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# No joy for esplanade

Harbour Esplanade could remain a festering sore for decades as the State Government and the City of Melbourne admit they have no intention of completing the project in a hurry.

Although widely acknowledged as the key to the precinct's ultimate success, the five-hectare headache has been confined to the too-hard basket for nearly 10 years without any definitive solution in sight.

More than six years after the first powersharing arrangement between the council and Places Victoria, the parties are still to agree on a plan for the area.

Places Victoria seems determined to avoid committing to a detailed plan because it has no money to pay for it.

And the City of Melbourne appears to be hell-bent on a singular mission to restore heritage sheds to the Esplanade, no matter what direction a future master plan may take.

In 2008, Places Victoria revealed and consulted widely on its "Melbourne's

Verandah" master plan which it quickly shelved when it realised it had no money to pay for it.

The urban renewal authority is currently caught between a fundamental requirement to master-plan the area and its political desire to avoid raising a public expectation that something might actually happen.

In its most recent statement, Places Victoria said: "The development of Harbour Esplanade is a long-term project that will be staged over the next 10 -15 years, subject to available funding."

It says it is working towards a master plan, but warns the community not to expect a "Verandah"-style consultation saying it is "working towards releasing concept plans for the staged development of the waterfront within a few months".

Places Victoria Docklands manager Simon Wilson said consultation would only be sought on "further input about things like the amount of built form proposed and how Melburnians want to use public spaces on the waterfront."

A City of Melbourne spokesperson said: "While the council may put funding into the reinstatement of the heritage sheds, the wider project of completion of Harbour Esplanade is a State Government project."

There are many symbols demonstrating the parlous state of Harbour Esplanade and the sad fact that it won't be fixed any time soon.

Hortus, the glasshouse that is now covered by a tent, tells a story of impracticality, delay and unfulfilled promise.

Next to it, the up-again-down-again solid hoardings around the wharf areas to be demolished adjacent to Central Pier are an even greater symbol of dysfunction.

The fence was erected twice - once to the edge of Places Victoria's jurisdiction and six months later onto the area controlled by the City of Melbourne.

But perhaps the greatest symbol demonstrating the difficulties we face is a press conference held on Harbour Esplanade last December by Planning Minister Matthew Guy and Lord Mayor Robert Doyle.

It is well known that politicians like to pump themselves up. And they are pretty good at presenting an almost-empty glass as brimming over.

But to claim that the demolition of the condemned sections of wharf was the beginning of something wonderful was breathtaking in its audacity.

The wharves were a public danger and had already been fenced off to prevent anyone falling through them. The demolition should have been done years ago.

The Minister and Lord Mayor should have been embarrassed that the wharf areas had been allowed to deteriorate to this point.

But, without announcing any funding beyond the demolition, the pair claimed the

moment was the "start of the rejuvenation of Harbour Esplanade."

In reality, it has been more than five years since the re-development of Harbour Esplanade was announced with fanfare.

Since then, the authorities have only managed to move the tram tracks (the fences were not the only aspect of Harbour Esplanade to be done twice!).

The Guy/Doyle press conference was an ominous symbol. If this was the best news they could muster, how bad must the state's commitment to infrastructure be?

Any thoughts about a grand plan for Harbour Esplanade must be tempered against this background of economic austerity.

And, again, Docklands finds itself overgoverned to the point of paralysis. You have to wonder how far advanced Docklands would have been without "power-sharing" between Places Victoria and the City of Melbourne that started in 2007 and continues today.

If Harbour Esplanade had been the sole responsibility of either party, would we be in the same state of inactivity today?

We understand that Places Victoria and the council have been talking among themselves for years about the future of Harbour Esplanade.

The community has been expecting a round of consultations on a visionary master plan.

We believe that another master plan was actually prepared during 2012 but that 2013 was spent scaling back ambition and lowering expectation.

Consultation has been promised in coming

The community should prepare itself to be underwhelmed.

# Pet's day out

The NewQuay Piazza will be filled with the sounds of barking and hissing, squawking and purring this month, when Docklands' animal population meets later this month.

Docklands' pets (and their owners) are invited to come along to the piazza at midday on February 9 to join in the *Animate* – *Public Space* – *Docklands* event.

Local artist Amie Anderson and resident Lori Boys have collaborated on the event, which they hope will see both domestic and exotic species on show.

"The purpose of the day is to bring the Docklands locals together through the walking of their pets," Ms Anderson said.

"The project uses physical bodies, both animal and human to connect with the environment and the public space."

The event is part of *Lands*, a wider public art project being developed by Ms Anderson,

who is involved with The Food Court community arts space, which is part of the Docklands Spaces initiative.

Lands involves a series of public activation events both in the piazza and at Harbour Town and is being developed in collaboration with Docklands residents, workers and other artists.

"Whilst re-imagining and re-configuring the public space of the Docklands, the project encourages participation, community exchange and communication," Ms Anderson said.

"By using public space in unconventional and meaningful ways, new responses and identities can be formed in relation to the Docklands area," Ms Anderson said.

# BAB to rehear short-stay case

After two Supreme Court appeals, the Watergate short-stay case is set to return to the Building Appeals Board (BAB).

Following a hearing on December 2, Justice Geoffrey Nettle and Justice Robert Osborn returned their decision on December 12, affirming the earlier decision of the Supreme Court to return the case to the BAB.

A new BAB panel will hear the case, but a date for the hearings has not yet been set.

The short-stay saga began in 2011, when the City of Melbourne issued owners of short-term apartments in the Watergate with building orders.

The Watergate is classified as a Class 2 building and the orders required owners to comply with building regulations applicable to a Class 3 building, akin to a hotel or boarding house, or to cease trading.

Docklands Executive Apartments operator Paul Salter appealed the orders at the BAB, but in March last year the board released a decision upholding council's orders.

Mr Salter then successfully appealed the BAB's decision at the Supreme Court in May, with the case ordered back to the BAB.

However, before it could return to the BAB, the council appealed the Supreme Court decision.

But, as the December 12 decision revealed, this ultimately led to the same result, with the presiding justices upholding the initial Supreme Court decision and sending the case back to the BAB.

