Family fireworks secretly scuttled

In their last action before being sidelined by municipal elections, Melbourne's councillors last month secretly scrapped Docklands' New Year's Eve 9.30pm family fireworks.

In making their decision behind closed doors on September 25, councillors claim to have been persuaded by concerns about crowd safety.

Cr Kevin Louey told *Docklands News* he had no idea why the matter needed to be discussed in secret but Cr Jackie Watts said it was just another example of the dominant faction restricting public scrutiny of council decision-making.

She said, because the matter had been classed confidential, she was legally prevented from revealing any details about the discussion. She said this was a deliberate tactic to stifle debate and dissent.

Because the decision was taken in secret, there is no public record of how councillors voted. And, because the council will not meet again, the decision cannot be overturned until a new council is elected.

Cr Louey claimed that there was unanimous support for discontinuing the family fireworks at Docklands.

He said councillors appreciated the value that the event brought to Docklands but had no choice when confronted with advice from safety staff who warned that someone could be killed in the crush after the event.

He said the problem area was the Bourke St pedestrian concourse at Southern Cross Station where crowds leaving the early fireworks met revellers coming the other way to view the midnight fireworks show. Docklands Community Association (DCA) president Roger Gardner said the alleged safety issues had not been raised in the past.

"I responded that we had not heard of such problems in previous years and that families enjoy the earlier event with their children and it draws a large crowd to the area," Mr Gardner said.

"Interestingly, council proposed withdrawal of the earlier 9.30 event in 2009 but was forced to reinstate it following protests. The reason given by council on that occasion was cost, on the basis that it was too expensive."

A council spokesperson said reports alleging safety concerns would not be released.

"This item was confidential because the report contained information which, if released, would prejudice the council or any person," the spokesperson said.

Docklands Chamber of Commerce president Stephen Clement said that, while bitterly disappointed, it was important to concentrate on making the Docklands NYE celebrations better than ever.

He said council officers had vowed to make the event world-class so that revellers would be inclined to stay in Docklands until after the midnight fireworks display.

The council has offered Docklands \$150,000 to fund either one or two events in the new year as "compensation" for the cancellation of the family fireworks.

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No school in sight

Docklands is no closer to getting a school of its own after South Melbourne was last month announced as the preferred site for a new government school.

The site of the new school, at 129-161 Ferrars St, is just over 3km from Docklands, which means it could be an option for Docklands families. However, they may not be welcome.

"Depending on enrolment numbers, students in the Docklands area may be accommodated," a spokesperson for Education Minister Martin Dixon said.

The spokesperson said it was too early in the design and development stage to confirm enrolment boundaries for the South Melbourne school.

Meanwhile, Docklands parents continue to consider various education options outside of Docklands.

Jewel Love has lived in Docklands with her husband and three-and-a-half-year-old daughter Ananda for the past year-and-a-half (pictured above).

The family has started thinking about options for Ananda's education, but choices are limited.

Ms Love said the closest schools would still require driving through plenty of traffic.

"I imagine families will stop moving here if there are no options for schooling," Ms Love said

Mytreyi Tanikella, mother of three-year-old twin boys, Kameswara and Karitikeya, said the lack of a local school in Docklands would cause her family to move.

Martin Dixon's spokesperson said student growth in Port Melbourne and South Melbourne was further advanced than in Docklands. However, the report identifies Docklands and Southbank as areas set for significant population growth.

The report says that in 2011 there were 285 children aged between five and 12 recorded in Docklands and Southbank. By 2031 this number is expected to grow to 2250.

Considering the expected growth in the school-age population, the community continues to advocate for a school in Docklands.

"We'd like to think that the idea of a school in Docklands is being pursued because of the growing population," Docklands Community Association president Roger Gardner said.

Well done Hatem Saleh

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So far, so good for community forum

The Docklands Community Forum (DCF) met for the first time last month and so far there are only positives to report.

