proposition for us," Mr Smillie added.

Melbourne Water's new premises are at 990 LaTrobe St, in the south-east corner of Digital Harbour. General manager of business services Malcolm Haynes was enthusiastic about the move, stating the building was almost ready for 770 employees to be relocated in June.

"After many years of spreading our citybased offices across four locations, we're pleased to be able to bring everyone under one roof in Docklands," Mr Haynes said. "We work across greater Melbourne and beyond and the Docklands offers a central location with a good range of amenities and access to public transport," he said.

Both corporations were also keen to emphasise the green credentials offered by Docklands locations.

The students participated in an education session about the history of Melbourne and then it was out to sea for an hour with the captain and crew of Docklands' replica schooner Enterprize.

The Enterprize schooner is a full-scale replica, built in Melbourne, of the Enterprize coastal trader sailing ship, which brought the first permanent settlers to Melbourne from Tasmania in August 1835.

The not-for-profit Enterprize Trust operates the Enterprize, with its home base at Shed 2 on North Wharf Rd.

Docklands has become a major focus for Melbourne Day celebrations which will be conducted this year at NewQuay on August 30.

DOCKLANDS NEWS Who are we?

Are we Docklands or Melbourne's waterfront? Or can we be both?

These are not questions of national significance, but they are the source of some tension at the local level.

The City of Melbourne funds three separate organisations which each harbour noble ambitions to put Docklands on the map.

But without a shared agenda, it appears the council is (at best) encouraging a fragmented approach and (at worst) supporting conflicting views.

The players are the Docklands Chamber of Commerce, Destination Docklands and the Yarra River Business Association (YRBA).

Strictly speaking, the chamber does not have a marketing role. That role belongs to Destination Docklands - a co-operative marketing organisation comprising local stakeholders but (significantly) not the Chamber of Commerce.

The YRBA could be viewed as the chamber's equivalent in neighbouring Southbank. It too is funded by the City of Melbourne via its Melbourne Business Precincts program.

But, unlike the Docklands chamber, the YRBA is unashamedly a marketing organisation and, also unlike the Docklands chamber, it is not constrained to a neat, post-code-wide geographic area.

Rather, as the name suggests, the YRBA sees its territory as both sides of the river from the MCG in the east to Waterfront City in Docklands in the west.

The YRBA markets itself as "Melbourne's Waterfront" and sees Docklands as part of that. And last month the YRBA published an "issues and opportunities" paper in which it clarified its position in relation to Docklands.

"It is the aim of YRBA to eventually see the attributes of the two precincts marketed under a joint banner and administration, to maximise potential and to avoid fragmentation of Melbourne's marketing agencies," it said.

"YRBA instigated the Melbourne Waterfront theme and will continue to support the concept. However, as an interim process, it will primarily engage with Docklands organisations through a higher auspicing body, such as City of Melbourne Marketing or Melbourne Business Precincts Inc."

The Docklands Chamber of Commerce has responded to the YRBA's document by congratulating the organisation on the quality of its document and supporting the notion of jointly marketing "Melbourne's Waterfront".

In fact, the chamber went further by claiming the concept was born as a result of one of its own initiatives.

Chamber president Keith Rankin said: "The chamber supports the concept of integrating 'Melbourne's Waterfront' for marketing purposes."

Destination Docklands chairman Kyle Johnston sees merit in joint marketing initiatives but says the "Melbourne's Waterfront" concept is an old idea which had not been adequately supported in the

"Melbourne Waterfront has been a theme in Melbourne dating back to 2005 when Tourism Victoria convened a Melbourne waterfront working group involving river operators from Crown, Southgate, YRBA through to Docklands," he said.

"It is not a new idea and nothing eventuated from this and it eventually closed in 2007 as there was no commitment or structure around the idea."

Interestingly, the City of Melbourne says its research reveals 75 per cent of Melburnians associate the term "Melbourne's Waterfront" with Docklands.

A spokesperson said: "The City of Melbourne has embraced the term 'Melbourne's Waterfront' in marketing campaigns and other communication channels, when describing the area from the Yarra River to Docklands."

Mr Johnston suggested Destination Melbourne would be a more appropriate authority to jointly market the river.