According to Mr Salter, the Court of Appeals decision was "a victory for common sense and equity".

"If people purchase an investment property, they should be entitled to offer those properties as fully self-contained residences. It shouldn't matter whether the occupants stay for a week or a year," Mr Salter said.

Mr Salter is a committee member of the Victorian Accommodation Services Association (VICASA), which is preparing a submission for the Victorian Government.

"We are confident the information and solutions offered by the association will help resolve any concerns the Government might have regarding the accommodation services that members provide," Mr Salter said.

In July last year, Planning Minister Matthew Guy said he would increase the power of owners corporations to regulate short-stay apartments.

In December he told *Docklands News* the Government was working with Consumer Affairs in order to support the actions the council had taken.

He said legislation empowering owners corporations could be enacted by early in

The Watergate OC was legally represented at the original BAB hearings but Watergate OC chair Barbara Francis said it would not be joining the rehearing of the case.

However, she said: "We will be fully supporting the City of Melbourne in the rehearing before the BAB."

Ms Francis said Watergate owners had recently re-elected the committee who had "worked tirelessly to eliminate the short-stay problem at Watergate apartments."

Of the 12 owners elected to the OC committee just one was a new representative.



# **Docklands Dragon** brings good luck

The dragon will be in Docklands until February 16 and is lit up each night by colourful lanterns.

A Chinese festival is also running in Docklands while the dragon is in town, featuring entertainment, stalls and exhibitions, as part of Melbourne's wider Chinese New Year celebrations.

Standing 10-metres tall at its highest point, the dragon was created by Chinese design company Sichuan Tianyu.

Eureka Skydeck, in partnership with WTC and the City of Melbourne, commissioned the dragon in the hope that 2014 will be the beginning of a long-term strategy for growing Chinese New Year celebrations across the city

"Melbourne has over 55,000 Chinese residents and there were more then 327,000 visitors to Victoria from China in the last year," Eureka Skydeck CEO John Forman said.

"New year is the biggest festival on the Chinese calendar and something that Melbourne celebrates within our Chinese precinct. We want to see the celebrations linked with Chinatown, through to Southbank and connect with the Docklands."

"There had been considerable local Chinese support and advice to bring the Docklands Dragon to life and there is real optimism for growth in future years," Mr Forman said.

Original plans for Chinese New Year saw the dragon situated at Sandridge Bridge in Soutbank, but Mr Forman said part of the funding agreement with City of Melbourne was that the dragon be installed at Docklands.

The council has contributed \$140,000

Year festival at Docklands from its Event Partnerships Program budget.

Councillor Beverley Pinder-Mortimer said the City of Melbourne was delighted to support the event.

"The City of Melbourne is keen for a further enhancement of the Chinese New Year celebrations across the city and I'd encourage all Melburnians to enjoy a night dragon," Cr Pinder-Mortimer said.

Mr Forman said it made sense to install the dragon in Docklands at Docklands due to its proximity to the water, with the future plans for Chinese New Year in Melbourne to have events linking down the river and to the waterfront.

"This is part of a bigger push to make Chinese New Year in Melbourne the biggest celebration outside of China," Mr Forman

"We're 100 per cent behind this great event and believe the extra visitation will help to raise the profile of our wonderful suburb," Mrs Maxwell said.

## **More trams** for commuters

An increasing demand for public transport to and from Docklands saw an extra 1200 tram services per week added last month.

Public Transport Victoria and Yarra Trams added the extra services on a range of routes, starting from Australia Day.

The route 75 tram, which originally travelled along Spencer St to Flinders St, will now travel along Harbour Esplanade, terminating at Etihad Stadium.

When combined with route 70 this will mean a tram to Flinders St leaving from Docklands every five minutes.

A further 26 weekday services have also been added to route 11, which travels to Victoria Harbour via Collins St.

More trams will now be running on the route during peak morning and evening periods, with services from West Preston to Victoria Harbour, via Collins St, now operating every 8 minutes.

When combined with route 48, this means a service every four minutes along Collins St to Docklands. The \$3.5 million Collins St tram extension work is also complete with tram routes 11, 48 and 31 now operating from the Dock Square terminus.

The 450-metre extension includes new tram tracks leading to a double track tram terminus at the newly created intersection of Collins St and Bourke St.

The tram track extension is part of Lend Lease's \$20 million Collins St road, pedestrian and tram network extension project and will provide a transport link to the emerging Dock Square.

At the launch of the extension Premier Denis Napthine said Docklands was one of the fastest growing residential and commercial



# A segway into tourism

We could soon see fleets of Segways rolling along the waterfront as the State Government moves to change regulations as part of a red-tape reform.

It had previously been illegal to operate the two-wheeled vehicles on roads and shared paths in Victoria.

But the restriction will be lifted to allow guided Segway tours around Melbourne.

The change in regulations was announced alongside 35 other red-tape reforms by Acting Premier Peter Ryan and Treasurer Michael O'Brien in January.

The change in regulations will need to go through Parliament and a licensing authority will need to be established before we'll see Segways in the neighbourhood, but one operator is definitely keen to get started.

Managing director of Segway Victoria Terry Smit said it was his company's application to government that gained the support of the red tape commissioner, John Lloyd, leading to the reform.

Mr Smit said Segway Victoria had made an application to Government to operate Segway tours in Melbourne about two years ago, but had been rejected.

The company was then invited to meet with the red-tape commissioner mid-last year.

According to Acting Premier Peter Ryan, the red-tape commissioner met with 25 different associations and a range of individual businesses before putting his reform proposals forward to government.

Mr Smit is eager to start operating Segway tours in Melbourne and has proposed a tour running along Southbank, over the Webb Bridge and through Docklands.

He said while there were no firm time frames in place at this stage he hoped the company would be operating in Melbourne in time for the next summer holiday season.

"We're delighted that this milestone has been achieved and are now waiting for the regulatory reforms that will make Segway tours in Melbourne possible," Mr Smit said.

The Victorian Tourism Industry Council (VTIC) is also pleased with the planned reform.

"We welcome this change by the State Government as Segway tours will diversify

the tourism experience and make Melbourne an even more enjoyable place to visit," VTIC chief executive Dianne Smith said.