The first public meeting brought together an interesting group of people, each with their own opinions about what Docklands needs.

Forum representatives, interested members of the public, and staff from Places Victoria and City of Melbourne were in attendance.

Two new faces had also joined the DCF in the form of a youth representative and a Docklands Chamber of Commerce (DCC) representative.

When the DCF representatives were announced in August a youth representative had not been identified, however Lauren Basser has since joined the forum in this role.

Due to the results of the recent DCC election

(reported on page 6) Stephen Clement has replaced Elena Tsapatolis as the chamber representative.

After witnessing the first meeting of the DCF, the signs seem positive.

The forum has great potential to lead Docklands into its second decade and so far it seems to be heading in the right direction.

It was clear at the first meeting that huge consideration had gone into making it work.

The layout of the meeting room itself, with two rows of chairs arranged around a table, created a feeling of openness and encouraged discussion.

And it wasn't just the DCF representatives

who had the opportunity to voice concerns or ask questions at the forum meeting.

While the members of the DCF are certainly the figureheads of the forum all attendees seemed to be equal in terms having the chance to speak.

The presence of a facilitator meant every voice had an opportunity to be heard.

There was a sense of balance about the forum, with no single person leading the direction of the meeting.

At the start of the meeting the DCF representatives spoke about themselves and why they had joined the forum.

Each person had a different story to tell, a

different connection with Docklands and a different motivation for joining the DCF.


They each highlight a different aspect of Docklands that deserves to be recognised.

Amongst the group is a voice for local families, a voice for local businesses and a voice for the waterways.

The members of the DCF will represent the community at forum meetings and two alternating DCF representatives will attend Docklands Steering Committee meetings.

They have a real opportunity to make sure the voice of Docklands is heard.

The DCF has got off to a good start; let's hope it continues.



Conder goes green

The iconic blue Conder tower has gone green.

The NewQuay tower is believed to be the first apartment building in Docklands to install environmentally-friendly LED downlights.

The tower has installed LED lights in all common areas, including the foyer, lifts, corridors and gym.

Leading the LED installation project was Ray Mascaro, a member of the Conder Owners Corporation (OC), who has lived in the building for the past five years.

Mr Mascaro said the decision to install LED downlights was an easy one for the OC, when it considered the economic and environmental advantages.

Most lights in the common areas of the building are on 24 hours a day, seven days a week. And because LED lights use substantially less energy than halogen globes, this results in a considerable energy saving.

LED downlights use only eight watts compared with halogen globes, which use 50.

Mr Mascaro said while LED lights cost more than a standard halogen globe, they were more cost-effective in the long run and were more environmentally friendly.

He said for lights that were on all the time, the cost of installation would be recouped in

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"When you do the calculations and how much you pay for the energy, the electricity and for the cost price of the unit, you get the cost of having it installed back in seven and a half months," Mr Mascaro said.

The lights also have a longer lifespan than halogen globes, meaning less maintenance and less waste in landfill.

Mr Mascaro said he was sure many other Docklands apartment towers would follow suit and join the Docklands energy saving revolution.



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Museum remembers 9/11

Docklands' Victoria Police Museum is currently hosting the only Australian exhibition of '9/11: A Uniform Response'.

The photographic exhibition features 22 images of the 2001 New York attacks, taken by Associated Press photographers.

The exhibition recounts the devastation, the aftermath and the journey to recovery.

New York City Police Museum and Associated Press created the exhibition as a way of paying tribute to the New York City Police Department and other emergency service first-responders.

The exhibition first opened at the New York Police Museum last year.

Victoria Police Museum public programs curator, Kate Spinks (pictured above),

contacted the New York Police Museum late last year to discuss the possibility of bringing the exhibition to Docklands.

The exhibition is the first time it has been shown outside New York.

American Consul General Frank Urbanic and Victoria Police assistant commissioner Andrew Crisp opened the exhibition on September 11, marking the 11th anniversary of the attack.