"There may be benefit in marketing the river under a joint approach," he said.

"However (joint) administration doesn't make a lot of sense. I am not sure what we are administering. I see this as more of a marketing partnership program."

However, he said, Destination Docklands would work with the YRBA if invited to

Kylie, Edna and friends might have to find another place to live if MAB's NewQuay Central development proceeds.

The Minister for Planning Matthew Guy has still not made a decision on whether to allow MAB to build a 15-storey hotel in the Waterfront City Piazza.

The piazza is currently home to a number of art installations celebrating Australian entertainers - including an 11-metre mosaic wall mural celebrating the nation's greatest entertainers and statues of Dame Nellie Melba, Graham Kennedy, John Farnham, Dame Edna Everage and Kylie Minogue.

Known collectively as Variety Entertainers of the Century, there are also 100 bronze plaques in the pavement dedicated to the 100 hottest Aussie stars of last century.

However, Variety's general manager Rod Dalglish was unaware of MAB's plans for a hotel at the site.

Mr Dalglish said it would be a "tragedy" if any of the artwork was destroyed or lost.

A MAB spokesperson said: "MAB is formulating an art strategy for NewQuay Central, however we have not made any decisions regarding the existing artwork."

"It is possible that if the development proceeds, the existing artwork may need to be relocated," the spokesperson said.

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City basks in Docklands' reflected glory

The City of Melbourne has become a world environmental leader, largely thanks to the sustainability of Docklands.

In March Docklands hosted 17 "C40" cities for an international workshop on "Sustainable Communities: Collaborating, Planning, Delivering".

Victoria Harbour's sustainability qualities were show-cased to the group of cities, including Beijing, Copenhagen and London.

By the time the event had finished, Melbourne had emerged as the chair of a new global Network on Sustainable Urban Development.

To be chaired by Lord Mayor Robert Doyle, the network will engage other global cities with an interest in sustainable communities.

Lend Lease's Victoria Harbour project manager Claire Johnson said her organisation learned a lot by being involved in the two-day C40 workshop.

"Having the world's cutting-edge thinkers from a wide spectrum of industries in the one room to debate, argue and challenge the status quo has been invaluable to us and the Victoria Harbour project," Ms Johnston said.

"As well as providing a great discussion forum it gave Lend Lease, the City of Melbourne and Places Victoria the opportunity to showcase Victoria Harbour as a landmark sustainable precinct."

The workshop, she said, has resulted in a range of tangible "next steps".

"We've made the commitment, along with our partners, to explore precinct-wide sustainability initiatives, including co-generation and blackwater treatment technologies."

Thumbs up from Endeavour

The HMB Endeavour was moored in Docklands for 12 days during April, providing a direct link to one of the major events in Australian history.

The floating museum is almost at the end of a year-long circumnavigation of Australia, with Docklands being almost the last destination on a 15-stop tour.

Endeavour's engineer Andrew Laurie said: "The ship is the closest replica ever built of Captain Cook's original vessel. It was commissioned in 1995 and is still going as strong as ever."

The engineer also praised Docklands and the location of its berth at Waterfront City, citing its location close to the centre of Melbourne as a major positive: "The location is perfect - there's so much going on around here, and there's always somewhere to relax for some food and a beer after work!"

"Docklands is synonymous with shipping and has played a large role in Melbourne's maritime history, so it's a perfect fit with what we're trying to achieve here in educating people about Captain Cook's voyage," Mr Laurie said.

Anne Gibson, a long-time volunteer with the Endeavour, was in high spirits as she introduced guests to the ship's history. "I was here the first time the Endeavour arrived in Melbourne, and I love being here," she said.

Car parking pressure mounts

Competition for parking spaces in Docklands is set to increase with the closure of the car park at the end of North Wharf Rd from May 4.

The car park will be closed due to issues of vehicle safety and accessibility relating to construction in Victoria Harbour.

Lend Lease has advised drivers to use alternative public parking at NAB (800 Bourke St) and Etihad Stadium.


A spokesperson for Lend Lease said: "Etihad Stadium, together with other car parking stations that service the immediate area, can accommodate an additional 1000 vehicles."