Treasurer Michael O'Brien said 22 of the redtape reforms would be implemented in time to meet the Government's commitment of reducing 25 per cent of red tape by July 2014, with the other 15 reforms to be introduced in the near future. "The Coalition Government made a commitment to significantly reduce red tape by 25 per cent and we are on track to meet that target," Mr O'Brien said.

"Cutting red tape encourages business investment in Victoria and the removal of these 22 unnecessary regulations will contribute to delivering more than \$715 million in red tape savings to Victorian businesses and the wider economy."

Digital Harbour developer David Napier suspects that Places Victoria and the council have developed and scrapped a second master plan for Harbour Esplanade.

He said he was led to believe that a master plan would be released a year ago but nothing happened.

"Not only do we not have a plan, but we've got holes in the ground," Mr Napier said of the wharf rectification work currently happening on Harbour Esplanade.

Mr Napier said \$300 million of funding had been committed to Docklands as part of the Docklands Community and Place Plan and that some of this funding should be brought forward to get the job done.

"At least they will create the waterfront that will attract the community that will make Docklands work," Mr Napier said.

He said nowhere else in the world was an urban waterfront development attempted without first securing the shore area.

Despite no funding to complete the job, it's clear plenty of money has been spent on developing master plans for the esplanade.

BKK Architects was charged with developing the 2008 "Verandah" concept and *Docklands News* has established that the firm also worked on at least one other Harbour Esplanade master plan.

BKK co-founder Tim Black said his firm had worked on another Harbour Esplanade master plan around two or three years ago.

This master plan was a broader concept, which positioned Harbour Esplanade as the centre-piece of a plan stretching from the Yarra River to the Maribyrnong River.

He said the plan was shelved after it was caught up in "the change of government, changes in Places Victoria and changes in the funding environment".

Last December the Planning Minister Matthew Guy and Lord Mayor Robert Doyle staged a press conference on Harbour Esplanade to announce \$16 million to demolish derelict wharf areas.

Although committing to consult on a future master plan, neither party has committed any money to complete the project.



# Wheel boosts tourism trade New Places

Docklands got a tourism boost late last year when the Melbourne Star Observation Wheel officially opened on December 23.

And it already seems to be making a difference to the Harbour Town traders who have held on throughout the wheel's fiveyear rebuild.

Feedback from retailers since the wheel opened has been mostly positive.

Le Cirque Fine Foods owner and Docklands Community Forum small business representative Albert Morcos said his café had been busy since the wheel opened and the centre itself had a more positive atmosphere.

"In my opinion the centre now makes sense. We (the traders) are now part of a path leading to a major tourist attraction, rather than a path leading to a construction site."

"I've spoken to a lot of tourists who have ridden the wheel," Mr Morcos said.

"They don't know anything about its history but have seen it as they drive in from the airport and thought they should come and

According to a Melbourne Star spokesperson, since opening the observation wheel has welcomed more than 55,000

Deputy Premier and Minister for State Development Peter Ryan was the first passenger to ride the wheel at the opening.

He said the Melbourne Star would further enhance Melbourne's reputation as a leading tourism destination as well as significantly boosting Docklands' economy.

"I look forward to the Melbourne Star attracting hundreds of thousands of visitors, enticing people to Melbourne from overseas, interstate and the regions," Mr Ryan said.

The wheel's designer and manufacturer, Sanoyas Rides Australia purchased the 120-metre-high wheel from ING Real Estate Development last year and it continues to be managed by the Melbourne Star

Management group CEO Chris Kelly said the opening was an important day for Melbourne and Docklands.

"Melbourne Star offers more then a ride on a giant observation wheel," Mr Kelly said.

"It is a significant tourism landmark that, through a host of exciting new features, will provide a new introduction to Melbourne and a new perspective on the city."

But, in keeping with its tumultuous history, it has not been completely smooth sailing since the wheel opened for business.

One of the 21 cabins was taken out of service following passenger complaints on December 25 and 28.

The wheel also closed on January 24 after a software glitch halted operations.

A Melbourne Star spokesperson said the wheel was now fully operational with all cabins in service.

Melbourne Star Observation Wheel is open from 10am until 10pm daily.

Prices vary from \$32 for an adult to \$19 for a child to \$82 for a family (two adults and 2 children) pass.

# Victoria chief

Places Victoria last month appointed Gregory Anderson as its chief executive officer, but he won't take up the position until the end of March.

Mr Anderson's appointment comes more than a year after former CEO Sam Sangster resigned.

In the interim, Places Victoria has had several acting CEOs, including Places Victoria general managers Simon Wilson and Peter Armstrong and Metropolitan Planning Authority CEO Peter Seamer, who led the organisation between March and September last year.

Chairman Ken Fehily announced the appointment on January 29, saying: "I am pleased to welcome Gregory to Places Victoria in what will be the beginning of a new chapter for the state's urban renewal authority."

He acknowledged that the search for a new CEO had taken some time.

"We want Places Victoria to be a sustainable business entity that can continue to lead successful urban renewal projects like Docklands while, at the same time, creating a new pipeline of incremental developmentready sites for the private sector," he said.

"The board, therefore, makes no apologies for taking its time to make this decision."

Mr Anderson has held a range of positions in planning and property development, both in government and in the private sector.

He was part of City of Mebourne's Postcode 3000 team and has held senior positions with Macquarie Bank, Selpam and Tigcorp.

He's currently general manager of development and construction at Tigcorp and will remain in this role until March, before taking up the Places Victoria CEO role on March 31.



# Olympic dream for Docklander Collision

Local athlete Deanna Lockett will compete on the world stage at the Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia, this month.

At just 18 years of age, she's an Olympic Games debutant and has qualified for the 1000 metre and 1500 metre short track speed-skating events.

Ms Lockett has been skating since she was eight years old and moved with her family from Brisbane to Docklands in 2011 so she could train at the Icehouse.

Following her selection for the Olympic team in January, Ms Lockett said she was feeling excited but was focusing on her preparation.