Ms Spinks said the photos featured in the exhibition, particularly those taken on the day of the attack, captured a feeling of immediacy.





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A multifaith place for Docklands?

Docklands could become home to Australia's first public multifaith facility.

In August, Places Victoria called for expressions of interest from parties interested in developing a place of worship in Docklands.

The Faith Communities Council of Victoria (FCCV) is currently preparing its expression of interest, outlining a plan to build a multifaith facility.

The FCCV is a Victorian multifaith organisation and includes representatives from each of the peak faith bodies in Victoria including the Islamic Council of Victoria, the Hindu Communities Council, Baha'i Victoria, the Victorian Council of Churches and the Jewish Community Council of Victoria

FCCV multifaith officer, Sandy Kouroupidis, said multifaith prayer rooms could often be found in places like hospitals and universities, however the proposed multifaith facility would be the first public, stand-alone facility.

Rabbi Jonathan Keren-Black said he believed the FCCV would be the only multifaith organisation to submit an expression of interest to build a place of worship.

If its tender is successful, the organisation

hopes to provide a facility that caters to a wide range of faiths while, at the same time, providing community facilities for Docklands.

Father Bob Maguire, while not directly involved with the FCCV bid, supports the idea

"I've been thinking about this for years and years and years," he said.

Ideas for the space include at least two rooms for religious activities, theatre seating to provide opportunities for faith and community theatre groups, a cinema, childcare facilities and a peace garden, possibly on the roof of the building.

Freeman Trebilcock, FCCV multifaith youth consultant and CEO of youth organisation Interaction, said the space would add value to Docklands and to the wider Melbourne community.

Before submitting its expression of interest the organisation is seeking feedback from the local community about what they would like to see in a Docklands place of worship.

Docklanders in the council election mix

Six Docklanders are running for council in the upcoming election.

This is double the number of Docklanders who stood at the last election in 2008.

And four of the six Docklanders running are on the same ticket. On the ticket is former Chamber of Commerce president Keith Rankin, who is running for Lord Mayor with the Harbour Kitchen's Grace Han as his deputy.

Also on the ticket are Gerard Anderson and Maree Norris, who are running for councillor positions.

Mr Rankin said, if elected, the team would build on the council's existing investments in Docklands by advocating for new infrastructure, improvements to the waterways and new mooring facilities.

He said his team was committed to delivering outcomes that would make Melbourne a more liveable city.

These include improvements to parks and gardens, new cycling infrastructure and planning controls that protect the character of neighbourhoods and providing a stronger voice for the community.

Michele Anderson is another Docklander who is running for one of the nine councillor positions.

Ms Anderson has lived in Docklands for 10 years and is running for the position of councillor, alongside Stephen Mayne.

"I believe the community should be listened to and council should be a true representation of both businesses and residents," Ms Anderson said.

Ms Anderson's policies refer to the issue of short-term accommodation.

She said buildings in Melbourne should be either residential, with a minimum 30-night stay, or purpose-built accommodation buildings.

The sixth local running for election is Sally Hewitt, who is seeking a councillor position on Gary Singer and John So's ticket. Ms Hewitt's policies for Docklands include more control over serviced apartments, holding developers accountable, rationalisation of the management bodies that have authority over Docklands and a greater focus on tourism through a 5-star destination hotel.

The Docklanders are among nine leadership teams vying for the roles of Lord and Deputy Lord Mayor and 40 individuals running for nine available councillor positions.

Docklanders will have a chance to hear from the candidates at a "Meet the Candidates" night on October 16 from 7pm at Watermark.

The Rotary Club of Docklands will host the event, which will be chaired and moderated by *Docklands News's* Shane Scanlan.



New president for chamber

Docklands Chamber of Commerce (DCC) has a new president.

Chamber executive member and ING Waterfront City project manager, Stephen Clement, was elected at the DCC annual general meeting on September 18.

Outgoing president, Keith Rankin was elected in 2007 and the presidency had not previously been contested.