"We are in the process of determining whether a section of the North Wharf car park can remain open during construction. Vehicle safety and accessibility will determine whether this is possible given the level of construction underway including the commencement of works on Collins St," the spokesperson said.

Docklands News understands that Etihad Stadium has between 300 and 400 parking spaces available each day on a casual basis, but that 800 Bourke St has only 64 spaces. Other car parks nearby also have spaces for casual parking, with availability varying on a daily basis.

Further complicating matters is the possibility that Etihad Stadium will soon have no spaces left at all for casual parking during the day.

An Etihad Stadium spokesperson reassured drivers that there were still currently spaces for either casual or permanent parkers, but this may change in the future.



Boaties plan to rally support

Docklands' charter boat operators plan to stage a "regatta" in an attempt to improve their standing with decision makers.

The boaties say they don't have an image problem with Melbourne's public, which loves the opportunity for a river cruise. But they say they are unappreciated and misunderstood by local and state government officials and elected representatives.

Charter boat operator Jeff Gordon says unless something is done to change the perception of the industry within government, the industry could find itself excluded from Victoria Harbour.

Mr Gordon says river traffic is the heart and soul of Docklands but the industry which

carries 100,000 passengers a year continues to be marginalised.

In an attempt to redress this imbalance, about 15 charter boat operators plan to muster about 20 vessels possibly on Sunday, September 2 and throw open their gang planks for a free afternoon on the water.

Mr Gordon said passengers would be asked to make a gold-coin donation to charity in return for hours of fun cruising Victoria Harbour and the river.

"We want to be recognised as a respected and viable industry," Mr Gordon said.

He said the industry in Docklands had been treated with contempt and it appeared that government officials had a very poor view of its contribution to the city.

Mr Gordon said the industry envisaged itself in a central location where passengers and tourists knew they could come for an experience on the water.

He said it was hoped that finger piers could be established along Harbour Esplanade to accommodate a substantial fleet of charter boats.

Mr Gordon cited a recent example when he met an international cruise ship at Station

Pier, brought passengers up the river with an interpretative commentary and dropped them at Central Pier where they were able to explore Melbourne via the City Circle Tram.

"What a great way to arrive in Melbourne," he said. "This type of experience is priceless for Melbourne as a tourism destination, but it is simply unappreciated."

"Our issue is that decision makers in this city don't see it as a priority to have an industry like this."

"We seem to be in their blind spot and there is every chance that we will be pushed out of Victoria Harbour."

Interested in Kiwanis?

The Kiwanis service club wants to establish a club in Docklands and has invited interested people to a meeting on May 7.

Kiwanis member Peter Cameron said the meeting would be held at the RACV Club in Bourke St, Melbourne, at 6pm.

Mr Cameron said Kiwanis was primarily focussed on helping children.

"The Kiwanis Club of Melbourne is looking at the needs of the Docklands community with the intent of establishing a new club there," Mr Cameron said.

"We are holding our regular meeting on May 7 and are inviting people living and working in the Docklands area to come along to our meeting to discover more about Kiwanis."

Docklands dodges a bullet

Docklands shook a monkey off its back last month when the spectre of a choking bridge across the entrance to Victoria Harbour was finally ruled out by the State Government.

For the past decade, the Port of Melbourne Corporation has been threatening to build a low rail bridge just downstream of the Bolte Bridge with neither Labor nor Coalition state governments ruling it out.

The bridge was designed to be only eight metres above the water and Docklanders were united in opposing the plan because of its potential disruption to marine traffic.

A year ago, the Coalition Government's announcement that Hastings would become Victoria's second container port relieved tensions in Docklands about the bridge.

But the plan was never officially shelved until April 24 when the Ports Minister Denis Napthine announced a major redevelopment of Webb Dock in Port Melbourne. The Government announced a \$1.2 billion expansion of Webb Dock and the creation of 2600 jobs.

The announcement created renewed fears that the rail bridge would be commissioned to move freight across the river to the port's major freight handling facilities at its Dynon operation.

Questioned by *Docklands News* at a press conference, Dr Napthine said none of the extra one million twenty-foot equivalent units (TEUs) of containers expected at Webb Dock would be moved by rail.