Training in Melbourne in the lead up to the Games involved two hours on the ice and two hours at the gym six days per week, under Olympic Winter Institute of Australia's short track speed-skating head coach Ann

Ms Lockett left Australia in mid-January to head to Turkey for further pre-Olympic training before arriving in Sochi ahead of the

Given it's her first Olympic Games and she's one of the youngest competitors, Ms Lockett was modest about her chances of winning a medal but said she aimed to make the

"I hope to make the semi-final for the 1500-metre and a top-10 would be the best, but we'll just see how it goes," Ms Lockett

"With the Olympics, it's the top 30 women so all the skaters are going to be tough."

But she'll be one to watch at the 2018 Olympics in South Korea where she hopes to really make her mark and bring home a medal.

Joining her in Sochi is 20-year-old Pierre Boda who also trains locally at the Icehouse and has qualified for the 500-metre short track event.

"It means so much to me to have made the Olympic team, especially after making so many sacrifices and years of hard work," Mr


A 34-year-old woman was killed in Docklands this month, following a collision on Footscray Rd.


The woman was the passenger of a Toyota Yaris, which was turning right into Waterfront Way from Footscray Rd, when it collided with a Toyota Landcruiser utility travelling north on Footscray Rd, just after 10am on February 1.

The female passenger died at the scene while the 36-year-old male driver of the Yaris sustained minor injuries.

A 29-year-old Hillside man was driving the Toyota Landcruiser and has been charged with culpable driving, dangerous driving causing serious injury, negligent driving causing serious injury, and possession of a drug of dependence.

Police have bailed the man to appear in Melbourne Magistrate's Court on February 5.





# VCAT victory for operators

The Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) last month ruled the Conder Owners Corporation (OC) did not have the authority to restrict access to recreation areas in the building.

In February last year the Conder OC introduced rules making pool, sauna and gym induction mandatory and restricted access for residents who hadn't completed the induction.

Induction sessions were held each Monday morning, which short-stay operators said was impractical for short-term residents, who often booked weekend stays.

Metro Real Estate, a MAB Corporation business, which trades as Grand Mercure Docklands, represented 37 lot owners in VCAT action opposing the induction procedure.

Docklands Private Collection of Apartments managers Peter and Lyn Kelly also launched VCAT action (independent of the business), claiming the rule was discriminatory.

Under section 14 of the Owners Corporations Act 2006 any OC rule which is discriminatory or inconsistent with a legal right of a lot owner or occupier is invalid.

Member Linda Rowland heard the case on November 11 before returning her decision in December.

The VCAT decision found that the OC committee did not have the power to make the rule requiring residents to undergo an induction before being granted access to the pool and sauna, because a rule requires a special resolution of lot owners.

The OC had contended that this rule was a sub-rule of rule 28 (j), which required residents to be inducted before being given access to the gym.

Member Rowland disagreed with this and found the extension of the rule to the rest

of the recreation area required a special resolution.

Member Rowland also found that the gym induction rule (rule 28(j)), while not discriminatory in how it was applied to all lot owners and occupiers, was discriminatory in the way it was implemented.

The procedure was found to be discriminatory because not all residents were able to attend the induction sessions offered by the OC. She found the implementation of the rule to be unreasonable because there was no flexibility around when and how the induction took place and who facilitated it.

The owners corporation had pointed to insurance advice as the reason behind the introduction of the induction procedures.

However, Member Rowland found that the insurer did not specifically require residents undergo professional induction on the use of gym equipment.

Rather, the insurer had suggested the OC develop an induction procedure that outlined safety rules, provided a health check and indemnified the OC against any incident arising from a resident's impaired health.

Ms Kelly said she was pleased with the outcome of the case and that "the right thing has been done at the end of the day".

Conder OC manager Michael Nugent said the OC committee was disappointed with the decision but was unlikely to appeal it.

An appeal against the decision would need to be on a point of law and would be to the Supreme Court.

## The show will go on

Docklands' Melba Spiegeltent is being reclaimed by its owner Circus Oz and is moving to Collingwood.

But, in the best showbiz tradition, the show will go on and Wonderland Fun Park owners Colin Davis and Melissa Head have found a bigger and better replacement for Docklands.

The couple are importing Salon Elégence from Germany, a beautiful example of "mirror tent" from the Klessen family which has been making and restoring spiegeltents for more than a century.

The new tent is 365sqm and can cater for 450 people for a show or 250 for dinner.

The Wonderland Melba Spiegeltent has over the past couple of years put Docklands on the Melbourne entertainment map with comedy, burlesque, blues and circus-based children's performances.

According to Melissa Head, the new tent will allow for bigger shows than ever.

"Our part of Docklands has become an

entertainment hub and we're really keen to work with the community to build on its success," Ms Head said.

The Heads started looking for a replacement last year after Circus Oz told them they were reclaiming the Melba tent.

In October they tracked down the Klessens family and opened negotiations on Salon Elégence, culminating with a trip to Germany for Colin early last month.

Salon Elégence lived up to its fine reputation and by January 26 was aboard an Antwerp ship and on its way to Docklands.

The Heads are leasing Salon Elégence with an option to buy if everything goes according to plan.

"We hope that our iconic speigeltent will work for us and, more importantly, will also work for Docklands," Ms Head said.





# The other side of the Coyne

When book-publishing company Penguin decided to move from its Camberwell Junction office, CEO Gabrielle Coyne was firm with her instructions – she did not want to move to Docklands.

But the consultant working for the company managed to convince her to take the trip into Docklands to have a look at the heritagelisted Goods Shed South.

"It was a very cold Melbourne day, the weather was quite brutal, and we stood on the bridge at Collins St and looked down and I said: "OK, I think you've got me.""

It was the building over the location that got Docklands over the line but the convenience also played a role.

"We were always looking for a location that was convenient, especially from a public transport point of view," Ms Coyne said.

Penguin (now Penguin Random House after a merger mid-last year) moved into the building in September 2012 and, when asked last month if Docklands had won her over, Ms Coyne said: "It has".

"Even in the short time that we've been here, I'm certainly seeing it develop in a very positive way," she said.

According to Ms Coyne, the movement of creative organisations such as *The Age* to the corner of Spencer and Collins St and Penguin Random House to the Goods Shed has added "an element of colour".