Chamber executive member Joh Maxwell was elected vice-president.

Rick Deering will continue his role as DCC treasurer, John McGaw will maintain his role as secretary and Mark Wilson and Sally Hewitt will continue as executive members.

New to the DCC executive are Josephine Tan, Bill Reid and Shane Scanlan.

After the result of the election was announced Mr Rankin said he wished the new committee the best and said he would continue to support the chamber.

"I will be happy to help as long as I'm asked," Mr Rankin said.

New vice-president Joh Maxwell said the committee would be a new and invigorated Docklands Chamber of Commerce, which would bring together the big and small end of business in Docklands.

Places Victoria chair steps aside

Places Victoria chairman Peter Clarke has stood aside, pending an Australian Securities and Investment Commission (ASIC) prosecution.

ASIC alleges improper conduct by Mr Clarke and four other former directors of Australian Property Custody Holdings Ltd (APCH).

ASIC claims the APCH directors breached their duties to Prime Trust members when they approved a \$33 million payment to managing director Bill Lewski.

APCH and Prime Trust were placed into liquidation in November 2011. ASIC is seeking to disqualify Mr Clarke and the other directors from managing corporations.

Places Victoria has appointed its deputy chairman Ken Fehily as acting chairman.

Places Victoria and Planning Minister Matthew Guy declined to comment on the investigation. Mr Clarke is legally prevented from commenting on the case but is contesting the charges.



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Riding to work has never been easier

Docklands businesses are embracing sustainable transport and making it easier for employees to ride to work, City of Melbourne research has shown.

For the first time the Census of Land Use and Employment (CLUE) has investigated how many businesses provide facilities for

The results showed that 26 Docklands buildings had under-cover facilities for 2136 bicycles. Sixteen of these buildings also had shower facilities.

Medibank Private's Docklands office currently has secure parking for 95 bikes and showers on every floor, and is looking to provide even better facilities when it relocates in 2014.

Company secretary Steven Harris said Medibank encouraged employees to ride with MediBUG, a cycling group for employees, as well as subsidised riding gear.

"It's an important part of Medibank's mission for better health," he said.

Mr Harris, who rides each day from Hawthorn, said riding to work had numerous

"It energises me in the morning and destresses me in the evening."

Future Melbourne (Economic Development and Knowledge City) Committee Chair Cr Kevin Louey said providing facilities for

cyclists was good for business.

"Employers who encourage their staff to cycle to work benefit from increased productivity as a result of improved fitness and mental health," Cr Louey said.

The City of Melbourne last month also released an action plan outlining proposals to make Melbourne safer and more appealing to cyclists.

The draft Bicycle Plan 2012-2016 included as a high priority the need to upgrade the existing LaTrobe St bicycle route from Adderley St to Harbour Esplanade, improving linkages with Docklands.

Cr Louey said council had committed \$5.6 million to extend bike lanes and improve safety for Melbourne's cyclists.

Those keen to join the growing number of Docklands cyclists can head to the **Docklands Ride to Work Community** Breakfast on October 17.

The event will include free breakfast and coffee, plus the chance to have bikes checked by an expert bike mechanic and ID engraved by Victoria Police.

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Etihad chief farewells Docklands

In 12 years as chief executive officer of Etihad Stadium, Ian Collins has seen Docklands grow from an open area to a thriving suburb.

So it is with some sadness that Mr Collins said goodbye to Docklands when he retired at the end of September.

Mr Collins said the stadium was the catalyst that kick-started the development of Docklands, but the growth hadn't progressed as quickly as he would have liked.

"We've been operating a venue which attracts about 3 million people a year in a building site," he said.

"There's been some pretty aggressive debate at times about some of the construction and closing of roads, basically we [Etihad Stadium] have had to wear all that and are still doing that."

Mr Collins said that despite excellent public transport, access to Docklands by car was still a concern.