He said all the freight would be loaded onto trucks, which would access the Westgate Freeway via specially-built port access roads.

The Premier Ted Baillieu explained that the expansion at Webb Dock was an interim measure while the Port of Hastings was brought on stream.

Port officials said the rail bridge option was considered but, ultimately, the decision was influenced by the state's major importers who generally had freight terminals only a short distance away and preferred road delivery.

Expect action, says Lord Mayor

In putting himself forward for a second term as Lord Mayor, Cr Robert Doyle says Docklanders could expect action under his stewardship.

"We can all agree on a plan, but someone's got to deliver it," he said when asked how Docklands would fare if someone else was Lord Mayor after this October's municipal

"Some of the things that I have done are to bring Docklands into a wider conversation, being very aware of the problems of Docklands and offering rate relief for the Harbour Town people to try to help them while the wheel is being rebuilt and making it the heart of the world community around sustainable urban development by bringing the C40 cities here," he said.

"These are the things that I have done – not talked about – done," he said.

Cr Doyle said implementing the City of Melbourne and Places Victoria's Docklands Community Plan (known as D2 – second decade of Docklands) was only part of what he planned to do for Docklands if elected for a second term.

"It's partly D2. It's partly about continuing with Docklands' sustainable urban development and it's partly making the infrastructure decisions now to ensure that Docklands is well linked into the city," he said.

Cr Doyle said Melburnians of the future would consider Docklands as part of the central city area.

But he said it was possible for Docklands to maintain its own culture and character while being part of a larger CBD.

Cr Doyle said Docklands' architecture, its focus on the water and its sustainability defined the suburb.

"But an area is given its culture, its feel and its character by people. And the Docklands community is developing its own culture," he said

"There are more vertical communities in Docklands than anywhere else, which is a very modern way of living – where

residential and commercial and retail sit very comfortably side-by-side or often on top of each other in the same building."

"You don't want it to be a replica of anything else. You want it to develop in its own way."

Cr Doyle said he could envision Docklands as Melbourne's equivalent of Circular Quay in Sydney with Victoria Harbour becoming the focus of commercial and recreational boating activity.

He said he supported the search for commercially-viable water transport solutions to connect Docklands with Federation Square.

"Docklands' striking architecture defines it and I think the water is a key thing. For 150 years, Melbourne turns its back on the water," he said.

"But the most important thing to me is its sustainability. That is something that is the envy of the world. We have shown in Docklands that sustainability and prosperity can go hand in hand."

Docklands turns it on

Docklands was at its sparkling best in early April for the Australian Dragon Boat Championships.



Having experienced what has been claimed to be our best weather in 50 years, the 2600 athletes left Docklands with an overly-exaggerated favourable impression of life on Melbourne's waterfront.

A carnival atmosphere permeated the suburb for the six days of competition from Saturday, March 31 until Thursday, April 5. Competitors were easy to spot, with most carrying their trusty paddles on their backs as they disembarked from trams or emerged from locally rented accommodation.

Organiser David Nairn attributed the fine weather to the extra effort that Buddhist monks put into the opening ceremony.

"They went over and above what was expected from them during their blessing ceremony," he joked.

Mr Nairn said it would not be Victoria's turn to again host the championships for another six years so it was impossible to say if they would return to Docklands.

"If it was an annual event, no doubt there would be a lot of support for returning to Docklands," he said.

Sadly, the event was marred by tragedy on the first day with the death of South Australian competitor Peter Bristow. As a mark of respect, interstate racing was cancelled and it is understood that in future championships the "state day' trophy will be named in his honour.

There was also drama with a capsized boat on day three of the competition and at least one team lost its drummer overboard.

One negative aspect of the carnival was the deliberate damage to six Norfolk Island Pines during the erection of marquees.

Mr Nairn said he was disappointed with Harts Party Hire, the events company responsible for the damage, as it had performed very well in every other aspect.

Places Victoria said there was no suggestion that anyone would be prosecuted over the damage to the Norfolk Island Pines.

Mr Nairn said the derelict state of the raised wharves on Harbour Esplanade needed to be addressed if Docklands was to seriously compete for similar events.



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New Docklands bridge

Planning Minister Matthew Guy has announced a new bridge to connect Northwharf and Docklands.