"It's getting a sense of liveliness that I felt was absent," Ms Coyne said.

Although a busy schedule means she hasn't had time to fully explore the precinct, and wouldn't yet describe herself as a "Docklands expert", she says she is working on it.

One thing she might be considered an expert on is the publishing industry.

Having worked for Penguin for more than 20 years, she's risen through the ranks after starting her career in marketing.

In 2003 she was appointed managing director of Penguin Australia, before

New Zealand was also added to her responsibilities in 2006.

Three years later she was appointed CEO of Penguin Group Asia Pacific and last year became CEO of Penguin Random House Asia Pacific, after the companies merged.

"I was very fortunate to grow in a job from a young age and was given opportunities, which meant the job was always changing, and the challenges were changing," Ms Coyne said.

"I feel very fortunate, quite blessed."

There are a limited number of female CEOs in Australia's larger companies, but Ms Coyne doesn't feel gender has ever been an issue in her career.

"I think publishing is a much more even, in fact, a female dominated industry, so it is slightly different to the rest of corporate Australia or corporate anywhere," Ms Coyne said.

She said she had been struck by the positive response of other women both within and outside the company as she progressed

through it.

"It's important that I remember how important it is to other women, especially younger women, to see women progress through organisations and their careers," Ms Coyne said.

Considering her career in the publishing industry, one might assume Ms Coyne is an avid reader.

She confirms this is the case, but won't mention her favourite book or author, saying in her line of work, it's not the wisest move.

"Even as chief executive it's really important for me to still be reading for pleasure as much as it is for work," she said

"I loved going away on my Christmas holidays with a pile of books I hadn't had the chance to read during the year."

And, after more than 20 years in the industry, Ms Coyne said the pleasure of reading an author's new work never dissipates.

"It's a real joy to be one of the first people to read an author's work."

# New tower for Collins Square

Walker Corporation has begun work on the tallest tower to be built in Melbourne in more then 10 years.

The tower will be the fourth Walker Corporation has built at its Collins Square development in Docklands, having secured big four accounting group KPMG as anchor tenant.

It had been long-rumoured that Walker Corporation was attempting to entice the company down to the Docklands end of Collins St. KPMG's current Melbourne head office is also on Collins St but is closer to Spring St.

Walker Corporation announced the 15year deal in December. KPMG will lease 27,000 sqm of the new tower, which overall comprises 55,000 sqm over 38 levels.

Walker Corporation chairman Lang Walker said the company was "delighted" to sign KPMG

"Their signing reinforces Collins Square as Melbourne's leading new commercial, retail and hospitality centre, and we are receiving even greater enquiries off the back of the KPMG signing," Mr Walker said.

Early work began at the site in December, with completion scheduled for late 2016.



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# Adding a dash of colour

Docklands had a rainbow-hued start to Australia Day when almost 2000 people took part in the MS Colour Dash.

The morning event saw almost 2000 people race around Docklands as they were showered with brightly coloured powders at different stations along the course.

According to event organisers, 1.7 tonnes of coloured powder was thrown throughout the event.

People had travelled from as far away as Echuca, Wangaratta, Drouin, Barwon Heads, Ararat and Lake Charm to take part in the fun run.

As participants crossed the finish line they were handed bags of yellow and green powder to be thrown in a patriotic celebration of Australia Day.

The event was held to raise funds for MS Australia, which supports Australians living with multiple sclerosis

The Docklands MS Colour Dash ran in conjunction with events in New South Wales, Canberra and Tasmania, which combined raised almost \$280,000.

# **Docklands shines on Australia Day**

Docklands was the highlight of Melbourne's Australia Day celebrations last month, with thousands of people flocking to the waterfront.

Destination Docklands' family friendly Australia Day event kicked off at 4pm and saw thousands head down to join in the fun of the thong-throwing competition, kite-making workshop, sausage sizzle and face-painting.

Roving performers also entertained the crowd, while Nova DJs provided an aussie soundtrack, which saw plenty of people up and dancing.

Destination Docklands CEO Anita Donnelly said some people were so keen they began arriving at midday.

According to Ms Donnelly, the 250 spots in the thong-throwing competition were quickly filled, with organisers having to turn people away, while around 800 kites were made at the kite workshop.

Ms Donnelly estimated at least 20,000 people turned up for the 9.30pm Australia Day fireworks and City of Melbourne pedestrian monitors recorded more than 64,000 people in Docklands between 7am and 10pm.

This year was the first time the official fireworks have been held in Docklands, having previously been staged at Kings Domain.

Ms Donnelly said NewQuay Promenade, Harbour Esplanade and Victoria Harbour Promenade were packed with people waiting to see the spectacular light show.

"The crowd was very well-behaved and we had absolutely no problems at all," Ms Donnelly said.


Ms Donnelly said Destination Docklands hoped to repeat the success next year with a bigger and better event and hoped to again host the fireworks.











## **Doubts over visitor service**

Docklands could miss out on a potential tourism booster unless the City of Melbourne secures a partner to help fund a visitor service at Southern Cross Station.

Council has been investigating a visitor information service in or near the city's major visitor entry point for seven years.

Most recently it funded a \$50,000 static trial at the station between September and November last year, covering the Royal Melbourne Show, Melbourne Cup Carnival, and AFL finals period.

A report on the trial recommended that the only option for a City of Melbourne visitor service at the station was a partnership model and was endorsed unanimously by councillors at a Future Melbourne meeting on December 10.

The report revealed that the visitor centre recorded 17,700 contacts over the 56-day trial, with no increase on event days.

However, 63 per cent of enquiries related to Myki, public transport and Southern Cross Station.

Just 25 per cent of enquiries related to Melbourne as a visitor destination and, of these, less than 1 per cent were specifically about Docklands.

But when *Docklands News* spoke to Cr Beverly Pinder-Mortimer about the trial in October last year she said visitor service staff were actively promoting Docklands to tourists.

According to a council spokesperson only "reactive enquiries" were recorded for the report, which suggests the pro-active promotional possibilities of the service haven't been assessed.

It's estimated the cost of setting up the visitor service would be \$798,000, with an annual operating cost of \$816,000.