"In the end there are still a lot of people who drive their cars, and I don't think it's user-friendly for people to come into the area and park," he said. "Hopefully that will change; it's going to get busier as more people come here and more people live here."



Mr Collins said Docklands would continue to develop its own character, with its proximity to the water making it a highlight of the city.

"I hope things are put on by Melbourne City Council to attract people on a regular basis, whether it be carnivals, fireworks or other things that the general public can enjoy," he said

He warned that development should be carefully considered so the suburb didn't become "a concrete jungle".

"I don't think there's a lot of charm about some of the buildings that are being put up," Mr Collins said.

He added that Etihad Stadium was being

closed out by a lot of the new buildings and this detracted from the stadium's status as an iconic feature of Melbourne's skyline.

"You'll only be able to see it from across the railway lines to the east and across the Bolte Bridge to the west, so I think it does lose a little bit."

Mr Collins said the input of several organisations including Places Victoria, City of Melbourne and VicRoads meant decision-making about the area surrounding the stadium and Docklands in general was not always easy.

"I think it is improving but it's still got a fair way to go," he said.

Docklands imagined

If there were no limits, what would you change?

Students from Deakin University have re-imagined Docklands as part of a unit on "urban perspectives".

Unhindered by the constraints of existing plans and building regulations, the students had a fresh take on Docklands, which they presented to interested members of the community last month.

Culture, leisure and romance were three themes used by students Bart Curnow and Jandi Vagg to envision a different Docklands.

Culturally, the pair envisioned the construction of a government-funded art studio, a public graffiti wall, an outdoor exhibition space and an indoor or outdoor skate park.

When it came to leisure, they suggested an outdoor amphitheatre for performances, and movie screenings – together with a beach by the waterfront.

The main feature of their romantic scenario was an enclosed, glass walkway that

extended from the Southern Cross Station, across the Etihad Stadium concourse, down to Harbour Esplanade.

"This could be to connect the city and Docklands via a glass walkway or to culturally stimulate the area by attracting a variety of people through a series of events that have people coming back," Bart said.

Fellow Deakin students, Hayden Djakic and Jessica Edwards, had a different concept for Docklands.

Hayden said the key themes of their concept were ensuring there was a human scale in the development, and enough green space to complement the large portion of land taken up by infrastructure and buildings, reinforcing the importance of artwork in Docklands.



Local retailing leads the city

Retail and entertainment industry establishments in Docklands have doubled since 2006.

According to the Melbourne Retail Strategy 2006-2012 Year Six Report Card, released last month, retail and entertainment establishments in Docklands have grown from 211 in 2006 to 471 in 2012.

The report is the sixth and final in the series of report cards, which have been released yearly since 2006.

The strategy was an initiative of the City of Melbourne, the State Government and the Melbourne Retail Advisory Board.

The most recent report also showed that since 2006 the greatest retail growth in Melbourne has been outside the city centre, in Kensington, Southbank and Docklands.

The Year Six Report Card pointed to the Docklands' July Friday Fireworks as one of the ways City of Melbourne supported retail in Docklands.

According to the report, the fireworks drove an estimated 3000 people per show to Waterfront City.

A further four-year retail strategy was also announced at the launch of the report card.

The Lord Mayor and the Minister for Innovation, Services and Small Businesses and Minister for Tourism and Major Events, Louise Asher, announced the City of Melbourne and the State Government would fund a further four-year retail strategy for 2013 -2016.

A City of Melbourne spokesperson said the new strategy would continue much of the work that has been conducted over the past six years to ensure Melbourne retained, and built upon, its position as Australia's premier retail destination.



Ten years of maritime art

This month marks the 10th anniversary of the ANL Maritime Art Prize and Exhibition at The Mission to Seafarers building in Docklands.

The Mission to Seafarers Victoria (MtSV) introduced the award in 2002 and it has since become recognised as Australia's leading maritime art award.

Artists who enter work in the exhibition are asked to respond to the theme "the relationship between humanity and the sea".