Mr Guy called the bridge "the final piece of the jigsaw" after he acted to amend the Melbourne Planning Scheme, making sure the bridge could be delivered by the predicted 2013 date of completion.


The bridge links bicycle and pedestrian access under the Charles Grimes Bridge near the ANZ Centre.

The Minister is calling for the public to come forward with ideas for a name, saying: "I am delighted to announce the final stage of the Northbank project can now commence and invite Victorians to submit ideas to name the distinctive bridge that builds on Melbourne's revitalised waterfront precinct."

A trip down memory lane for sailors

A group of World War II veterans enjoyed a day out on the water in Docklands on April 7 aboard one of the world's last surviving Fairmile patrol boats.

Currently in service as a pleasure craft, Keith Rankin's boat Challenger was originally built for the Australian army in 1946.

For 85-year-old Hub Davis's mates and their families, the tour to Williamstown and back on Easter Saturday was a dream come true.

"It was truly marvellous," Mr Davis said. "We couldn't have asked for a better day. It was a great success and everyone on board, from six-year-olds to 90-year-olds, had a great time."

The veterans are members of the Fairmile Association of Australia, having served on the wooden vessels, as well as their close relatives Harbour Defence Motor Launches and Air Sea Rescue boats

Mr Davis said a member of the group came

across the existence of Challenger while researching Fairmile vessels.

"The trip came about entirely due to the Keith's generosity, which I suspect is considerable," Mr Davis said.

He said the tourists passed around the hat and collected a "miserable" amount which they attempted to give Keith to at least cover the afternoon tea on board. "I'm 85 and I'm the youngest so it was great that Keith was able to treat us all this way before we 'cross the bar' into the next world," Mr Davis said.

He said the invitation for the trip went Australia-wide, but only veterans from Victoria and NSW managed to attend.

"As you could imagine, it's not easy for us to get to events like this," Mr Davis said.

The group was delighted to be taken to Williamstown for an up-close, waterside look at the restored mine sweeper HMAS Castlemaine as well as a corvette.

Mr Davis explained that only six or seven members now attend the group's quarterly meeting in Williamstown these days.

"We're getting old. A lot of us can no longer drive and the train is unmanageable too," he said.

He said, while the Challenger no longer resembled a Fairmile above the deck, the trip was nostalgic for the group.

He said the British-designed Fairmiles were built all around the world during the war.

"Out of 35 built here, the army only had two, with most of them being built for the navy for anti-submarine duties," he said.

"They were a heavily-armed vessel with cannon, machine guns and depth charges," he said

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Mission reveals its secrets

Docklands' historic Mission to Seafarers has received museum accreditation after 150 years of service.

The museum accreditation will mean dozens of boxes of ancient items found at the Mission to Seafarers in Flinders St will now be stored with maximum conservation techniques and appropriate research.

The Mission to Seafarers' heritage collection manager, Monica Cronin, said she was relieved "all the dusty old boxes of stuff weren't just thrown out".

"I came in after I was contacted by the Mission's CEO Andrea Fleming and was amazed that there were stories here from around Melbourne's first settlement through until today," Ms Cronin said. "Now we're in the process of cataloguing everything and identifying what we've got."

Six interns from Deakin University and Melbourne University are currently helping Ms Cronin read every letter and study hundreds of photographs in order to understand their significance.

Ms Cronin said the interns had to study the mission's collection of letters, some of them dating back to 1865, pinpoint important dates and research them more thoroughly.



"When you look through these things you get a who's who of Melbourne and it's really quite impressive to see some pretty big names," Ms Cronin said. "We're building this gorgeous timeframe of what was happening and who was involved."

Ms Cronin said one of the mission's most impressive displays was its collection of letters sent from a 16-year-old sailor to his mother at the end of World War II.

The letters, written by Alan Quin, reveal amazing stories of his adventures at sea.

"It's fantastic because we get this very personal understanding of seafaring life," Ms Cronin said. "Embedded in amongst all the adventure are things like 'Mum, can you please wax my surf ski'?"

Hundreds of photographs taken around the world have also been discovered at the mission.

Ms Cronin said the amazing pictures were "a snapshot of time".