Speaking at the Future Melbourne meeting, Tourism Melbourne manager

Barry McGuren, who presented the report, maintained the visitor service was a fantastic idea because it was an opportunity to capture arriving visitors.

He said the service should only be considered under the partnership model.

A council spokesperson said the City of Melbourne would be writing to station manager Asset Co, Public Transport Victoria, Tourism Victoria and V-Line and may consider other partners.

Although councillors unanimously supported further investigation into a partnership model, Lord Mayor Robert Doyle was unconvinced the project should go ahead.

While prepared to support council officers' investigation into the partnership model he said he had not seen any demonstrated benefit for the City of Melbourne.

Cr Cathy Oke said, while there was some data showing that people wanted to hear more about the City of Melbourne, council had developed other opportunities to access this information via websites, apps, way-finding signage and the existing visitor centres.


In contrast, Cr Stephen Mayne was supportive of the visitor service concept, saying it was logical.

He said Melbourne was a rapidly growing city and when the regional rail link was fully commissioned numbers coming into Southern Cross would grow rapidly, making plans for a visitor centre a good idea.

Councillors will hear a report from management on an attempt to seek an inprinciple agreement from key stakeholders on a partnership model for a visitor service by the end of March.

# Rebuilding futures at YMCA

Rebuild is a facilities management company, which provides work experience and training for young people, primarily exoffenders, who are experiencing barriers to employment.

Working with experienced tradespeople, participants gain formal and on-the-job training and develop life skills needed to make the transition into the workforce.

For Nathan Bugeja, the Rebuild program has provided the skills and experience needed to plan for his future.

The 22-year-old was getting into trouble with police before a YMCA social worker helped him secure a job at the Melbourne Zoo.

After completing six months at the zoo he moved on to the Rebuild program and has obtained his traffic controller licence, has learnt about painting and general maintenance and has developed landscaping skills.

"I've had steady work so it's been a lot less stressful that way," Mr Bugeja said.

He says the program has helped him to get back on track and now hopes to one day run his own landscaping business.

Rebuild manager Gary Sinclair said program participants were recommend from a number of different sources including the Department of Corrections, Department of

Human Services, job service agencies like WISE Employment and St Vincent de Paul.

"They recommend people who demonstrate a willingness to change," Mr Sinclair said.

"They might be attending interviews and have done a substantial amount of training, but just need some help getting a foot in the door."

According to Mr Sinclair, Rebuild actively bids for work internally, through the YMCA and externally, in order to generate opportunities for participants to gain commercial experience.

"Within the Y one of our bigger supporters has been Andrew Ward and YMCA Docklands," Mr Sinclair said.

YMCA Docklands engaged Rebuild to paint the Victoria Point site, which this year marks 10 years since opening its doors.

YMCA Docklands manager Andrew Ward encouraged other local businesses to

consider Rebuild as an option when needing work done.

"Rebuild provides excellent and comparable services to regular contractors and tradesmen," Mr Ward said.

"The difference is, that in the process, the YMCA helps create an opportunity for a young person who at some point in their life has suffered a disadvantage. Rebuild facilitates their journey back to being a positive contributor to the community at large."




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# Glowing review of Bitcoin

A Docklands business has become one of a limited number of Melbourne retailers to accept Bitcoin.

Last month Glow Golf at Harbour Town began accepting bitcoins, a digital currency traded through peer-to-peer technology.

Bitcoins are primarily traded online but Glow Golf has decided to become one of the small number of shopfront retailers to accept the new form of payment.

According to www.coinmap.org, which maps "brick and mortar" retailers who accept bitcoins, there are less than 30 retailers in Melbourne who accept the currency, and just one in the CBD.

Michael and Julie Blyth have operated their Docklands-based mini-golf business for the past four years and have been considering accepting the currency for the past six months.

Mr Blyth said he decided to introduce the new form of payment last month in order stay ahead of new technologies.

According to Mr Blyth, the benefits of accepting bitcoins include minimal transaction fees and no delay in payment being transferred to his account, as is the case with standard eftpos and credit card transactions.

Making a payment using bitcoins is relatively simple, with the transaction processed via a phone app.

To get bitcoins you can convert currency or can become bitcoin miner, however the profitability of this method is questionable with it becoming increasingly difficult for the average person to earn enough bitcoins to make it worthwhile.

The currency has no central or governing authority and is potentially volatile with a rapidly fluctuating value.

According to Mr Blyth, this time last year one bitcoin was worth around \$15 AUD. Today, one bitcoin sits at around \$850 AUD.

Although just one customer has paid using bitcoins since Glow Golf began accepting bitcoins in January, Mr Blyth said he believed Bitcoin would become an increasingly popular method of payment.

"I think when eBay and the like start adopting it we'll see it become more mainstream," Mr Blyth said.

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# Welcome to Docklands Boating

It's the water that makes Docklands special. So why don't we appreciate it more?

Starting this month, *Docklands News* is introducing this regular supplement celebrating our greatest asset. We want to raise the profile of our waterways as they are the key to activating the precint.

If we get the water right, Docklands will prosper. If we continue to under-appreciate it, the opportunity will be lost.

And there's plenty to celebrate. Docklands has 7km of waterfront, an amazing array of boats, some of the best marina facilities in the country and an ever growing range of water-based activities and events.

As the harbour steadily morphs from a commercial shipping port to a vibrant 40ha

As the narbour steadily morphs from a commercial shipping port to a vibrant 40ha water park, the waterfront will become a much loved and envied point of difference.

In this inaugural edition, let's take a look at the numbers. We have four marinas (Marina YE, d'Albora Victoria Harbour Marina, Melbourne City Marina and NewQuay Marina), a dedicated superyacht facility (Melbourne Superyacht Marina), three dedicated commercial landings (Water Plaza, Central Pier, Collins Landing and Melbourne City Marina), 46 private berths connected to luxurious waterfront homes and more than a kilometre of wharfage (commercial berths).

There are about 350 recreational boats and 34 commercial vessels currently calling Docklands home. If proposed plans proceed, the precinct will eventually play host to more than 700 boats.