MtSV CEO Andrea Fleming said many people had enjoyed and contributed to the exhibition.

"Maritime art is now perhaps a niche genre compared to the 17th-19th century and is well worthy of celebration, as is seen in this year's entries," Ms Fleming said.

Some 85 artists will be vying for the \$15,000 first prize at the exhibition this month.

Other prizes include the \$5000 Best in Traditional Maritime Art Award, the \$5000 Emerging Artist Award and the \$2000 People's Choice Award.

All works exhibited are for sale and contribute a 33 per cent commission towards supporting seafarers' welfare services in Victoria.



Renegades newest recruits

Cricketing great Merv Hughes is back for a second season with Docklands' own team, the Renegades.

Hughes, who was on the coaching panel last year, has signed on as a specialist coach for the upcoming KFC T20 Big Bash League.

"It's a new season and a new-look team and I'm very happy to be back on board," Merv

"It's an exciting time to be involved with the Renegades because a lot of guys have the opportunity to really prove themselves this summer."

The team has undergone a revamp coming into the second season of the Big Bash League.

Only five players from last year's team have signed on for the current season.

The team's most recent signing is former Adelaide Striker Brendan Drew. Drew is the team's 15th signing and has signed a oneyear contract.

Apart from the Strikers, the paceman has also played for Australia A, Tasmania and Gloucestershire.

"Melbourne's a two-team city, so the rivalry is something I'm really looking forward to," he said.



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Work starts on new library

Work has started on the \$13 million Docklands Library and Community Centre in Victoria Harbour.

Planning Minister, Matthew Guy, Lord Mayor Robert Doyle and Lend Lease's head of inner urban development, David Rolls, visited the library site last month to celebrate the start of construction.

The celebration started with a smoking ceremony performed by Wurundjeri elder Aunty Diane Kerr.

As Aunty Diane explained, the ceremony was a way of cleansing the site before the new library was built.

The library is being delivered through a partnership between Lend Lease, Places Victoria and the City of Melbourne.

A library was one of the key elements of the Docklands Community and Place Plan, published in July by Places Victoria and the City of Melbourne.

Mr Guy said work to be done over the second decade of Docklands, including the library and community works program, would see the suburb come to life.

"The next stage of this suburb is not about just building great big towers, the next stage of this suburb is about what we're here to launch, community infrastructure," Mr Guy said.

Cr Doyle confirmed the second decade of Docklands would involve a greater focus on the community.

"I think the people of Docklands could be forgiven for saying 'about time, about time," Cr Doyle said.

He said the last 10 years had been about getting Docklands up out of the ground and that the second decade would be about "reverse engineering".

He said this would involve "retrofitting" the infrastructure necessary to build community.

"I think we have here an historic moment for Docklands. It's when it becomes a community rather than a development site," the Lord Mayor said.

The library and community centre is set to become one of Australia's most modern community facilities.

Lend Lease's David Rolls said the consortium was aiming for a five-star green star rating. The three-storey building is being constructed from engineered timber and reclaimed hardwood.

Features of the library will include a technology hub, a large sheltered outdoor space along the promenade and community meeting rooms.

It is expected that the Docklands Library and Community Centre will be completed by late

Melbourne Flames bring home the bronze

Ten members of Docklandsbased dragon boat team, the Melbourne Flames, won bronze at the Asian Dragon Boat Championships last month.

The paddlers competed as part of the Australian dragon boat team, the Auroras, at the championships in Busan, South Korea.

The Auroras won six bronze medals out of a possible 10, with members of the Flames competing in each of the medal-winning events.

The team, which ranges in age from 18 to 60, competed in men's, women's and mixed events. Distances paddled ranged from 200 metres to five kilometres.

Melbourne Flames coach Serghei Cusca is also the coach of the Australian team.

Serghei said the result of the championships

was an excellent outcome for the team.