"There are hundreds of photographs of America in the early 1900s and it is a completely different place today."

Ms Cronin said she was hoping the museum accreditation would create an awareness of the importance of the Mission to Seafarers' building.

"People may know what the building is but they don't know what happens behind the facade," Ms Cronin said. "Seafarers are crucial to economic stimulation but they have a pretty lonely and isolated situation to be in and that is why we are here."

Ms Cronin said the volunteers at the Mission to Seafarers were extremely proud of the museum accreditation.

"We think it's all pretty special because it's not just the mission's story, it's Melbourne's story," Ms Cronin said.



Councillor is shown the issues

A group of Docklanders took Melbourne City councillor Cathy Oke on a walking-tour last month to show her first-hand their issues with open space.

Docklander Dawn Linnett said Cr Oke offered to come to Docklands to see residents' issues during a recent consultation at the town hall to discuss open space.

On April 13, the residents took Cr Oke to Northbank, South Wharf, Yarra's Edge and Victoria Harbour. Ms Linnett said the group pointed out opportunities for greening, lighting, additional public facilities, wind mitigation and suggestions of where dogs could be walked off their leashes.

"We had lots of suggestions about how Docklands could become more peoplefriendly," Ms Linnett said.


Cr Oke said the personal tour came about during a discussion at the town hall about specific issues in Docklands.

'Let's Go Together' iPhone app

Access Melbourne has launched an iPhone application which will allow Docklanders to meet and share car trips with friends and co-workers.

The *Let's Go Together* app enables users to post their travel plans and mode of transport online in order to share transport with people going in the same direction.

Urban Transport's David Meiklejohn said the app was a perfectly safe way to share transport as its users could restrict who they wanted to share their journey.

"It's based on an idea of trust so you can look at who you know and which of your friends are making particular trips at certain times," Mr Meiklejohn said.

Mr Meiklejohn said the app was an important part of the solution for freeing up Docklands' congested tram stops and Southern Cross Station.

"Docklanders face a particular set of transport problems that aren't faced by CBD workers," Mr Meiklejohn said.

"If I'm standing on a corner in the city there are three train stations nearby that I can easily access whereas in Docklands there is just the one station."

Mr Meiklejohn said the app had the potential to save Docklanders a lot of money on transport fees.

"ANZ, Myer, Ericsson and NAB are close to one another in Docklands and if they've got people going out to the same area, whether it's to the airport or somewhere else, then there is an opportunity to be able to coordinate trips," Mr Meiklejohn said.

"It's \$50 for a taxi to the airport and if there are 10 or 20 people doing that a day, with no co-ordination, then it becomes pretty expensive for businesses and individuals."

Mr Meiklejohn said the app did not just have to be used to share taxi rides but could also be used by friends who wanted to meet for lunch or drinks.

"At the moment we don't have any hard goals about how many customers we want signed up because it's free," Mr Meiklejohn said. "We really just want to see how people in Melbourne, and Docklands in particular, use it"



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GREETINGS FROM THE

Greetings everybody

Firstly it was great to hear Lord Mayor Robert Doyle state that a priority of his for Docklands is the greening of our area, meaning more attention to the provision of trees and parkland. I don't think he meant Greening politically!

Regarding the proposed new community centre and library, a council manager gave a presentation to the DCA showing the design and layout of the stand-alone building, construction of which is due to commence in coming months. It is to be located at the junction of Bourke and Collins streets in Victoria Harbour. It will contain separate areas for rest and recreation.

In response to our request, council is including space for community meetings for up to 100 people. Of course the space will not sit idle and will be used for other activities and we hope it will be available for meetings as required. Currently we usually

have nowhere to go for meetings of say 50 or more as the existing small Hub building is normally booked out. The new facility will be very welcome.

To our knowledge there is still no decision by Minister Guy in relation to the MAB development plans for NewQuay Central / Waterfront City, to which council and ourselves lodged objections.

The Victorian Electoral Commission has decided against a return to a ward system for the City of Melbourne citing, in particular, concern to ensure that the central business and commercial district [CBD] continues to be not hindered by or given inadequate consideration due to individual ward issues. Community groups strongly objected on the other hand on the grounds that ward councillors were needed because they have an interest in and look after local issues. Unfortunately that is not going to happen.