Depending on the size of vessels, we have about 70 visitor berths. Day visits are free (up to 4 hours). Overnight stays with access to basic amenities and comfortable lounges range from \$45-50.

Melbourne City Marina, which is a dedicated short-stay facility for bona fide visitors and water-based events, currently hosts 3000 boat movements per year. That number is expected to double in the next five years.

Victoria Harbour currently hosts the Docklands Yacht Club, the Victorian Dragon Boat Association and the Melbourne Outrigger Canoe Club. These clubs will be housed in the sensational new Community Boating Hub with construction due to start this year.

Connecting to past glories - the harbour plays host to two tall ships and a steam tug, the Enterprize, Alma Doepel and Wattle. The latter two vessels are undergoing major restoration work. These are important community based projects that involve

countless volunteers and help build a sense of place.

The wide variety of commercial vessels that call Docklands their home port carry well in excess of 100,000 passengers per year. If the planned ferry/passenger terminal proceeds - the industry expects that number will grow ten-fold in the future.

The harbour currently hosts a multitude of water-based events and activities.

These include sailing regattas, dragon boat championships, outrigger canoe championships, fishing tournaments, kayak tours and the Summer Boat Show.

Our 40ha water park is also an incredibly diverse, mostly man-made fishing habitat that is accessible to all. Common species include: bream, salmon, mullet, snapper and the elusive mulloway. Educated shore-based anglers regularly catch and release trophy sized fish, some over a metre in length. Hard to believe - but true!

How extraordinarily lucky we are to live, work and visit this ever evolving waterfront precinct. In upcoming editions we will provide a heads up on what's happening out on the water and the latest gossip from around the traps.





# **Boat Show may leave Docklands**

Docklands is at risk of losing the Melbourne Summer Boat Show unless the Boating Industry Association of Victoria (BIA) can gather more support for the event.

The BIA has held the event in Docklands for the past eight years, but CEO Steven Gill says the organisation is facing challenges at the current site.

MAB's plan to build a hotel on the Waterfront City Piazza, where the event's land component is currently held, has put question marks over the likelihood of the event returning to Docklands next year.

Mr Gill said MAB had been great supporters of the event and that the BIA would be speaking to the developer to determine if the boat show can coexist alongside the planned hotel

According to Mr Gill, the BIA hoped to grow the event and was looking to City of Melbourne to provide further support.

He said the BIA was talking to council about increasing funding for the event.

"We see ourselves as doing a great job activating that space while we're there and brining people into Docklands," Mr Gill said.

Mr Gill said it was hoped the event would stay in Docklands, as "it is a beautiful spot".

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However, the organisation is considering alternative sites for the event and has looked at options on both the western and eastern side of the bay.

"These issues need to be resolved quickly because we start planning for the February 2015 event now," Mr Gill said.

The 2014 Melbourne Summer Boat Show was held in Docklands between Friday, January 31 and Sunday, February 2 and, according to Mr Gill, numbers were slightly

down on previous years.

He said approximately 3000 people had purchased tickets to the event while it was estimated passing traffic reached the 15,000 people mark.

"Although numbers were down on the Sunday we think the high temperature forecast might have kept some people away," Mr Gill said.


He said the marina itself looked spectacular and, all in all, he still considered that the




event was a success.

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# **Love Melbourne – Love Boating – Love Docklands**



Think Melbourne, think fine food, arts, culture, fashion, Melbourne Cup, AFL football. Of all the things Melbourne is noted for, boating generally doesn't rate a mention. Perhaps that's due to a perception that the weather isn't quite suited to the boating lifestyle. And yet there are over 175,000 boats registered in Victoria and some wonderful boating destinations. There are not too many places in Australia, or the world for that matter, where you can cruise into the heart of the city. From a boater's perspective Docklands has it all - a safe, all-weather destination, located minutes from the CBD, top quality eateries and bars set along picturesque waterfront promenades, great shopping with an eclectic mix of designer labels, specialty stores and discount retailers, parklands with large urban artworks, galleries, and even an ice-skating.

We often visit Docklands by boat, occasionally for an event, sometimes to go to the football, dinner or the theatre. 

## Ease up on short-term

I am disappointed at the behaviour and reporting around short-stay accommodation.

This week I have written to the Minister regarding what I consider complete fabrication of the issues that have so far been levied against the sole trader in existence here.

I moved to Docklands in 2010 and from then on had issues from one, now defunct trader who closed their business in 2013.

The building is subjected to substantial noise and general poor behaviour, but not from short-stay tenants, but more likely from tenants and owners.

Certainly, from my observations of the past 12 months, drug taking, refuse being thrown from the building, trolleys left outside, music being played loudly, damage to vehicles, cigarette butts and people spitting from the balconies relate to those that have lived longer term but have scant regard for the lives and existence of those around them.

Then, besides all the overt behaviours, there is the covert behaviours: bullying by some of the community towards tenants and short-term operators, inappropriate and misleading signs about court outcomes.

As a bystander with no vested financial interest or relationship with anyone in the apartments (thankfully) I am astounded by the behaviour. We are not living in a third world country, nor some dictatorship. We are equally entitled to live quietly and peacefully without harassment and intimidation.

Until 12 months ago. I was happy to purchase in the building but it is clear that the lack of strong management and continuing infighting of the residents has led me to move away.

So perhaps, rather than assume that the guilty parties are short-term operators, perhaps you should now consider the other side of the coin.

## Class 2 residential building classification

Our company was one of many building consultants, invited to make comments in the transition from the Building Code of Victoria to the Building Code of Australia.

At no time was there any doubt as to the full intention and meaning of Class 1 and Class 2.

This did not mean tourist accommodation which is specifically identified under Class 3 with additional safety and access provision.

Vested financial interests have taken advantage of the situation which is now out of hand and a residential problem.

For example, the developer/investor applies for a complex to build residential apartments with council. The building is

designed, constructed to comply with Class 2 of the building code, avoiding Class 3 requirements, such as, fire and disability access etc. etc.

A high court judge in Sydney recently ruled that: "It can be clearly demonstrated that tourists and residents sharing common areas and exits do not mix and are not compatible."