"Every single paddler came back with a medal," Serghei said.

According to Serghei, this was the first time every member of the Australian team had won a medal at the same event.

Melbourne Flames and Aurora team member, Karen Morris, said competing against some of the top teams in the world, including China and Tahiti, was a challenging experience.

"It's some of the hardest racing I've had to do," Karen said.

Captain of the Melbourne Flames, Georgina Wakim, also competed at the championships as vice-captain of the Australian team.

Georgina said being elected vice-captain and competing against some of the best paddlers in the world had been a rewarding experience.

"It was rewarding to be on the journey with a group who all wanted the same thing,"

GREETINGS FROM THE DOCKLANDS COMMUNITY

Greetings everybody.

It's great to see the weather warming up a bit.

I attended the induction meeting of the Community Forum on September 19. The group includes representatives from the Docklands Community Association, the Chamber of Commerce, Destination Docklands, waterways businesses and five individuals - comprising two business people, one worker, one young parent and one older resident. Meetings will be held every two months attended by council and Places Victoria officers.

An objective is to put forward views to the Docklands Steering Group which is a committee of officers who decide on strategies and action plans. I also attended the first programmed meeting on September 26.

I also attended on September 25 the launch by the Lord Mayor of the construction of the new community centre and library. Occupancy is scheduled for the end of 2013. Regrettably, council has informed us there will be no fireworks in Docklands at 9.30 pm this New Year's Eve. There will be a midnight one.

They say it is due to crowd management issues, not in Docklands itself, but in the merge afterwards with the crowds from the city.

I responded to the council director that we had not heard of problems in previous years and that families enjoy the earlier event with their children and it draws a large crowd to the area.

Interestingly, council proposed withdrawal of the earlier 9.30 event in 2009 but was forced to reinstate it following protests. The reason given on that occasion was cost, on the basis that it was too expensive when added to the cost of the other city displays. I think that we should lodge a protest in conjunction with the Chamber of Commerce whose businesses are also affected.

The DCA has been contacted by the new commander of the City West Police Station, Snr Sgt Michael Wilmot, who wanted to introduce himself and wishes to work closely with the Docklands community. He would like us

to become actively involved in the Precinct Policing Program, which we will do. We will arrange a date to meet with him later in the year after he returns from overseas.

Two other OC chairs, who are also DCA members, and myself met with Places Victoria officers including Simon Wilson who confirmed that MAB want to put more residential towers at the rear of the existing buildings on NewQuay East instead of lower commercial buildings as originally planned. The privacy, traffic, lack of adequate access and other problems were raised. We got no conciliatory response and will have to take the matter further.

Places Victoria has called for expressions of interest to provide a place of worship in Docklands. They refer to a possible site on Footscray Rd, south of Costco but will consider other suggestions from interested developers. As to how a religious denomination will be selected is unclear.

I would like to take the opportunity to point out that the DCA makes supporting comments on proposals that benefit

Docklands not only for residents but also for workers and businesses.

Examples are provision of recreation facilities, ferry service and redevelopment of Harbour Esplanade which we are pushing. We believe the esplanade is a focal point for entry from the city to Docklands and should be developed as a linear park not only for locals but for all visitors. Peter Clarke agreed with this in recent discussions.

On the other hand, if there are any issues such as traffic congestion, lack of car parking or any developer plans which are disadvantageous to residents and others, we will continue to say so and raise this with the authorities in an attempt to obtain corrective action.

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

Min was a little concerned about how Ponyo would react to the Docklands News camera, but he showed himself to be a star model.


Min has been a Docklands resident for seven


TWO ELECTIONS

- then number all the other boxes in the order of your preference.




Councillors

Most candidates are in groups, with any ungrouped candidates on the righthand side of the ballot paper. There is a horizontal line across the ballot paper, with group names above the line and individual candidates' names below the line.