I convened and chaired an inaugural meeting in April of nearly 20 chairs of owners' corporations of major residential buildings in the CBD, Southbank, South Melbourne and Docklands, the purpose of which is to pool information and exchange views on various aspects of operations and issues affecting residents and to make submissions to governments as appropriate.

A major issue discussed was the State Planning Minister Matthew Guy's promotion of more extensive hi-rise development. Southbank and Docklands are already being crowded with high-rise - Southbank in particular, which will have the addition of the recently-approved, 71-storey tower on the Queensbridge Hotel site. This is being strongly objected to by residents in the area, but the Government has stipulated that no objections will be allowed or considered for any development over 25,000 sqm.

Problems inherent in excessive concentration of high-rise include lack of sunlight, privacy and open space, plus the addition of wind tunnels and traffic congestion. Matthew Guy stated his vision is a Manhattan-style skyline. However Manhattan / New York is ranked about 50th in the most liveable cities of the world.

Also discussed were OC legislation, strata management, and VCAT applications. Consolidated submissions by the chairs' group are to be formulated. The group has decided to meet quarterly with the next meeting in July.

Liaison with community groups will be a subject for consideration. There is already some liaison by reason of chairs or other OC committee members being represented on

community association committees but this representation could be increased.

We continue to keep members informed of upcoming activities, with updated listings of Etihad events, Hub Happenings and separate council-approved events. Notice the replica of Captain Cook's Endeavour is visiting Docklands.

DCA representatives attended a briefing by the Port of Melbourne Authority on its expansion plans. Importantly, the authority has advised me that the feared rail bridge is not going to happen and is not in their future

Stephen's CDs can also be purchased at the bar for \$15 each.


The Mission of Seafarers used to be a meeting place for Melbourne's sailors. Sailors would work out there in the gym and rest up there before they went out to sea.



The Endeavour is currently nearing the end of her 2011-2012 circumnavigation of Australia. When she leaves Melbourne she will spend five days in Eden before finishing her yearlong circumnavigation and returns to Darling Harbour where she normally resides.

planned voyages. Her next voyage, for which bookings have closed, is a 13-day trip to Lord Howe to observe the Transit of Venus - an event when the planet Venus moves across the sun on June 6, 2012. This is the same day as the D-Day Normandy landings of 1944 coincidentally! The next time this celestial event will take place is December 2117 - so

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

Flames burn brightly at home

Local dragon boaters the Melbourne Flames took full effect of their home ground advantage at last month's national championships, returning its best result ever.

The Flames won seven trophies over the six day tournament – a significant improvement on 2011 when it came away with a single victory.

Team captain Karen Morris said: "As I reflect now I could only have imagined what was possible for us on our home ground. I have to say that seven trophies, two of those gold were beyond that imagination ..."

"The results by our club at the 2012 nationals will go down as our best-ever performance," she said.

Flames President Rene Gielen said: "The seven trophies we won as a club are the magnificent icing on a big cake we've been working so hard on all season! Again, we win them as a club, so everyone should be very proud of these great results!"

On day two the club won silver over 500 metres in the Masters Mixed 10s and bronze in the Premier Mixed 10s. On day three the Masters Women 10s won silver over 500 metres and the club came in third in the Premier Mixed 20s two km race.

Day four was golden for the Flames with victories over 200 metres for both the

Masters Mixed 10s and Premier Mixed 10s. And on day five, the Masters Women 10s won silver over 200 metres.

Apart from the wins, the club also achieved other noteworthy results . The grand masters made the grand final, as did the premier 20 women, who missed out on a 2km medal by a mere 0.8 of a second!

Club coach Serghei Cucsa said the results were well deserved but believes there is plenty of improvement in the paddlers yet.

"We can do better and I'm looking forward to the year ahead as we continue to build our team's success and our club following this performance," he said.

Twelve club members are also heading to Busan, South Korea in September this year to compete for Australia in the national "Auroras" squad. Ten will go as paddlers, one as an official and the club's coach is going as the head coach of the squad. One of the paddlers, Georgina Wakim, has also been chosen as vice-captain of the national squad.