Here it should be noted that the hotel and transport industry released a memo expressing their concern of the illegal use of apartments for tourists.

This is in direct conflict and unfair competition with the livelihood of hotel and motel operators having to meet strict operating guidelines.

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

## **Tail wagging** the dog

New research has found that dogs become anxious when they see other dogs wagging their tails to the left.

Don't dogs just wag their tails, some might ask. However, according to new research published by Current Biology, dogs express their emotions through their wagging tails - however slight the wag of the tail might be.

The explanation made in the research is that dogs that wag their tales to the left might be anxious themselves - due to the environment they are in perhaps - or that the dog might be responding to the anxiety of

When dogs wag their tails neutrally or to the right, their behaviour was observed to be more relaxed and their heart rate was slower. The experiment was conducted by monitoring the dog's heart rate and observing their response to projected images of other dogs wagging their tales.

Katrina Cot who walks her dog from Port Melbourne to Docklands says that she can't see a difference in the way her dog - Marley - wags her tail.

"Marley just wags her tail from side to side. We call her the pendulum."

Katrina says that she does notice that Marley can become withdrawn when she sees some other dogs approaching.

The research is important in illustrating that dogs are able to communicate to one another.





# GREETINGS FROM THE DOCKLANDS COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION



## Greetings everybody

Happy New Year and trust you had a good break. Great to be back talking with you

Our DCA Christmas party on December 11 was a great night at the Harbour Kitchen with guests from all around Docklands including over 20 new members. Weather was fine and not too hot.

I attended the official opening of the Observation Wheel in the week before Christmas, officiated by the Deputy Premier. I have continued to plug the wheel in the media including its importance to traders and business and to the image of Docklands generally. The operating problems have been disappointing of course. I believe it's important that any problem is adequately explained to the public, including remedial action taken to avoid recurrence, in order to build public confidence.

You may have noticed an additional tram service has just started operating in Docklands, namely the 75 from Vermont which instead of turning from Flinders St into Spencer St now continues down Flinders St into and along the Esplanade. It is good for bringing more people directly into Docklands and also that it terminates

along the Footscray Road shunt line rather down Docklands Drive which would have caused too much tram congestion.

On December 18, I attended the Docklands Security Group meeting chaired by the police, with representatives from major businesses, building managers, the DCA and CoM. Matters discussed included crime levels-lower than in CBD, vehicle and bicycle speeding and other problems; also security arrangements for NYE which are always adequate. I raised the matter of problems with cyclists. The following results of a recent survey of cyclists were tabled by the CoM:

"The surveys indicated that 16 per cent of all movements in the southbound direction in the morning peak on the pedestrian path were cyclists. These cyclists are approaching pedestrians from behind and, considering that the average speed of these cyclists is approximately 25kmh with some speeds in the low 30s, pedestrians could feel intimidated. Observations by the survey team indicate that the majority of cyclists didn't slow down at Central Pier access driveway, although they do have priority. The survey team also observed that only a few cyclists stopped to give way to pedestrians on the pedestrian crossing, most cyclists just rang their bell and continued through. Enforcement of rules will be

followed up."

On the short term rental front, the Appeals Court found in favour of the defendant Salter in the Watergate case. It has been suggested that council's argument should have focused on serviced apartments, the most troublesome and prevalent segment of the short-term rental market. Minister Guy has yet to announce draft legislation. Other courses of action are being followed up.

Repair of the wharf area along the esplanade is under way. Indications are that the type of re-development for public use will be hotly debated. Whilst council and Places Victoria talk about up-coming public consultation, they already keep telling us they intend to put cargo sheds along it. That makes a farce of the consultation process. There is a lot of objection to sheds apparent and as and when they provide specifics, the DCA will conduct a poll to check opinion. As the redeveloped esplanade will be a focal point of Docklands it is imperative that it be made a warm attractive place to visit with open grassed areas. More cargo sheds would just serve to increase the current sterility and is the last thing we want. The former chair of Place Victoria, Peter Clarke, made it clear he was opposed to the sheds idea.

NewQuay has a problem with removal of trees and fittings by the developer MAB Corporation. With council approval, tall

palm trees standing on the site of the Quays construction were removed to make way for the construction work. It was stated in writing by council the palms would be kept in storage and replanted when the work was completed. That is now not possible as the building extends to the roadway. Another casualty was the only children's playground in NewQuay which was removed.

We are requesting council to instruct MAB to replant the palms and restore the playground and equipment in prominent positions on another of their sites in the area. Additionally, we understand MAB now propose to remove more nearby palms, shrubs and innovative boat-shaped planter tubs so they can change the open area near the promenade. We are requesting council to reject that proposal.

# OWNERS With Tom Bacon CORPORATION LAW

## Stoking the embers of a smoking debate

Smoking cigarettes in common property areas and on the balconies of units is a hotly-contested issue that divides any residential building.

The overwhelming medical evidence today concludes that not only is smoking severely injurious to personal health, but also "smoke drift" or passive smoking can sometimes be just as injurious to health as it is to the person inhaling the cigarette themselves.

Residents shouldn't have to put up with smoke drift and cigarette butts coming from other balconies in their buildings. If the odour and smoke is offensive, then it can be declared to be a nuisance, and can be banned via an order from the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT).

The key to remember here is that the activity complained about must be objectively unreasonable, not subjectively unreasonable, meaning that an ordinary person would need to find the smoking to constitute a nuisance.

Similarly, if the problem is spread throughout a building and on many levels, then an owners corporation may pass an additional rule to restrict smoking on common property, and to restrict smoking on balconies where that may cause nuisance to other residents. The additional rule would need to be passed by a special resolution at a general meeting of the owners corporation. Even if the special resolution does not pass, a lot owner or group of residents may appeal the decision to VCAT to have the rule passed and registered in any event.

On a policy front, the smoking of cigarettes shall continue to be marginalised by lawmakers in the years to come, to the extent

where smoking cigarettes may even be banned in apartment buildings altogether.

It is only a matter of time until new developments will have compulsory rules registered to ban smoking in all areas of the building. But will Victoria be the first state in Australia to pass laws to essentially make new buildings "smoke-free"? I would think so.