Serviced apartments

The letter from Peter
Kelly (Letter to the Editor,
Docklands News, September)
demonstrates a sad lack of
awareness of the realities of
trying to live with serviced
apartments in residential
buildings that were not
designed for the purpose.

His suggestion that the serviced apartment issue has only developed within the last 18 months is patently incorrect, as any resident who has lived here longer than that could

My wife and I bought an apartment in The Nolan off the plan, and moved in when the building was completed.

Unlike the Conder, there was no suggestion at any stage during the sale process that serviced apartments would be an option in this building.

I suspect that the majority of resident owners would agree with me that, if they had known that the situation would develop as it has, then they would not have purchased an apartment here.

Gil King's letter in your August edition (although denigrated by Mr Kelly) was a good summary of the problems created by the mix of residential and short-term accommodation and I'm sure all resident owners and long-term tenants in NewQuay agreed with his sentiments.

Mr Kelly claims that all serviced apartment operators at NewQuay are "very responsible" and have helped to contribute to the area. He may well be right, however the following statistics for our building demonstrate why we consider there continues to be a problem.

There are 204 apartments in the Nolan; 60 of those are serviced apartments.

A summary of the reports from our security contractors show that from the beginning of 2012 to the middle of September there have been 206 reported instances of noncompliance with owners' corporation rules, some minor, many of them serious.

145 of those relate to the 60 serviced apartments; 47 relate to the 144 residential apartments. 14 could not be allocated to specific apartments but, in most cases, appear to be caused by visitors to the building.

That is, serviced apartments appear in this list approximately seven times more often than residential apartments. Don't let Peter Kelly tell you that residents cause as many problems as short-term visitors!

This is all in addition to the problems of overcrowding of lifts, damage to common property caused by visitors' luggage and cleaners' equipment, the additional expense to owners of upgraded security and cleaning time and the feeling of residents that their homes are being invaded by strangers who don't care about their building.

Serviced apartments do not work in residential buildings.

Docklands has so much development activity going on and, at the same time, it is driving away many young families and potential young families with kids because there is not a school.


It will be a waste at the end of the day.

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YOU CAN'T KNOCK POK POK

"Pok pok" is a Thai term to describe the sound of a pestle gently thumping spices in a granite mortar - a common background noise at the street eateries of Bangkok and throughout South-East Asia.

For business partners Ethan Chaikijkosi and Emily Lam, it was the perfect name for their new restaurant in Docklands, given the emphasis is on Thai street food.

"I came up with the 'street food' menu concept because I believe a lot of Aussies have traveled to Thailand and realise that traditionally Thai food in Australia is quite different to what they got in Thailand," Mr Chaikijkosi said.

"Especially with street food. We want to do good Thai street food."

Mr Chaikijkosi has gone to great lengths to include genuine Thai ingredients.

"Our ingredients in our dishes are pretty much what you get in Thailand," he said.

"I source our produce and many of the ingredients are hard to get, such as cherry egg plant in the curry. And acacia, which is very expensive. But that's what genuine Thai

Pok Pok's menu reads like a culinary tour of Thailand.

"I have all my favourite Thai dishes on my menu - a bit of everything," Mr Chaikijkosi said. "North, south, northeast and middle - Bangkok - all have different cultures and different influences in terms of cooking."

"South is influenced by Malaysia, north by

Burma, and northeast by Laos. I want to capture the contrast, but keep a touch to it that is similar."

Mr Chaikijkosi has found that Docklands office workers tend to have well-travelled taste buds.

"I find that people here are willing for a challenge; they have probably travelled to Thailand many times and know where we are coming from," he said.

"They have had a good experience in Thailand and now want to do it here. Someone had to step up and raise the bar. I want to be a different Thai restaurant from the other 400 who would rather be doing the same thing."

Mr Chaikijkosi, who came to Melbourne

in 1995 to study architecture, returns to Thailand every year to visit family and to see what's on the menu there.

"I find inspiration to expand my knowledge of food, and what we can do differently here in the future," he said.

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
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
